Requisites For Corn Storage Set

Storage requirements for corn offered for loan under the 1951 support program have been announced by the Nebraska PMA State committee according to T. P. Roberts, Wayne county PMA official. The following requirements must be met:

All temporary cribs must have a floor supported above the ground to allow ventilation under the crib and must have a permanent type roof of wood or metal supported above the corn to allow ventilation.

Storage in drive-ways and double cribs must have ventilated floor space and double walls on both sides of the drive-way.

Good for Two Years

All cribs must be substantial enough to provide for proper storage for at least two years should there be a re-storing program.

It is the responsibility of the producer to keep the commodity under seal in proper condition.

Corn Being Fed as It Is Picked

Farmers are going to be "disappointed in the yield" of this year's corn crop, County PMA chairman T. P. Roberts stated earlier this week. County Agent Harold Ingalls reaffirmed the statement.

Weather during the past weeks has not been favorable for yielding out corn and so far very little corn has been cribbed. Most farmers who have cribbed corn are using mechanical driers to prevent spoilage. On cold mornings the ears of corn are brittle and break up going through the machine.

Moisture content of most of the corn is much too high for safe cribbing.

Roberts reported tests he ran for farmers varied from 21 to 28 percent with the bulk ranging around 25 per cent. Moisture content should not exceed above 20 percent for safe cribbing.

Cribs 4,000 Bushel

Fred Johnson, Pender, is one of the few farmers picking and cribbing his corn crop. Johnson has cribbed about 4,000 bushels Roberts stated. He is using mechanical driers. Estimated yield was 60 bushels an acre.

Most of the picking so far has been to immediate feeding. According to the PMA chairman, farmers are picking their corn first and piling it near hog pens for feed.

So far this year, no new corn has been reported for sale on the Omaha market. Several car loads are generally offered for sale by this time of the year.

1951 Corn Price Set At \$1.51

The price support for the 1951 corn crop in Wayne county will be \$1.51 County PMA chairman T. P. Roberts announced Tuesday.

This is 12 cents less than more than last year's support by the present government program.

The 1951 price will not be permitted to drop below this mark but may go above it. Earlier this year's corn price was set at \$1.45 but it was revised upward after it was found the October parity price had risen. The price is determined on basis of 90 percent of farm parity.

Support prices in surrounding counties are: Dixon and Dakota, \$1.52; and Pierce, \$1.50. These prices are for number three yellow corn.

Forgotten War?
It's Korea become the "forgotten" war? Will it go on indefinitely, with its heavy casualties, and with little or no chance for us to win a decisive victory?

Those somber questions are raised in an article in a late issue of U.S. News & World Report. The magazine said: "Korea, half-forgotten, is receding in the minds of many to the status of an experimental war, one being fought back and forth for the purpose of testing men, weapons, materials and methods, on a continuing basis."

No effort is being made or planned to win a clear military victory. New U. S. ground forces, which could help drive the enemy out of Korea, are being sent to Europe. U. S. bombers, which could seriously weaken the enemy by bombing his bases outside of Korea, are still kept below the Yalu. The U. S., faced with a third-rate enemy, has fought for 15 months with no prospect of a military victory in sight.

The Korean casualties have been enormous. During those first 15 months we suffered more than 14,000 killed, about 60,000 wounded, and nearly 11,000 missing. Our allies took heavy losses too. What has happened to the civilian population of South Korea is beyond description. The fighting, the cold, hunger and disease have taken an incredible toll. The cities and the villages have been razed and burned.

On the credit side, as credits go in war, Korea has enabled us to build up a magnificent army and to school it in new and often revolutionary tactics. Everyone who has seen this army has had only the highest praise for it. From General Ridgway's high command down to the last private in a frozen foxhole. Morale is magnificent, and the troops' fighting qualities, both as individuals and in units, are superb. And Korea has led to the development of vastly improved traditional weapons. It is all very different from the dreadful early days, when a handful of ill-equipped, inadequately trained troops attempted the impossible and were all but wiped out.

Korea has also taught the military some vital facts about modern war. As an example, U. S. News observes, "Air power of the latest type is turning out to be of limited effectiveness against a determined enemy. A large U. S. force without real opposition has been unable to block enemy supply lines. Railroads, after more than a year of bombing, are still running in North Korea. Recent air battles indicate, too, that jet planes are very difficult to shoot down—an important lesson for U. S. air defense."

The situation has been further complicated, in the grimmest possible way, by the announcement that the Russians have exploded another atomic bomb, probably in the Siberian fastness. This has once again raised the question of whether the final destiny of unhappy Korea is that she will be a testing ground for atomic weapons.

High American authorities have been talking in very general terms of new weapons, apparently suitable for use by and against ground troops, which may be just in the offing. No one has said whether these weapons use atomic energy, or whether they are of a different character. So far, however, none seem to have made their appearance on the battlefield. The men in Korea are fighting with the conventional arms which have decided every war since gunpowder was invented.

One word of optimism came from General Bradley, when he returned from Korea early in October. He said, without elaborating, that there was a chance for a UN military victory. In the meantime, to quote U.S. News again, "Men are dying at an increasing rate in the war almost forgotten at home, with no end in sight."

C. L. Pickett Displays Book Binding Tools in Home Shop

There is a time in everyone's life when he wishes to save certain articles and clippings and C. L. Pickett has the plausible solution: book binding. Mr. Pickett began his hobby by book-binding six years ago. There were always magazine articles he wished to refer to and binding several in a book seemed the simplest answer. Since that time he has made 22 volumes.

Workshop in Basement
In the basement of the Pickett home is a complete workshop for this pastime, and a lathe for wood work. Mr. Pickett suggests that an alphabetically arranged file of the packet of material to be bound and the pages designated. A board is placed on the top and bottom and with a hacksaw, nine grooves are sawed into the back. Five threads are imbedded in each groove and the back is cemented to make the threads stationary.

Cover for the book is constructed from cardboard and book binding cloth is stretched over and pasted onto the cover. The liner is pasted to the inside. For the threads, spanning outward for stronger construction, the cover may be decorated however desired.

There is another method of binding the contents to the cover which also is being used. For this, bands of string are slipped into the back grooves at a 45 degree angle and these are sewed through

ANSWERS every farmer should have to questions about scrap iron and steel

Q. Why is iron and steel scrap a matter of importance to farmers?

A. Steel for our country's defense program and civilian economy is being produced at the highest annual rate ever... and this will be greatly increased in 1952. Farm machinery and equipment needs must come from this over-all supply. As steel production increases the need for scrap increases.

Q. How does scrap figure in the production of steel?

A. One pound of scrap is needed to make two pounds of steel.

Q. Is scrap getting scarce?

A. Yes, the supply of scrap at the steel mills and foundries is not increasing fast enough to meet the needs of expanding steel production. Yet, there are millions of tons of idle iron and steel scrap, in small amounts, on farms throughout the country.

Q. What if the needed scrap isn't obtained?

A. That will mean a serious loss of steel production... fewer products will be made of steel. It will mean more shortages of civilian products. Defense needs come first.

Q. Why not use pig iron instead of scrap?

A. Every ton of scrap conserves ap-

proximately 2 tons of iron ore, 1 ton of coal, nearly 1/2 ton of limestone and many other vital natural resources—to say nothing of transportation facilities. Besides, there are not enough blast furnaces to produce the iron needed to maintain production.

Q. How can more scrap be furnished?

A. By everybody pitching in—as we always do in every emergency—and searching out all possible sources of scrap. Manufacturers of all kinds of products are conducting scrap drives. Old ships are being salvaged... scrap is being obtained from countless sources, including farms.

Q. What else can I do about farm scrap?

A. Support the scrap drive organized in your locality. Work with your local Scrap Mobilization Committee in getting the scrap started back to the steel mills and foundries through the local scrap dealer.

Q. What should be done with farm scrap?

A. See that every bit of scrap gets to the scrap dealer located nearest to you. He will break it up into sizes used by the steel mills and foundries. He'll classify the metals then ship the scrap in carload lots. If you do not know the name of your local scrap dealer, consult your local implement dealer for this information.

Q. What else can I do about farm scrap?

A. Support the scrap drive organized in your locality. Work with your local Scrap Mobilization Committee in getting the scrap started back to the steel mills and foundries through the local scrap dealer.

A. It is any worn out, obsolete, unrepairable equipment, tools or other ob-

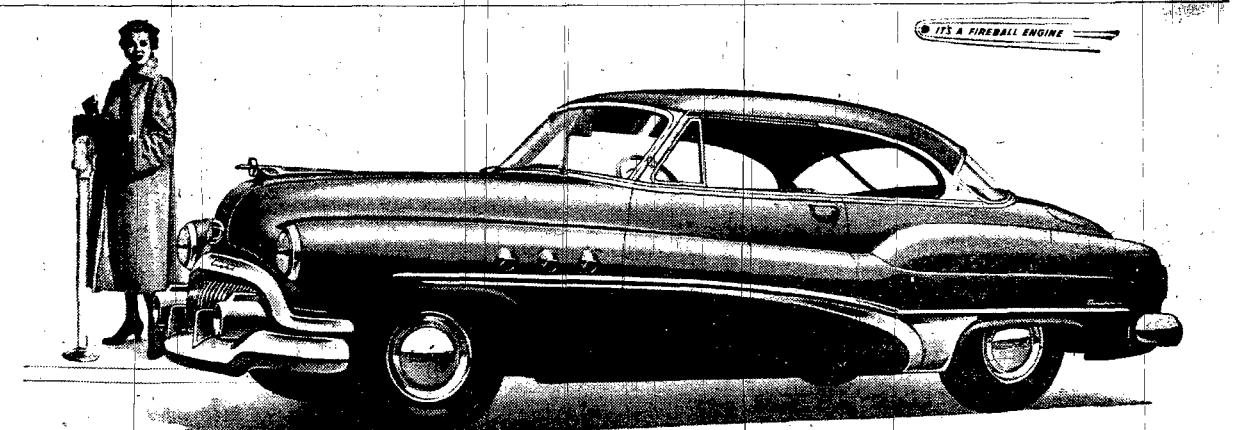

Blue Devils Trounce Wisner, 37-14, for West Crown

Meyer Nets 3 Scores In Victory

Sparked by David Meyer's three touchdowns, Wayne High's Blue Devils pounded out a 37-14 victory over Wisner Friday night in their final Husker conference game.

The victory kept Wayne undefeated in its eight games. The Blue Devils will meet the east division winner here Nov. 16 for the league playoff. Oakland has but to defeat Lyons this week to top the eastern crown.

Meyer scored three touchdowns in the Wayne victory and passed for a fourth. He also kicked one extra point for a total of 19 points during the evening.

Wayne wasted little time in assuming control of the game. The Blue Devils ran the opening kickoff back to their own 25 and marched 75 yards to score. The first score was called back by a backfield in motion penalty and Wayne seemed stalled on the Wisner 15.

Bob Granquist who had scored the first time game night back to enter the end zone and put Wayne in front 6-0. Meyer's kick was blocked.

Penalties put Wisner in a bad hole a few minutes later and Bill Palmer smashed over to give Wayne a 12-0 margin. Wisner had taken the kickoff but was forced back to its own three.

A fourth down punt was returned by 15-yard penalties. It moved Wayne to the 10. Wayne Palmer smashed over from there. A pass for the extra point failed.

Pass Nets Touchdown

Meyer passed to Jim Henegar for the third Wayne TD after Wisner lost the ball on downs on its own 42. Wayne moved the ball to Wisner's 35 and a 15-yard penalty gave the Blue Devils a first down on the 20. Meyer then hit Henegar for 20 yards and a touchdown to give Wayne a 18-0 lead. Meyer kicked the extra point.

Wayne made it 25-0 just before the half end with Meyer running 35 yards for the tally. Wisner fumbled a Wayne punt late in the second period and Wayne recovered on the home team's 35.

On the first play Meyer faded back to pass but failed to find a receiver. He took off over tackle and scored standing up to make it 25-0. The conversion was blocked.

Wayne's regulars allowed the first touchdown of the season to be scored against them on the second half kickoff. Wisner's Bob Jacobson scooped 80 yards with the kick to make it 25-6. Six Wayne tacklers had a share at the flustered back but failed to bring him down. Wisner punted for the extra point.

Pass Interceptions

Jim Henegar set up the next Wayne tally when he ran an intercepted pass back 35 yards from the Wisner 30. Meyer went over from

the 17-yard line and Wayne led 31-7 after the conversion failed.

Palmer's interception minutes later gave Wayne the ball on the Wisner 23. A drive moved the ball to the two but a fumble gave the ball to Wisner. The team tried to pass out of the hole but Meyer intercepted on the 20 and raced across for his third touchdown. The extra point kick was blocked.

Wisner's Jim Stewart scored the final touchdown of the game against Wayne's seconds on a reverse that covered 60 yards. He also punted for the extra point to make it 37-14.

Wayne's complete mastery of the game is shown through the statistics. The Blue Devils rolled up 13 first downs to two for the losers and amassed a total of 221 yards from scrimmage. Wisner ended the game with a net gain of minus 12 yards.


