## City Council Asks Bids on Generating Unit

### 25 Year Gas Pact Approved

The city council voted Tuesday night to ask for sealed bids on a new dual fuel engine for the municipally owned light plant and power plant, according to City Clerk Walter Bressler. Deadline for bids is 7 p.m. Oct. 16.

Earlier in the meeting, the council approved plans and specifications presented by H. S. Nixon of the Nixon Engineering company in Omaha.

The project calls for installation of a dual fuel generating unit having a capacity from 1000 to 1500 kilowatts depending on manufacturer's nearest size.

Installation will include complete auxiliaries, a cooling system, extension and switchboard alterations.

Engineer Nixon's estimates for completion of the proposed addition to the light plant are \$170,700.00 for a 1000 kilowatt unit and \$244,200.00 for a 1500 kilowatt unit, either supercharged or not supercharged.

The city council reserved the right to reject or accept all bids and to waive on any information to bidders is carried in today's Herald.

### Gas Franchise Approved

An additional 25-year gas franchise was approved at the meeting Tuesday night.

Although the present franchise has over four years to run, the new franchise will go into effect immediately. However, the present rates will hold until Jan. 27, 1955, expiration date of the old franchise. At that time a rate increase is expected.

Other Wayne county winners included LeRoy Sievers' second and fifth places, David Meyer's second and fourth places, and Joel Jeffrey's third and sixth awards. The three points exhibited Hereford steers.

At Norfolk Jon Kyl had the Grand Champion Hereford heifer and Grand Champion heifer of all breeds. The 760 pound calf brought 50 cents a pound.

Two other champions were shown by Wayne county club members at Norfolk.

Duane Lutt had the Reserve Champion Angus steer and Richard Long displayed the Reserve Champion Shorthorn steer. Robert Long was next high with a purple ribbon winning Hereford steer.

Five other youth won awards with their animals at Norfolk. Dorothy Kluge took a blue ribbon with her Angus steer. Larry Westerman, Dennis Puls and Dick Kluge won blues with their Hereford steers.

Bob Morris, Kenneth, Jim and Phil Kluge and Darrell Puls were awarded red ribbons on their Hereford steers.

### Students from 65 State Schools Listed at WSTC

Students from 65 Nebraska high schools and high schools in seven other states make the total of 247 freshmen who enrolled in Wayne State Teachers college this fall, according to figures released by the registrar's office at the college.

Largest representation came from Wayne City high school, which sent 19 of last year's graduates to Wayne State this fall. Wakefield was second with 11.

States represented at the college and the number of students from each are Nebraska 188, Iowa 51, South Dakota 3, California 1, Minnesota 1, North Carolina 1, Pennsylvania 1 and Wisconsin 1.

The final enrollment figures show that 305 men and 246 women for a total of 611 students have registered at the college. This is a 19 per cent decrease over last year's 763.

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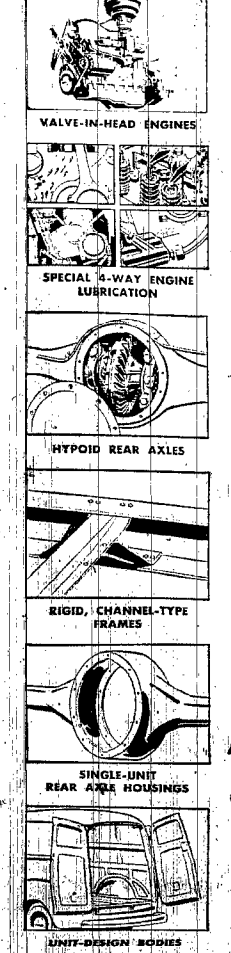

The spritely, keen lady worked deftly with her needle to illustrate the method used in creation of the unique rugs. She sewed yarn with a lighter thread onto a background, which may be terry cloth, old blankets or old rugs. She produced a design as she worked, improvising and changing her mind as figures were molded with her needle. She sewed by plain stitching over and over and by the cross stitch, winding her needle expertly as an artist handles his paint brush.

Studied Art in Canada.

Mrs. Schreiner, although much younger and more vivacious, is much like the famous American primitive painter, Grandma Moses. However, unlike Grandma Moses who began her career only a few years ago, Mrs. Schreiner studied at work at Loretta Abbey, Toronto, Canada, at a very early age. After her family moved to Boston, she taught art in a Boston department store. Her talent at lace-making may be seen in her wedding dress, completed in 1899. Mrs. Schreiner (nee Miss Priest), created an original design on stiff cloth and made the wedding dress with ivory thread. Pind fibers, buds and bow knots are found in the lace, which is truly a masterpiece.

Mrs. Schreiner obtained two prizes at exhibitions in Boston; the first year she received a gold medal and the second year an up gilt pin. The third year she was awarded a second prize and was given a complete set of Haviland china. During her marriage, Mrs. Schreiner put her hobby aside. After Mr. Schreiner's death she began again. She has given away many of her rugs but several remain in her home. She has a braided rug which is for extremely rugged, because of its tight construction. Mrs. Schreiner has put a design on the

250-year-old Paisley. Scotland, show handed down by her great-grandmother. The rugs in her possession include the from the Ganga region and the India. That one in her possession from the settlement on the Ganga river has a coat of arms in deep blue, rust and mulberry. The three Bokhara rugs are seen what alike in colors, mulberry, at blue and vermilion. Two are Princess Bokhara and one is Royal Bokhara and were bought at the world's fair. One Prince Bokhara is a half of a saddle for a dromedary camel, one is only one hump. The Royal Bokhara is distinguished for its fine knitting; every piece is knotted separately.

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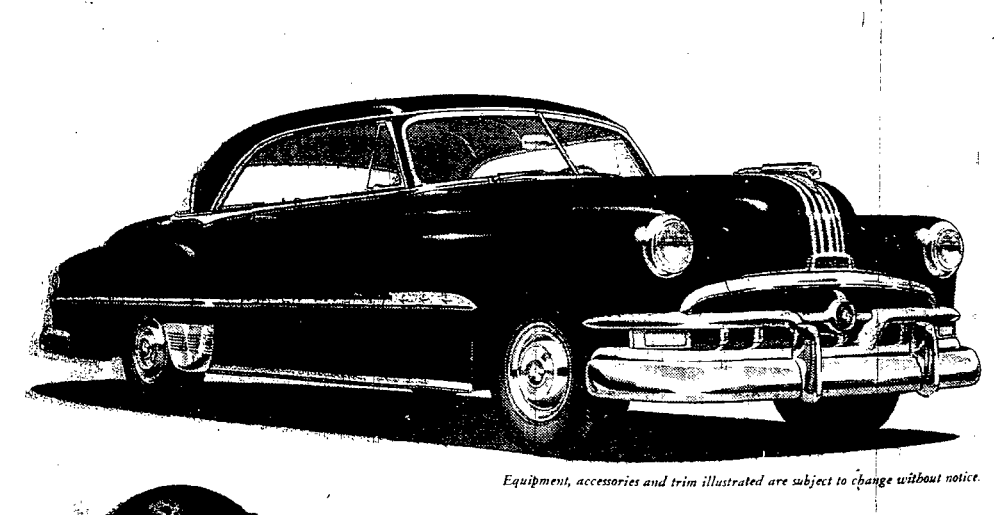

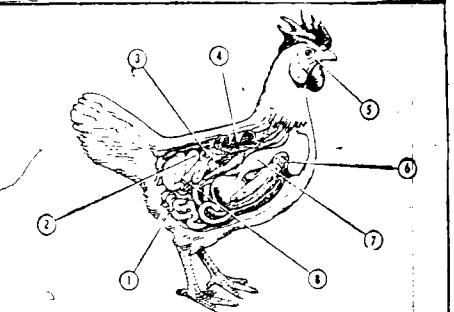

## Dove Season Ends Sunday, Rabbits Next

Lincoln — Nebraska's first hunting season of the 1951 fall and winter period disappears from the calendar Sunday at sunset on the 30-day long dove season.

Nebraskans, however, will be hunting as the state's rabbit season got underway at sunrise today, Sept. 25. The rabbit season runs through Jan. 21 and then temporarily until May 1 when it will begin again and carry through Dec. 31, 1952.

The entire state is open to rabbit hunting. Both the bag and possession limits are 10 rabbits.

Nebraska's third hunting season — squirrel — gets underway Monday at sunrise and closes Dec. 31. Hunting is statewide and is permitted from sunrise to sunset. The bag limit on squirrels is five as is the possession limit.

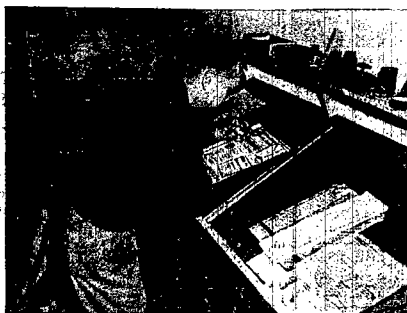

**BOTTOM OF THE THERMOMETER**

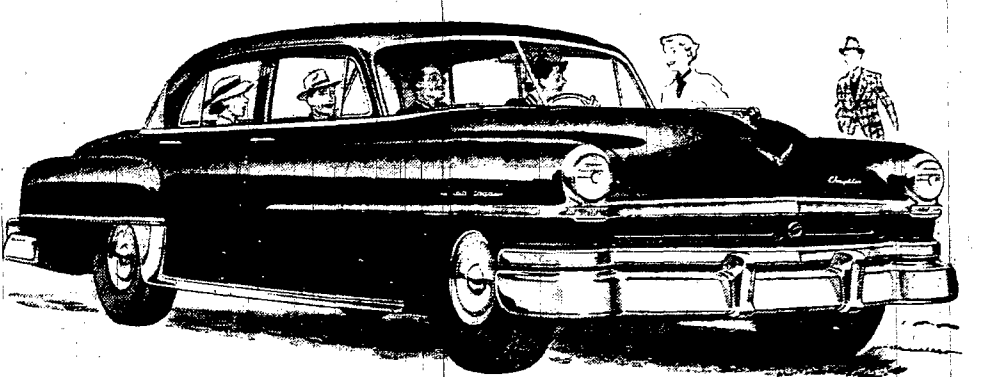
