

Homecoming Parade Set Saturday Morning

35 Calves Bring Top Price Of 70c Per Pound at Sale

Total of 48 Are Sold to Area Youths

Interest was high and bidding spirited at the annual 4-H and FFA club sale held Thursday night in the Wayne Sales pavilion. A good crowd of buyers and on-lookers were on hand.

Of the 48 calves offered for sale, 35 went to the 70 cents a pound limit. All buyers receive a percentage rebate from the sponsors.

Sponsored by the Wayne Chamber of Commerce and the Wayne county extension service, the sale was open only to 4-H members and prospective county club members.

There were fewer calves sold this year than in the past two years. In 1949 there were 60 auctioned off and last year the total was 76, a record number.

Herefords and Shorthorns

Included in this year's offerings were Hereford and Shorthorns. The calves were purchased from the following ranchers for the sale: Shorthorns, Ernest Thiede, Burton, and Fay Wellon, Colmae S. D. The Herefords were owned by Glenn George, William Ripley and Les Fairhead, all around Springview; and Sam R. Robertson at O'Neill.

Corn Picker Accident Reported

Lincoln—At least one corn picker accident has been reported in Nebraska thus far, and the corn harvest has hardly begun, state agriculture officials announced.

Extension Engineer John C. Steele at the University of Nebraska last week recalled that last week reported corn picker toll in Nebraska was:

Two lives, 194 fingers, 18 hands, 10 arms, one leg, four toes, two feet.

Some other losses probably were not reported. He said that at least 25 other farmers were injured in corn elevator accidents.

Almost every accident, he said was caused by failure to stop the corn picker before attempting to clean out the machine, make adjustments, apply compound, to rollers or to the shaft to use shields over the power shaft.

He suggested that every farmer owning a corn picker should discuss safety measures with his crew daily to try to reduce the accident toll this year.

Corn picking will be in full swing over much of the state within the next week or two.

Recent warm, windy weather has been ideal for drying the corn.

"Our freedom has recently been struck a most dangerous blow!"

With this plain statement of fact Editor Ray McConnell, Jr., of Lincoln Journal explained the meaning of a new executive order issued by President Truman last month. McConnell spoke before a guest night audience of the Wayne Woman's club Thursday evening at the Wayne city auditorium.

"An executive order from the White House on Sept. 25 extended to all civilian agencies of government the same rules of restraint now in effect for defense agencies," he continued.

"It is censorship at the source." The Lincoln editor returned a week ago from a nation-wide Associated Press meeting of editorial executives at San Francisco. The new executive order was under fire by the entire group, there, he said. "Facilities; Public Attend."

"American Citizenship" was the title of the guest night meeting sponsored by the Wayne club. All school faculty members here, as the public, were invited.

McCConnell pointed out that the present trend of all our governments, from city and county to the federal, has been toward decisions by small groups or committees. The individual has become less important, and he stated "we need recognize and understand the ineffectiveness of the individual human being."

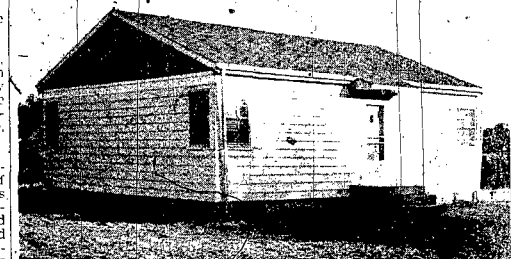

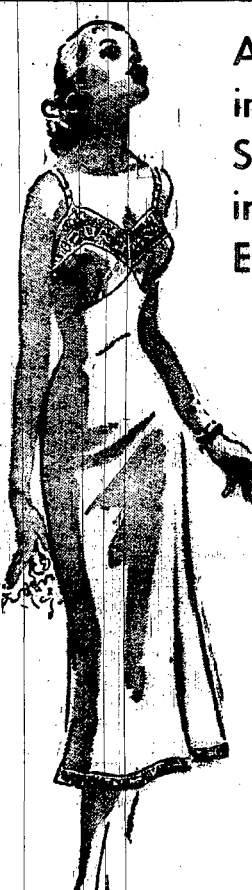

Doll Designing Is Favorite Pastime of Mrs. Kingston

It seems a bit dissociated that the mother of two typical boys would nurture the hobby of doll making, but Mrs. Jack Kingston has worked at the hobby with dogged persistence for four years. The start of her hobby came about one day while she was leafing through a crepe paper design booklet. She took the idea from the booklet but began designing her own dolls to make an easier method and shortcut in the construction.

The first pair she did, the first day of her pastime, consisted of women carollers sharing a large hymn book. The heads were larger with coarser features on her first ones, and she has them down, changing the features and dresses. These were made for Christmas decorations to give to friends as a different present. She has also used them as gifts for the girls in her sons' classes and as presents to shut-in children. Little girls love them, and it is possible that big girls love them too!

Doll Construction
The 98 dolls she has made are all basically made the same. The first step toward a crepe paper doll is to roll crepe paper into a tight and workable section for the body. A shorter piece of rolled crepe paper is used for the arms and they are wired on in the design of a miniature cross. The head may be added at this point or at the end of the process. However, for the head a cotton wad is rolled in crepe paper with the seam at the back. It is wired snugly so that features may be drawn on the smooth surface. Hair may be made of yarn, crepe hair rats or silk thread, and it is stitched on in swirling designs or coiffures. The hat may be put on with the hair or may be left until the last step.

Faces Difficult
Mrs. Roy Corvell drew on the first faces until Mrs. Kingston learned how. The faces are difficult to mold on the flat surface, there are no indentations by which to sketch by. The face is painted and sketched in and the head goes on next over the top nubbins left by the roll of body. Mrs. Kingston remarked that it is very necessary to put the head on at the right angle, not too high nor too low.

Cotton Padding
The very stiff skirt with gathered ruffles of crepe paper are set on the body so that the doll will stand. The dressing of the doll is completed after cotton padding is put in the body to give it shape. This is applied during the molding of crepe on cotton.

Various Trimming
Trimming for dresses include everything from discarded earrings to cake decoration. Other trimmings are rhinestones, flowers, scraps of ribbon, lace, glitter and beads. There is a new type of crepe paper now called velour which looks much like velvet and deep-pled materials.

Mrs. Kingston loves nothing more than "get into someone's scrap bag." The least little scrap helps her dolls to look more realistic. As she designs one dress, another always comes to her mind and she can't seem to wait until she finishes the one she is doing. She is very fond of designing different coiffures for her dolls; some are short, some long, some piled high, all with different hair colors.

Other Pastimes
The Wayne hobbyist loves pastimes and has such a vigorous enthusiasm that she immediately wants to try her best. Besides the time-consuming doll-making hobby, she crochets, embroiders, makes sachets and artificial flowers, and has worked at figurine and textile painting. She made a Victorian set-

ting picture in primitive artistic method which adorns one wall in her home.
Mrs. Kingston made a doll recently for Christmas. She is aiming at a yard tall and she holds a hymn book in her hands. Wayne residents may look ahead to seeing a clever Christmas arrangement outside of the Kingston door this 1951 season.

Wayne State's Wildcats, who were jolted off their perch at the top of NCC ladder two weeks ago by Peru, will have a chance to climb back a little closer Saturday afternoon when they tangle with the Hastings Broncos in the Homecoming classic in Memorial stadium.

The Broncos spoiled the Wildcats 16-game conference winning streak last year at Hastings, 7-0, an upset which did as much as anything to push the Teachers out of the conference championship. In the 10 games with the Hastings squad which Wayne has played since 1938, the Wildcats have taken six, the Broncos 4.

Hastings is sharing the top spot in NCC play with the Peru Bobcats having defeated Chadron, Kearney, Midland and Nebraska Wesleyan. The difference between the two teams is that Hastings has the three tough squads—Wayne, Peru, and Doane—yet to meet, while Peru should have easy going from now on out.
