

Economic Situation

Even though the index of prices received by farmers in the United States is apparently leveling off, Production Chief Charles Wilson is cautioning us that strong inflationary pressures are in store for the nation this winter and spring. The principle reason for expecting more inflation this coming year is because of greater defense

The first year of armament was primarily devoted to planning and contract letting. Military production is now beginning to get under way, and this means that huge sums of money are being pumped into the income stream of the nation while at the same time more and more materials are being directed away from consumer pro-

duction. The result is that the public will be able and willing to buy more goods and services, but there will be less to buy. As the demand increases and the supply falls off, prices are expected to continue to climb.

Land Price Trends

The dollar value of farm real estate in Nebraska reached an index of 157 (1912-14-100) in July, 1951. This price level was 3% above March, 1951. For the nation as a whole the average increase was 5%.

In certain regions land prices advanced noticeably, while in other regions there has been no appreciable change. Colorado prices made one of the more rapid increases for the period,

March to July 31, 1951. New England states reported only slight average increases, with Maine reporting no change. In Iowa, Illoinois and other

Those over-all price changes in real estate have not been spectacular. In local areas distinct advances have been made. By and large, the present price rise has not been so pronounced as dur-ing World War II where land prices advanced at an average of 12% per year.

Low Grades Selling High

There has been sufficient activity in the land market to provide opportunity for the sale of low quality farms. The best available information indi-

cates that a larger-than-usual per cent of farms sold in the period July, 1950, to August 1, 1951, are rated as of lower than average productivity. This situation is typical of periods characterized by above-average activity.

Non-Farmer Buying Increasing

Purchases of farms by non-farmers has increased from 28.4% of total sales

in March, 1950, to 32.1% in March, 1951. There is a corresponding increase in the number of non-resident purchasers.

In transfers involving credit, down payments were slightly larger than in most previous years. West North Central states, of which Nebraska is a part, report a decline in the ratio of debt to total purchase price of from 53% in 1950 to 51% in 1951. This development suggests that a larger than usual per cent of purchasers made substantial

cash down payments. In spite of this fact a continuous increase is occurring in total farm mortgage indebtedness.

Government Restrictions Felt

The reduction in the supply of mort-gage funds brought about by the Treasury-Federal Reserve agreement of March, 1951, may restrict farm pur-chases in some areas. Its effects have already been felt in the urban real estate market. The Voluntary Credit Restraint Program, sponsored by the Federal Reserve Board, is voluntarily restricting its loaning operations. This may also have some effect on farm land

Prices received by farmers for farm products exert a strong influence. It is now widely assumed that the general level of prices received by farmers will not change greatly in the period im-mediately ahead. But it does appear that prospects of high farm incomes for the remainder of 1951 will exert inflationary pressure which is expected to cause farm land values to continue to rise. In addition, the large reserve of liquid assets on deposit in country banks will continue to prevent any fall in farm land prices. These demand deposits in country towns with a popula-tion of less than 15,000 averaged 47 higher in June, 1951, than a year ago.

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

Unusual Situation

Last week, this reporter heard a rather tounding remark made by City Clerk alter Bressler.

When questioned how Wayne would pay for the new generating unit that had been purchased for the city light and power plant, Bressler stated there would be almost enough money in the city coffers to meet the \$186,530 bill upon installation of the unit.

stallation of the unit.

This, to the Herald's staff member, was unbelievable. A member of this reporter's family was a city official in the home town, and he used to come home mumbling to flimself after an evening at the city hall where money was transferred from one fund to another to meet the city debts.

Most towns are in dire need of money to maintain present city programs, without handling expansion projects. Bonds would have to be floated and the tax levy increased to meet payment of a bill totaling nearly \$200,000.

But here in Wayne, this is not so. Appar-

But here in Wayne, this is not so. Apparently the city has had a sound financial program through the years which has primarily been supported by the light and power plant.

Clerk Bressler reported the city's various funds are in good shape. Every month money from light plant earnings is put into an insurance and deprecation fund.

The money put into these funds has accumulated and now it is ready to be spent on an expansion program to give the citizens of Wayne better light and power—without added taxation. So it is the city fathers have the necessary funds to pay for the new Nordberg engine.

That about wraps up the situation, but not quite. It is the Herald's opinion that congratulations are in order to the farsighted city officials who through the years have kept Wayne on a sound financial footing.

Flood Control

The disastrous Kansas floods of last summer were apparently regarded as something of a boon by the propagandists for a huge and incredibly bostly system of so-called multi-purpose dams, which, according to theory, would conserve the land, stop floods, and produce great quantities of electric power all at the same time.

As a result, the Army Engineers' Pick-Sloan plan is being pushed once more. If the dams included in this grandiose scheme had been in existence, it is argued, all would have been well and little or no damage, would have been done.

That has an appealing sound—but what are the facts of the case?

Leslie A. Miller, a former governor of Wyoming and chairman of the Hoover Commission Task Force on Natural Resources, is an authority on such matters. According to his survey of the flood, if all of the dams in the Pick-Sloan plan had been in operation they would have had virtually no effect on the floods.

had virtually no effect on the floods.

Another, and highly objective authority can also be consulted—the weatherman. A recent leaflet issued by Wildlife Management Institute says: "The official report of the United States Weather Bureau shows that the heavy rainfall which caused the Kansas City flood damage was centered directly over the lower watershed of the Kansas river. The Pick-Sloan plan proposed dumerous expensive linpoundments on the tributaries of the Kansas, but not one of these dams would have protected Kansas City from the heavy nunoff if all had been completed on the Fourth of July when the downpour began."

The "big dam" idea is basically politi-

the downpour began."

The "big dam" idea is basically political. Scientific survey after scientific survey has proven that reat flood control must be accomplished on the land itself, and on small tributary streams with systems of relatively inexpensive reservoirs. The big dams are often 100 per cent worthless as a deterrent to floods—for the reason that they must be kept full of water in order to produce power.

Last summer's floods were a tragedy. But the Pick-Sloan plan is not the answer, nor is any other big-dam scheme, according to Miller.
