A rebate of 31 per cent has been mailed to each 4-H club member who purchased a club calf at the Chamber of Commerce sale held Oct. 11.

A limit of 70 cents had been set as top bid on the calves. When the bid reached the limit, all members desiring to buy a particular calf drew lots to determine the actual purchaser.

After rebate, the 70 cent calves cost 48.3 cents per pound.

The sale is sponsored annually by the Chamber of Commerce agricultural committee and County Extension service, as a means of getting good calves to all club feeders in the county.

Gov. Val Peterson Files For '52 Senatorial Race

Lincoln - Val Peterson, serving his third term as Governor, filed Wednesday morning as a candidate for the Republican nomination for the United States Senate.

The 48-year-old governor, recently elected chairman of the National Governor's conference, will seek the senate seat held by Hugh Butler. The primary election is April 1, 1952.

One of the most vigorous chief executives in the state's history, Governor Peterson said he would dedicate himself to fighting for world peace.

"The hope of peace lies in keeping America strong," the Governor said, "and by working constructively with the people of the world to prevent war."

He pledged himself to combat the financial irresponsibilities of the present national administration which he charges is destroying the dollar so rapidly that savings and retirement programs of a generation are being wiped out.

Chosen for a three-year term on the State Executive committee of the association was Dr. M. E. Tempco, dean of the college, who just completed his term as president of District III.

O. F. Moeke, professor of education at Wayne State, was elected secretary of District III, filling the vacancy left by Neal A. Grubb, superintendent of schools at Tilden.

Mr. Grubb was elected vice president.

Other new officers chosen were Richard E. Johnson, Wausa, president, and Ruth A. Wagner, Pender, secretary.

Olson and Harrison Nominated

A Norfolk oil man and Fremont mayor will vie for the Third district's vacant Congressional seat in a special election Dec. 4.

R. D. Harrison, Norfolk businessman, and Carl F. Olson, Fremont mayor, were nominated by the Republicans and Democrats, respectively, in meetings at Columbus and Norfolk.

The election was brought about by the death of Karl Stefan, Norfolk Republican last month.

Harrison, a late entry in the race, was nominated by the GOP at the 13th ballot cast at Columbus. The vote was 11-10 and gave him the call over 11 other hopeful candidates. Merle Hayes, South Sioux City, opposed Harrison on the 12th ballot.

The Democrats took little time with their selection. Olson bested Hugo Erb, Dodge, clerk of the Nebraska legislature, 44-42 on the first ballot. A later motion made the vote unanimous.

At Columbus, Harrison, a strong in all the balloting, defeated Senator Dwight Burney, Harrison, and Alfred V. Raun, Walthill. Were the other top vote getters. In the final ballot, a three-way tie resulted between Harrison, Raun and Hayes. Raun lost in the tie-breaking vote.

University Graduate
The Norfolk man, 34, said he intends to spend all of his time on the job if elected. He is married to the former Mary A. Sifton, from Panama, Neb. His education includes a master's degree from the University of Nebraska. He is a veteran; has served on the school board and Chamber of Commerce.

Mayor Olson was nominated in Fremont by L. Pospisil, Schuyler, who withdrew from the race. Olson is a re-elected democratic mayor in a strong Republican city. He is a development director at Midland college.

In the balloting Antelope, Dodge, Dixon, Knox, Pierce, Madison, Stanton, Thurston and Wayne counties voted unanimously for Olson.

This total is over 100 greater than at the same time two years ago when the present expiration procedure was adopted. In 1949, 4,816 were sold.


Treasurer Boyd stated it would not be many county motorists without a license by the deadline on Thursday.

Alec Templeton, Wales-born, blind pianist, will be featured in the first of the Wayne Community Concert series Wednesday, Nov. 7, at Wayne municipal auditorium at 8 p.m.

The concert is one of three to be held in Wayne for season ticket holders. There will be no single admissions, but guests may bring out-of-town guests for \$1.75 plus 25¢ tax.

Templeton was born in Cardiff, Wales, and began studying music at the age of four. He was tutored by Margaret Humphrey, whose golden jubilee as teacher he recently celebrated with a benefit concert in her honor. At sixteen he successfully passed entrance examinations to London's Royal College of Music, not only winning a scholarship, but recording the highest grades in the annals of the college. He also studied at London Academy of Music.

NEBRASKA FARM OUTLOOK

(The MONTHLY FARM OUTLOOK is reprinted from Notes on Nebraska Farm Business, a monthly publication of the Department of Agricultural Economics, Agricultural Extension Service, College of Agriculture, University of Nebraska, Lincoln. This authoritative report is reprinted each month by the State National Bank of Wayne as a service to our customers and friends.)

Economic Situation

Even though the index of prices received by farmers in the United States is apparently leveling off, Production Chief Charles Wilson is cautioning us that strong inflationary pressures are in store for the nation this winter and spring. The principle reason for expecting more inflation this coming year is because of greater defense spending.

The first year of armament was primarily devoted to planning and contract letting. Military production is now beginning to get under way, and this means that huge sums of money are being pumped into the income stream of the nation while at the same time more and more materials are being directed away from consumer pro-

duction. The result is that the public will be able and willing to buy more goods and services, but there will be less to buy. As the demand increases and the supply falls off, prices are expected to continue to climb.

Beef control fight is not over yet. Shortages are becoming apparent. Decontrols on some food stuffs may start soon.

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in March, 1950, to 32.1% in March, 1951. There is a corresponding increase in the number of non-resident purchasers.

In transfers involving credit, down payments were slightly larger than in most previous years. West North Central states, of which Nebraska is a part, report a decline in the ratio of debt to total purchase price of from 53% in 1950 to 51% in 1951. This development suggests that a larger than usual per cent of purchasers made substantial

cash down payments. In spite of this fact a continuous increase is occurring in total farm mortgage indebtedness.

Government Restrictions Felt

The reduction in the supply of mortgage funds brought about by the Treasury-Federal Reserve agreement of March, 1951, may restrict farm purchases in some areas. Its effects have already been felt in the urban real estate market. The Voluntary Credit Restraint Program, sponsored by the Federal Reserve Board, is voluntarily restricting its loaning operations. This may also have some effect on farm land prices.

Prices received by farmers for farm products exert a strong influence. It is now widely assumed that the general level of prices received by farmers will not change greatly in the period immediately ahead. But it does appear that prospects of high farm incomes for the remainder of 1951 will exert inflationary pressure which is expected to cause farm land values to continue to rise. In addition, the large reserve of liquid assets on deposit in country banks will continue to prevent any fall in farm land prices. These demand deposits in country towns with a population of less than 15,000 averaged 4% higher in June, 1951, than a year ago.



Unusual Situation Last week, this reporter heard a rather astounding remark made by City Clerk Walter Bressler.

When questioned how Wayne would pay for the new generating unit that had been purchased for the city light and power plant, Bressler stated there would be almost enough money in the city coffers to meet the \$186,530 bill upon installation of the unit.

This, to the Herald's staff member, was unbelievable. A member of this reporter's family was a city official in the home town, and he used to come home mulling to himself after an evening at the city hall where money was transferred from one fund to another to meet the city debts.

Most towns are in dire need of money to maintain present city programs, without handling expansion projects. Bonds would have to be floated and the tax levy increased to meet payment of a bill totaling nearly \$200,000.

But here in Wayne, this is not so. Apparently the city has a sound financial program through the years which has primarily been supported by the light and power plant.

Clerk Bressler reported the city's various funds are in good shape. Every month money from light plant earnings is put into an insurance and depreciation fund.

The money put into these funds has accumulated and now it is ready to be spent on an expansion program to give the citizens of Wayne better light and power—without added taxation. So it is the city fathers have the necessary funds to pay for the new Nordberg engine.

That about wraps up the situation, but not quite. It is the Herald's opinion that congratulations are in order to the far-sighted city officials who through the years have kept Wayne on a sound financial footing.

Every hobby is in a sense creative because an individual desire is needed to single out items to collect or make, but there is a magic touch needed in the art of painting. The work of some artists shows the sensitiveness of having been painted with a magic wand. The paintings of Mrs. W. H. Phillips are like that.


Finished 50 Paintings
She began painting 50 years ago because she wanted "to be busy." Her first painting was entitled "Coast of Capri" with the shore line of the Isle of Capri featured. Since that time she has finished over 50 paintings and has 18 still unfinished in her basement. There has given many away, but there are several examples of her varied painting subjects hanging in her home.

Mrs. Phillips paints primarily in a typical Rembrandt manner, brushing rich dark backgrounds into the sparkling subjects. A good example of this technique is "Coast of Cornwall," a scene echoing the stormy cold sea lapping against the English shore. Everything in the picture is cold-toned with blues and greens, except a small portion of sky and a bright section of the rocky shore which are bright warm pink.

"Sunset" has a sleepy twilight atmosphere with chopped feathery clouds, yellow-toned above the brilliant red sun. The pond and inlet near the foreground reflect the shimmering sun and the knotted grass and woody growth are catching their last shadows of sunset for the day. Also vividly colored is "The Stag at Sunset" done in reds, pinks, corals, tans, oranges and browns.

Cactus Plants and Roses
A charming barnyard scene shows a flock of chickens of every breed. The scene took Mrs. Phillips several months to complete. There is a painting of a cactus plant which shows intricate brush-work and a canvas in her bedroom features roses. Bees circle around the four completely realistic white, pink and red roses, with a blue-green background.

Crochets Too
Mrs. Phillips ceased painting four years ago but hopes to pick up where she left off one of these days. She has other versatile interests including crocheting, collecting brass and old furniture, and playing the piano. Her crocheting includes two banquet cloths with runners to match. An ecru one, pattern "Cathedral Windows" took her eight months working 10 hours every day. The other cloth, "Rose Filet," took six months working 10 hours a day. Her extensive brass collection has been accumulated over a period of 20 years, and also illustrates that Mrs. Phillips is a connoisseur of cultural things.



Born in Holland Mrs. Phillips was born in Holland and lived there almost seven years. Thus she has actually viewed the scene she has painted. Mrs. Phillips goes excellent in her crochets. One is a Dutch scene with greenish sky and water, with shades on the beach. Sailboats of a variety of pinks and reds give the painting added brilliance. Another marine picture also has coldness expressed in the sky and water with warm colored rigging on the sailboat.

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

Blue Devils Blast Scribner, 48-6, for Seventh Win

Wayne Nets Seven TD's In 11 Tries

Wayne had control of the game from the opening kickoff and completely outclassed the hapless Scribner squad. The Blue Devils scored four touchdowns in the first half before Scribner was able to make a first down.

Wayne had possession of the ball 11 times during the contest and scored eight times. One of the touchdowns was called back by a penalty.

Coach Lloyd Horton emptied his bench in the second and fourth quarters in an attempt to hold down the score. Wayne's seconds allowed most of the yardage marked up by the visitors and allowed the single Scribner tally.

Outside of an 82-yard touchdown play, Scribner gained only 45 yards from scrimmage against the rugged Wayne defense. The visitors gathered only five yards rushing in the second half.
