### Jack Langemeier Shows Grand Champion at Ak-Sar-Ben Show Meyer Has Runner-up Heifer

Jack Langemeier, Wayne, exhibited the Grand Champion steer at the 1951 Ak-Sar-Ben Livestock show last week to give Wayne County exhibitors the championship for the third time in four years and the fourth time in the past 15 years.

Lester Lutt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Lutt, started Wayne County on its winning ways in 1936. He repeated the performance in 1937. Ueland Herman exhibited the champion for consecutive years in 1940 and 1941.

The late Dean Meyer, who was killed in an airplane accident, took top honors at the Omaha show in 1944.

In 1948 and 1950 Norman Willers accounted for grand champions number six and seven. Willers displayed the reserve champion Hereford steer at the show last week.

This year Jack Langemeier was the youth to turn the trick with his Hereford steer and give Wayne County the record of having had the championship more times than the rest of Nebraska counties combined.

The winning steer was bought from Henry Boulier's herd at Long Pine Jack fed the calf in the "Brenna Go Getters" club.

Great Steak House in Omaha purchased the Champion steer for \$2.30 a pound. The 970 pound animal returned his owner \$2,231. It was the first time the owner had exhibited at the Omaha show.

### CROP Livestock Week Oct. 14-20

Nebraska livestock producers have the opportunity this year of joining with the state's farmers and grain growers in extending a helping hand overseas to unfortunate and famine-stricken orphans, widows and the aged.

The Christian Rural Overseas program (CROP), which collects and distributes food free to the hungry and needy in many parts of the world through church organizations, has planned the campaign of "Nebraska Livestock for World Relief." Similar campaigns are going forward in both Colorado and Wyoming.

CROP Livestock week, set for October 14 to 20, places local emphasis on regular sales days during the week. Auction houses have already received federal and state permission to sell CROP-donated livestock without making their customary charges. Both the Omaha and Sioux City stockyards have agreed to handle centrally-marketed livestock contributed to CROP.

Livestock donations will be sent overseas, in the interests of economy, as processed meat and meat products. Arrangements are being made to sell the animals either at local auction barns or central markets. The donor may receive any proceeds used to buy processed livestock products for shipment. The project aims at the distribution of life-giving proteins and fats to supplement the starvation diet of war and famine victims, refugees, orphans, widows and the aged in some 25 countries.

The Nebraska CROP Livestock committee, of which Rufus M. Howard, state director of agriculture, is chairman, points out that all kinds and grades of animals—finished, stockers, feeders and others—are acceptable during the campaign.

Where a livestock producer feels he is unable to give a whole animal to CROP's relief program, the committee emphasizes, "he may donate a portion of the price of the animal." CROP livestock donation arrangements may be made through local auctioneers, local CROP livestock committees, with the state CROP office at 409 First National Bank building in Lincoln.

CROP is sponsored by Catholic Rural Life (War Relief Services), Church World Service (serving 29 Protestant denominations), and Lutheran World Relief (serving the churches of the National Lutheran council).

### Memorial Rites at Concordia Lutheran For Edward Carlson

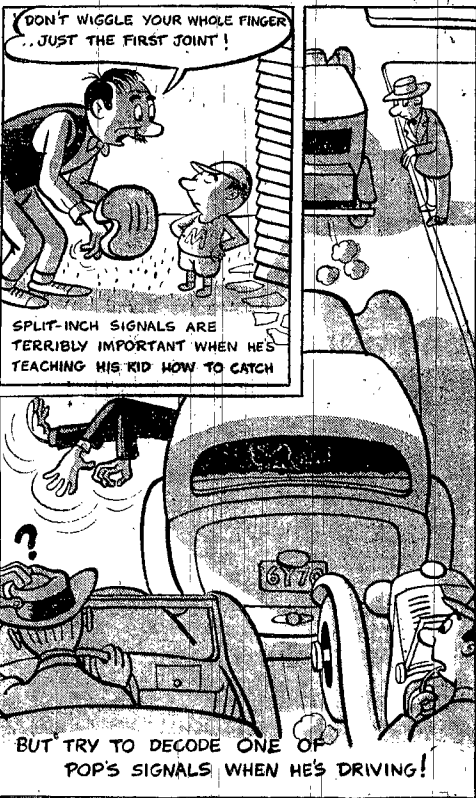

## Corn Driers Could Solve Crib Problem

Allen—Corn drying with mechanical driers may solve the problem of storing corn with high moisture content, according to Wayne County Agent Howard G. Giffels.  
Corn stored last fall and dried by forced air methods shrunk out this summer with the loss of moisture. Corn from the same locality that was not dried shrank up to 65 per cent damaged by insects.  
This year we expect a crop of corn to go into the crib with a higher moisture content than last year, which is usually 20 per cent, which is usually stored maximum moisture content, Giffels announced.  
Farmers, expecting to have a crop of soft corn should use a safe drying method, the county agent stated, and added that the driers have a valuable record established by experiment stations. The corn driers seem to be a good investment for the farmer.

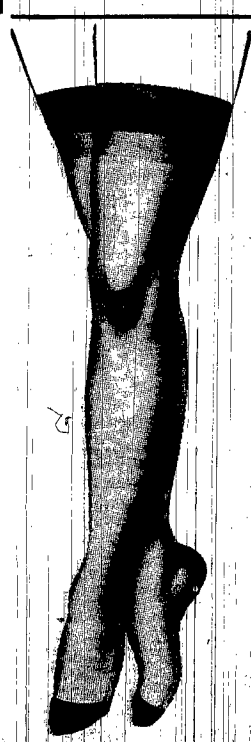

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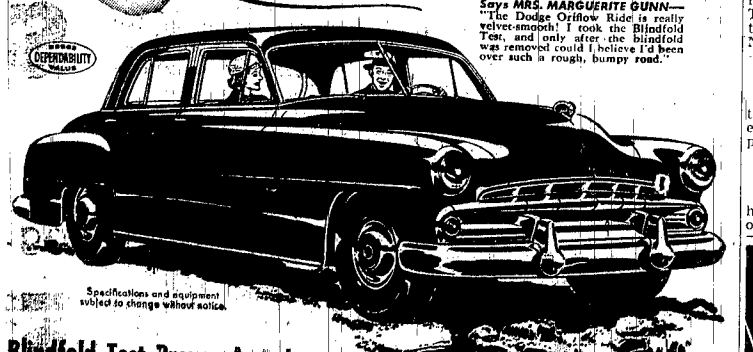

# Blue Devils Romp Over Neligh 41-6 Friday Night

## Locals Top West Half Of League

Displaying their most potent offensive punch of the 1951 season, Wayne High's Blue Devils ground out a 41-6 triumph over a helpless Neligh eleven Friday night at W.C. Memorial stadium.

Coach Lloyd Horton's charges scored in every quarter as they racked up their second Husker conference victory in as many starts. Only one dark cloud shaded the victory. Neligh was the first team to cross the Blue Devil goal line this year.

Wayne now leads the west division of the league. Dwayne Atkins, Buster Tietz and David Meyer led the Wayne attack which rolled to six touchdowns. Meyer added five straight extra points from placement before missing on his last attempt. The placement missed was the first for Meyer this season.

Wayne's offensive attack showed more polish than it had in three earlier performances. Particularly noteworthy was the improvement in downfield blocking. Wayne's backs were taking better advantage of blocking too.

Wayne started its scoring parade just before the first quarter ended with a 55-yard march. Meyer skirted right end on a pitchout for the tally.

Minutes later, Wayne went ahead 14-0 when Gabelman got a short kick for Neligh and the visitors were charged with a 15-yard clipping penalty. Wayne took over on the Neligh 49 and scored seven plays later.

The touchdown came on a double reverse. Skeahan to Granquist to Tietz on 26 yards out.

Horton Recovers: Jim Henegar, who had one of his best nights of the season, set up the next Wayne score when he recovered Reco's fumble on the Neligh 32. Meyer rounded right end for 14 yards to the 21. Then Granquist raced to the two but both teams were offside.

Tietz scored the touchdown on a beautiful run over right tackle. After reaching the Neligh secondary, he cut back and crossed the goal line untouched. The half ended with Wayne leading 21-0 when separate Blue Devil passes led short in the closing minutes.

Bill Palmer led Wayne on a 59-yard scoring march after the second half kickoff. Atkins got 17 yards to the Neligh 38 and the Blue Devils got a second first down on the Neligh 25.

Palmer then carried the ball in six straight attempts into the center set of the line. His sixth try, from one yard out was good for the touchdown. Meyer made it 28-0 with his placement.

Late in the third quarter, Neligh rambled with a fake punt on fourth down but Reco's pass for a yard loss on a nice tackle by Henegar. Wayne took over on the Neligh 49 and rolled to its fifth score. Palmer's 27-yard burst over right tackle covered most of the distance. Atkins plunged through left guard for the tally.

Threat Stopped: Neligh threatened just before the period ended with the same fake punt. Reco's kick, Gabelman's handoff and skipted to the Wayne 26. Neligh tried two running plays but lost 11 yards and tried to pass.

Don Skeahan intercepted Evans' aerial and the threat ended. Wayne then drove 76 yards for its final tally. Meyer got 22 yards on a pitch out around left end and a double pass. Skeahan to Meyer to Henegar was good for 26 more. Meyer

was credited with the touchdown on a dash around right end from six yards out.

Neligh's reserve backs put some fire into the contest in the 11th minute when Horton emptied his bench. Bob Anderson became the first opponent to cross the Wayne goal line when he circled right end for 43 yards and the score. Neligh's placement was low.

Wayne's regulars returned in the closing minutes and got as far as the Neligh 25 before the contest ended.

Meyer was Wayne's leading ground gainer with 71 yards in 8 rushing attempts. Henegar added 46 yards with three pass catches. Reco's placed Neligh with 72 yards in 14 attempts.

Wayne's defense continued to sparkle. Neligh netted only 29 yards on the ground in the first half and did not complete a single pass during the game. Wayne tied out 18 first downs to seven for the visitors.

## Peru Bobcats Shatter Wayne State Title Hopes Saturday

### Thiesfeldt Leads 28-13 NCC Victory

Dean Thiesfeldt, 215-pound Peru State halfback, all but shattered Wayne State's Wildcat's dream of the 1951 NCC football title Saturday night when he led his mates to a 28-13 triumph over Coach Jack Wink's eleven at Memorial stadium.

The loss was the first for Wayne State in conference play and the Wildcats' first defeat with Hastings for the lopp lead. It was Wayne's second loss in four starts for the season and the second straight on the home field.

Thiesfeldt was prominent in all the visitors' scoring marches. His powerful running led Peru to a 5-0 edge on first downs. The speedy back raked up one tally on a four-yard smash and passed 19 yards for a second.

Wayne never could get its offense clicking. Don Kane scored both Wildcat touchdowns, one on a beautiful 80-yard dash.

Wayne's pass defense again proved its downfall. Peru completed eight of 14 passes for 128 yards and two of the aerials went for touchdowns. A flat pass combination, Wilson to Thiesfeldt, set up all night for the Bobcats. Only in the third period did Wayne effectively stop the Peru attack.

**Fumbles Costly**

The final score is not a true indication of the closeness of the contest, however. But for a rash of Wayne fumbles in the final quarter, the score might have been 14-13. The Wildcats fumbled three times in the last half, two of the bobbles accounting for Peru ties.

Peru drew first blood just after the second period started with quarterback Lory Wilson sneaking over from the two to cap a 70-yard march. A 33-yard pass, Wilson to halfback Jack Gilmore, covered a big part of the drive.

Wayne came right back with the kickoff for 72 yards and a touchdown but Luebe's placement was blocked and the Wildcats trailed 7-6. Don Kane smashed over center for the touchdown after setting up the marker with a 35-yard dash over left tackle.

**Peru Holds 14-6 Edge**

Peru roared back with Argabright's 35-yard kickoff return. Three straight first downs moved the ball to Wayne's 19 where Thiesfeldt flipped a pass to right halfback Tom Hopkins for a touchdown. Wilson's placement gave Peru a 14-6 edge. The half ended that way.

Wayne showed plenty of fire at the opening of the second half and stopped the Bobcat running game. Peru moved to the Wayne 27 but Dean Pearson smeared Wilson for a 12-yard loss on an attempted pass.

How would you like to assemble between 46 and 65 different tiny shells in geometric design on koton for a glass and wooden tray?

Mrs. Russell Preston, southeast of Wayne, did it four times, once for her daughter, Mrs. Walter Stark, key, Ohio, and for three daughters-in-law, Mrs. Leland Preston, Indiana; Mrs. Quentin Preston and Mrs. Merlin Preston.

A few of the colorful marine shells she has used are sand dollars, star fish, turkey, slipper, tooth, chonching shells, slipper, toe nails, robin's egg, coffee, jingle, cat's paw, cat's eye, zebra, lady's ear shells.



**Winters at Florida**  
For the last three winters, Mr. and Mrs. Preston have gone to the west coast of Florida near Ft. Meyer, because of Mr. Preston's health. While there, Mrs. Preston began her hobby and creative hobby of making place cards, nut cups, earrings, pins, necklaces, curtain pulls, trays, dolls, lamps, dresser sets and gun cushions from sea shells.

**Place Cards and Nutcups**  
Place cards and nutcups have been made from scallop shells and decorated with tiny sea shells set were at the Fred Johnson home Sunday afternoon.

In a decorative flower arrangement. One beautifully colored valve and one dull grey or brown one are made of scallops. Yellow, white and orange colors have been used with matching purple, pink and blue decorating the white.

Pins, necklaces and earrings have been crafted in chrysanthemum, rose and cameo designs with all colors used. Clam and scallop shells furnish the materials, and on some chrysanthemums have been placed in the center of each shell, rose, lace murex, the purple fish, has been used in flecklike shapes. Curtain pulls were made by Mrs. Preston of paraffin or netted olive shells.

**Dresser Sets**  
Dresser sets are especially pretty with the tiny shells lining the edges in pearl and pale colors. The jewel box and two powder boxes form the set, of which Mrs. Preston has made about a dozen. She has made lamps out of the white and long angel wing shells. Angel wings are the Florida state shell. The pin cushions have been crafted of scallop shells with the cushion part running down the center. There is a mother wheeling her baby in a buggy, all made of scallop, coffee and shark's eyes shells and pipe cleaners.

**Not Difficult at All**  
Mrs. Preston described her method of procedure in a matter of fact tone, as though it were the simplest thing she has ever done. She told of digging shells which were 18 or 20 inches in the mud out of the bay. The animal is cut out of the shell and it is boiled to rid it of all animal tissue. Acid is applied to the shells to wash them of all stains, so that the clear and ethereal colors of nature may show through. The shells when completely clean are sorted as to size, the type of shell and the amount of holes on the surface.

To make shell roses Mrs. Preston first squeezes out cement on her working surface which is glass or top of a styro can. The tiny chrysanthemum shells are arranged in a circle and more are added to the inside, forming the rose. Before the cement is dry, the roses are slipped off the surface with a razor blade and put into the arrangement desired. A tweezers and long hat pins are Mrs. Preston's working utensils.

The procedure for making a typical chrysanthemum is somewhat like the rose, except for the fact that many more shells are used and they are arranged much more closely. Cotton is placed under the center of the flower to build up the surface more realistically. To copy leaves around the perimeter tagged green garfish scales are used on the edges.

**Weaves Baskets Too**  
Mrs. Preston maintains another hobby: that of weaving pine needles with the aid of raffia into all types of baskets. She loves hobbies and likes to do "anything with the hands." Mr. and Mrs. Preston will leave after completing this year for another winter in Florida.
