Killing Frost Damages Late Maturing Corn in Territory

Good Corn Reported by Few Farmers

A killing frost last Thursday night hit late maturing corn hard according to Thomas P. Roberts, PMA chairman.

"We estimate the crop about 75 per cent made," Roberts said. Assistant Al Thomas and Roberts have been examining fields in the area since the frost trying to get a line on the damage and the potential crop.

Some farmers have reported to Roberts that the frost helped their fields of corn and that the corn was good as ever. But of course these reports are in the minority.

The weather is the answer to soft corn in the area, announced Roberts. If the days remain hot and the sun shines, the soft corn will dry on the cob and should not sour. Of course there will be heavy shrinkage but shrinkage is better than spoilage. Roberts picked a 20-cz. ear of corn and put it in the window at his office. It weighed 8 oz. when it had dried.

"Generally speaking," Roberts stated, "the eastern part of the county seems in pretty good shape." Most of the corn planted in the sandy soil around Heekin's has matured too. The poorest corn examined was in the hail area south of Sholes. If the corn was planted early and in clover or alfalfa ground, it seemed to make the grade even though this was not a corn growing season, Roberts reported.

About a week before the frost, the PMA officer said county farmers had planted five to eight per cent more corn this year than last. However, there was a lot of corn that was not filling out to the ends of the cobs. Also the corn here had cut yield somewhat.

Social Security Man Meets Here Oct. 10

A Social Security representative will be at the county house in Wayne at 3 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 10, the Federal Security agency announced. Any person with social security problems may discuss them with the representative at that time.

A total of 42 persons in Wayne county were receiving social security benefits amounting to \$1251 a month, according to February reports.

Twenty-four retired wage earners were getting \$850. Nine wives received \$175, and \$160 was paid to seven children. A widow and a mother were sent checks of \$29 and \$33.

Social security is paid at the rate of 65 or death. Newly passed legislation requires that employers of domestic and farm help pay social security on the wages.

American Chemical Society Meets at College Saturday

Members of the Sioux Valley section of the American Chemical society will hear Dr. Irving M. Klotz, professor of chemistry at Northwestern university, at the fall meeting of the society at Wayne State Teachers college Saturday, Oct. 6. Dr. Klotz's subject will be "The Nature of Some Protein Complexes."

The meeting of the Sioux Valley section, which is composed of A.C.S. members from Eastern South Dakota, Northwestern Iowa, and Northeast Nebraska, will open with a coffee hour in the Student Union building at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Peru State Plays Here Saturday

Wayne State gridiron fans will see one of the crucial games of the season Saturday night when the Wildcats and the Peru Bobcats—both undefeated in NCC play—tangle in the Wayne State Memorial stadium.

The Wildcats' unexpected rout of the Wesleyan Plainsmen last Friday perched the local teachers on top of the NCC ladder, for the time being with a score of 70 points to their opponents' 7.

Wayne State's incoming outfit, under the direction of Eugene Bennett, plans musical satellites to the various branches of the athletic services during the time ceremonies at the Peru-Wayne game Saturday night.

Wayne State will form the service corps and play appropriate duties.

To hold that spot, however, will call for the toughest fight the Wildcats have yet had to face. The Bobcats, traditionally the rough gang of the NCC circuit, are nursing a one-point defeat at the hands of Wayne last year, which may have cost them the championship.

The Cats went to Peru last fall and squeezed out a 7-6 decision, ending up the season neck-and-neck (in second place) with the Bobcats.

Coach Jack Wink is spending the week strengthening the defensive line, which looked "pretty weak" against the Plainsmen last Friday. The Bobcats will bring along a line carrying plenty of weight—including a pair of tackles 200 and up—and although they opened slow and sluggish against Midland last week, they pack a lot of power when they get rolling. Spectators can expect to see a rough-and-tumble brawl when the squads of "Cats" get turned loose Saturday.

A win for Wayne this Saturday could make the teachers' Homecoming tilt October 20 the NCC championship game. The Wildcats are slated to meet the Hastings College eleven the other unbeaten NCC team at that time, and the two teams would be top contenders for the crown.

Plainview Beats Bloomfield, 34-0

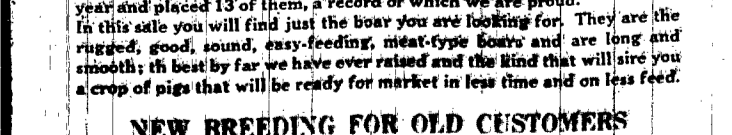

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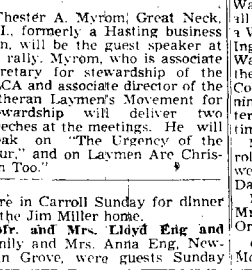

death in 1928 and his wife died in 1945.

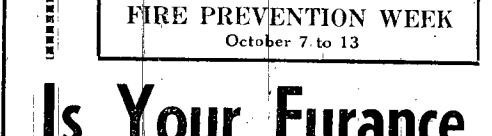
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William Louis Baker

Merlin Meyer Collects and Mounts All Kinds of Nails



Merlin Meyer's nail collecting hobby began in high school as a school project, and aided by his carpenter father, Ben Meyer, he has pooled 53 varieties and mounted 43 of them. Meyer spent three years in the army following high school and has done practically no work on the collection since then. Each in his collection is different, whether in size or use.

Cork Spike
Probably the strangest looking nail is the cork spike which is used for insulation; the head is round, size but the body is about eight inches long. In direct contrast is the "P-K" nail used for installing brackets. It is very short and thick with a very fine point.

A rod nail resembles the all-fashioned four-sided square nails which he also owns. The 30 common variety, about a fourth-inch thick is a husky nail used in framing and rough work. Long and thin is the number 8 finish nail which is used for finish work and flooring so that the very small head may be pounded right into the wood. The upholstery nail and the 16, 20 and 30 commons look somewhat alike.

Double-Headed Nail
The Wayne man has several different sizes of the wire and lead molding, used for molding so that it may be pounded into the wood. Not so easily concealed and certainly not easily pulled is the double-headed nail with a larger head at the end.

A very large head is on the galvanized roofing nail, so that the wind won't tear it and its caper off the roof. Another one with an over-sized head, this one of lead, is another roofing nail; the wide and big head flattens when it is pounded. One which resembles a small drill or screw is the obviously named screw-type nail which is used for rough work such as the framework of a house. This type of nail holds especially well.

Square Nail
Meyer has several staples, U-shaped nails, which are used for fence construction. There is also a unique-looking square black nail, quite old-fashioned. At one time there were no round nails.

Besides this collection, Meyer has accumulated about 500 match books since he was a senior in high school. There are all sizes, and one a foot long and two inches wide from Merrimack cavern near St. Louis, Mo. Several are from overseas, to make his hobby one of distinction. Another of his favorite pastimes is that of roller skating.

Outgain Blue Devils

Wayne's defense against passes was far different from it had been a week earlier. Oak was hitting the Trojan backs consistently with his tosses but the receivers could not hold on to the ball.
