### Qualification Tests Due For Students

Lincoln Brigadier General Guy N. Henninger, Nebraska Director of Selective Service, today reminded college students who have not previously taken the college qualification test that the deadline for filing application blanks for the new series of Selective Service College Qualification tests is fast approaching and he stressed the importance of all eligible students taking the test if they intend to apply for deferment as students.

The test dates in the second series are Dec. 13, 1951 and April 24, 1952. Blank may be obtained by the registrant in any local board office.

Gen. Henninger said that students whose academic year will end in January of 1952 are urged to apply for the Dec. 13 test, so they will have scores in their files when the local boards consider their cases in January. He indicated that those who do not have test score results in their cover sheets may have "a difficult time indeed" in convincing their local boards that they should be deferred as students. A total of 339,000 students took the first series of tests given last spring and summer.

Gen. Henninger said, and 63 per cent received scores of 70 or better.

Application blanks for the Dec. 13, 1951 test must be postmarked not later than midnight, Monday, Nov. 5, 1951. Applications for the April 24, 1952 test must be postmarked not later than midnight, March 10, 1952.

Students in this area will take the tests at the Wayne State Teachers college.

### Specialist Explains New Feeding Methods at Wisner

Wisner—"You're outstanding in the herd business," Howard Gramlich told the group attending the Wisner Feeders banquet, "and your business is sound because beef is the choice article in our diets," he asserted.

"However," the Agriculture agent for the Chicago North western railroad stated, "you have to forget about that spread between feeders and fat cattle."

"Operate so you can sell your finished animals for about what you pay for your feeders." "You can do it by cutting down on labor and running the cattle in the fields," the specialist claimed.

A couple of processes used profitably by feeders in Illinois. One was cutting corn while it is green; piling it on the ground and packing it for later use as feed. The second was a new method of processing alfalfa. Illinois farmers harvest alfalfa with field cutters; pile it on the ground to pack it. You have a wonderful grass silage and the weather is no problem during the hay season, Gramlich stated.

Discussing profits from feeding grain to livestock, said "You can't figure a one-year operation; you must figure five or 10 years to get an accurate picture."

The agriculture specialist reported over 500 car loads of feeder cattle had been unloaded in Wisner in the past 60 days.

### Nordberg Company Gets Order

At a special meeting Tuesday night, the city council unanimously approved the bid of the Nordberg Manufacturing company, Milwaukee, Wis., for a new dual fuel engine for the Wayne light and power plant.

City Clerk Walter Bressler reported the contract for payment of \$186,530 upon installation of the unit. The project will be completed in about 10 months.

The contract calls for installation of a 1750 horsepower Nordberg dual fuel generating unit that will produce 1225 kilowatts per hour using a General Electric generator. The super-charged unit operates at 327 R.P.M. and can be stepped up to produce 1500 kilowatts.

Installation will include complete auxiliaries, a cooling system, extension and switchboard arrangements.

A week ago at their regular meeting, the council did not make any decision upon the five bids submitted for examination. After considerable discussion, it was decided to let Consultant Engineer H. S. Nixon, Omaha, tabulate and evaluate each bid for the special meeting.

Bids from other companies were: Exline Diesel Engine Works, Salina, Kan., \$168,665; Enterprise Engine and Machinery, San Francisco, \$182,025; Fairbanks-Morse, Lowell, Wis., \$174,263; and Worthington Pump and Machinery, Buffalo, N. Y., \$185,285.

The smaller bids were for units of 1000 kilowatt capacity. The Worthington, a similar plant, was considered, but the Nordberg was chosen because it is a slower speed engine.

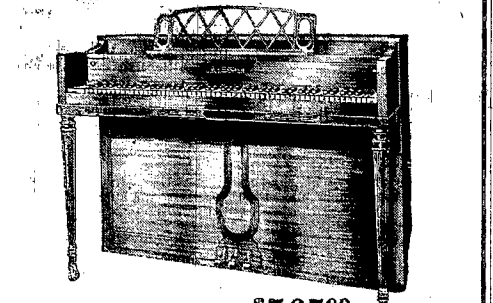

## AAUW Hears Student from Germany Talk

At a dinner in the Student Union dining room last Thursday evening, members and guests of the AAUW heard a talk by a young German who has been in this country only four weeks.

The young man, Reimer Amussen, is one of 300 exchange students studying in this country. He is a student at Midland college in Fremont and though he speaks only a short time his command of the English language is adequate. He thanked Americans for making it possible for him to come to this country to study.

His topic was "Germany and the International Relations in Europe." He made every effort to portray situations in regard to his country and to other countries in a completely unbiased manner.

He said it is an illusion to say that the situation in Germany is one of peace. He told of struggles to overcome the ravages of war and to establish and maintain themselves in good relations with other countries.

He described the type and strength of the various political parties of Germany. He looks at the idea of "cold war" with folly. He told of the ravages of war and people must make between affiliation with the Atlantic Pact or with a united Europe.

Mr. Amussen said that German workers are supposed to work more than any other persons in Europe. He said the Germans, along with the Scandinavians, are a higher standard of living than do the people of any other country of Europe. The German people, he said, own more cars than they did in 1939. They are rebuilding their country faster than are other countries, especially France.

Of Russia, he said, "If they were a majority of Europe, they could easily fight war against the United States for ten years." He told of their efforts to get the atom weapon material.

Tito, he said, would not wish to ally himself with Russia for then, in case of war, he would become a mere puppet.

He commended the attitudes and actions of the majority of American soldiers in Germany and admired them for their freedom from

snobishness and for their friendliness. He thanked Americans for sending CARE packages and corn at a time when Germans were dying by the hundreds from starvation, and is sorry to say that Germans like all mankind, forget only too soon the kindness but remember too long the unkindness.

He said that the young of Germany, along with a few prominent German leaders, have a greater desire to join the western world against Russia. They desire a united Europe for they are sick of the Europe that has known only war and tribulation for so many years.

# Wildcats Trip Hastings 19-6 to Stay in NCC Race

## Passes Set Up Pair of Touchdowns

Playing before 3,500 wildly cheering homecoming fans, Wayne State's Wildcats ground out a 19-6 victory over Hastings Broncos in a vital Nebraska College conference tilt Saturday afternoon at Memorial stadium.

The victory, coupled with Kearney's upset victory over Peru, enabled Wayne to again gain a tie for the top in the loop standings. Wayne had played one less game than Peru and Hastings so the Wildcats are still in second place percentage-wise.

Wayne was forced to rally from a 6-0 deficit midway in the second period to take the victory. Hastings outplayed the Wildcats during the first minutes of the game and seemed destined for a win until Wayne came up with an improved pass defense.

Three players figured in the scoring column for Wayne—Bud Megraw, Don Kane and Rollie Gast. While improving its own pass defense, Wayne came up with a potent aerial attack of its own.

A pass interception set up the Bronco's only touchdown in the second quarter. Neal Hoppens stole Luebe's pass on the Wayne 45 and raced to the 24. Straight line plays carried the ball over the line in 10 plays with Rob Hart going over from one yard out. Stickle's placement was wide.

Wayne came right back with the next kickoff and marched 66 yards for a touchdown. A pass interference ruling against Hastings gave Wayne a first and 10 on the visitors' 27 and set up the score.

Butch Ohlund dropped a perfect pass in the arms of Bud Megraw in the end zone on the next play for the tying score. The half ended two minutes after Luebe's placement was wide.

Wayne took little time in assuming command of the game as the second half started. Hastings was held with the kickoff and Stickle's punt went out of bounds on the Wayne 39.

Two running plays netted nothing but Luebe's pass to Duane Pearson was good for 27 and a first and 10 on the Bronco's 34.

Kane and Ohlund made it first down on the 19 and two more running plays moved the ball to the 13. Kane slashed over right tackle and reversed his field on the next play for the tally. Luebe's placement again was wide.

John Villeco, starting his first game at tackle, aided in setting up the next Wayne tally after the kickoff. He sneared Chuck Cordeur on the Hastings eight and the Bronco couldn't work out of that hole. Stickle's kick gave Wayne the ball on the visitors' 40.

Wayne scored eight plays later with Rollie Gast bulling over left guard for the touchdown. Luebe's placement was good to make it 19-6.

Hastings moved to the Wayne 27 late in the fourth period but time ran out before the Bronco's could push the ball across.

Special activities highlighted the pre-game and halftime programs. Dr. John D. Rice, new president of WSTC, offered the welcome and Queen Mary Jean Roeder, Hartington, was crowned by members of the Katz club. She also received a football autographed by members of the 1951 Wayne State squad.

The national anthem was played by the Wayne State band in a mass concert with the 13 visiting high school bands.

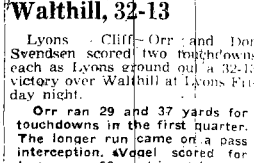

### Farm Scrap Metal Drive Announced

Farmers in the United States have been asked by the Agricultural Mobilization committee to cooperate in every way possible with the nation's drive to gather all available scrap for steel production so essential in defense mobilization.

At the request of the National Production Authority, the Department of Agriculture is lending its support to the drive and is using its facilities for informing farmers about scrap needs.

The Wayne County Agricultural Mobilization committee is asking farmers in this community to cooperate in rounding up scrap this fall and selling it to scrap dealers. Steel mills are operating with a dangerously short supply of scrap and in order to supply the requirements for civilian and army production, it is important that as much scrap be turned in as possible.

Collecting scrap around the farm is a clean-up job which makes for neatness and efficient working conditions.

The primary need is for scrap items containing iron and steel. Some other metals, such as copper and lead, can be used, however. No household scrap drive is contemplated at this time.

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### Buying Civilization?

Many years ago, the late Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes said that he found pleasure in paying his taxes. "With this I buy civilization," he observed.

We live in a very different age today. Less and less of our tax money goes to buy those goods and services which make for true civilization. More and more of it goes to buy the implements of war, old and new, which, if ever unleashed in their full fury, may very well destroy civilization itself.

In the world of the present, this is an unavoidable tragedy. But that tragedy is needlessly compounded by the ever-increasing spending of the people's money for purposes and projects which have no bearing on the national defense and security, which weaken our institutions and undermine our liberties, and which, finally, tend to deplete our savings by creating more inflation and cheaper dollars.

The leaders of our government tell us that we must pay more taxes in the name of national survival—that all must "sacrifice." But—save for a handful of honorable exceptions to a sorry rule—none of them say that the government too must "sacrifice," by eliminating every expenditure which is not clearly and directly essential. They tell us that the "business as usual" philosophy must be abandoned. But what about the infinitely more dangerous "politics as usual" philosophy?

During this new fiscal year, federal, state and local spending will account for about one-third of the national income. And still the staggering waste goes on.

### History Repeats Itself

One of the best of Dorothy Thompson's recent newspaper columns dealt with the workings of the Office of Price Stabilization controls. Miss Thompson laid special stress on the meat problem, pointing out that OPS policies have caused severe shortages in various parts of the country.

Then she said, "Normally speaking, the law of supply and demand influences prices. Where supply exceeds demand, prices fall; where supply is short and demand high, they rise. But where a commodity which has become a standard article of consumption disappears from the market, persons outside the market will supply it to those willing to pay. OPS measures have contributed to bring about short supply and the disappearance of beef into illegal channels."

"You certainly cannot reduce prices by creating artificial scarcities."

In the course of her article Miss Thompson also observed that black market suppliers are buying new-born bull calves at auction at fantastically high prices. After the animals are raised to marketable size, it would be utterly impossible to sell the meat at the legal figure. So, inevitably, this meat will flow into under-the-counter channels—and the average family will not be able to buy it.

History repeats itself, and this time OPS is repeating the history of OPA in almost exact detail. The black market is back, and is growing. People are having to go without things they want, because they can't find them in the legal market. Production is being discouraged in vital fields. That always happens when government runs the economy.

### Excusable

When you're in the tub or taking a nap, and the call turns out to be a wrong number, profanity is excusable.

### A Billion Dollars

Thinking of wealth or taxes in terms of dollars leads to vagueness and confusion because no one can comprehend the magnitude of a billion, whether it be in dollars or cents, unless it would be members of congress. But that does not seem likely the way they toss billions around.

It is estimated that a million dollars in one-thousand-dollar bills would make a stack about ten inches high.

A billion dollars in one-thousand-dollar bills would therefore make a stack 10,000 inches high which, reduced to feet, would be 833 feet. Few skyscrapers tower so high.

A late recorded estimate of the national debt was \$267 billion, or a mighty tall building.

A recent statement given in congress reports that 18 states were suddenly called upon to pay their per capita share of the national debt, they could not do it.

The assessed valuation of all the property in each of the 38 states was not sufficient to cover each state's share of the debt.

And yet, the spending goes on—by the billions.
