New York Pattern Stylist Gives Fall Wardrobe Tips

Griffith, a national pattern company, refrained from predicting spring fashions, because of the earliness, other than

pointing out pastels as proper color value. She stressed the fact that full flaring skirts have been the silhouette for fall with their feminine and elegant air; all wide skirts are being worn over crinolined petticoats this season and the latter are referred to as frankly feminine "crinoline."

The coatdress, with many adaptations, is one of the most wearable new fashions, according to the New York stylist, who appeared at one of the Wayne stores last week. This type of clothing looks fine on everyone and it is a singularly outstanding fashion. The tailored two-skirted suit with fitted jacket stands out

as a versatile costume; the jacket may be worn with the flared, aged skirt, giving two completely different appearances to a costume.

Shoulder lines this fall are natural, but this is not to be interpreted as "no shoulder pads." "A soft feminine sleeve needs the firmness of small round shoulder pads" to best accentuate the line of the shoulder, suggested Miss Dvorak. Everyone, even the girl with straight, square, "little boy" shoulders must accept the use of all-size

shoulder pads. Fabric contrast is the newest point of a costume and probably the most stimulating. Braids are important trims this season besides the large platter buttons.

Miss Dvorak urges the use of color in wardrobe; pinks, burning oranges, cool turquoises and vibrant reds are excellent for basic dark costumes. The jewel tones are fall and winter necessities with contrasting hats and gloves against the typical winter colors.

Overskirts and stoles are accessories which make one costume into two. A net or striped taffeta overskirt will, by complete metamorphosis, transform the office dress into a dancing dress. Another wardrobe stretch, she stole, is used for endless versatility besides warmth.

"Rayon manufacturers have done wonders in creating year-round rayon suitings which have a wool-like appearance," stated Miss Dvorak. She pointed out that they unlike wool, were crease resistant and water repellent and that they tailored as beautifully as woolen products.

About her work, Miss Dvorak first said that pattern companies follow the ready-to-wear trend to bring to the public the most current styles. As a primary factor in sewing, she stressed the importance of buying the right size pattern; once the shoulder and bust lines are fitted, the waist and hip lines are easily altered.

Each manufacturer has his own interpretation of sizes which explains why pattern sizes vary somewhat in ready-to-wear sizes; the ready-to-wear costumes run a size larger than pattern sizes. All patterns are drafted according to the Bureau of Standard Measurements in Washington, therefore, all patterns have basic uniformity in size.

One of the most important problems in sewing is to learn how to alter the pattern correctly. Each individual should study her figure and adjust the pattern before cutting into the fabric.

Miss Dvorak has done retailing fashion coordination work for the pattern company for the past two years. She attended the University of Minnesota as a home economist and graduated from the Vogue School of Fashion and Art in Chicago. Her fashion promotion work includes television, radio, fashion shows and sewing demonstrations. She worked on State street in Chicago and did a stretch

Templeton Scores Hit in Wayne
Two Wayne music teachers agreed on several points in their criticism of Altona Templeton, famed blind pianist who appeared here last Wednesday evening in the Community Concert series.

Each number Mr. Templeton played was styled in the period in which it belonged, and each was played and interpreted as it should be. Prof. Russell Bernstein and Prof. Benjamin Bernstein agreed. Templeton's piano mastery and his versatile style are well known.


Mr. Bernstein commented that Templeton had a great understanding and sympathy for the classical tradition was concerned in Bach's "Prelude and Fugue No. 2 in C Minor." Also shown in Handel's "Largo" was this feeling for the masters which proves a thorough background of music. Mr. Bernstein feels that Templeton's musicianship bespeaks the thoroughness of the training of European conservatories.

The musician's versatility is shown in the way in which he went from almost perfect Mozart style into typical smooth swing in "A Roam with Jerome." He was fully able to meet the different demands of various schools of music. Mr. Bernstein feels.

Templeton handled with understanding "Bourne's English 'Sarabande and Minuet.'" He showed faithfulness, to nuances, tempo and to the demand of that type of music. Equally poetical in Chopin's "Barearolle in F Sharp." With his clean technique, the artist captured the romantic spirit, stated Mr. Bernstein.

A modern Russian such as Prokofiev commands with spirited fire, dash and verve, and Mr. Bernstein feels that Templeton achieved it in "Prelude in C." Debussy's "Brieries" and the three excerpts from Ravel's "Mother Goose Suite" are both sensitive by the same tokens. Each man was of the impressionist school. Their music is sopisti-

The Taft organization is large, efficient, well-financed, and politically experienced and astute. It recognizes there is much strong opposition to their man within the Republican camp...

Senator Taft's new book on foreign policy is an able effort to dispel the idea that he is an isolationist—which has been one of the main arguments made against his possible candidacy.

Then, as Raymond Moley pointed out in Newsweek, "It might be that a Republican or a southerner would be elected president and the party that did not get the presidency would be given the control of Congress."

Husker Conference Play-off Is Set for Friday Night

Wayne High And Oakland Undeclared

Sports News

Wayne High's Blue Devils and Oakland's Vikings will put their undefeated records on the black Friday night at the college stadium when they meet in Husker Conference play-off.

Both teams have 4-0 records in their respective divisions. Wayne High swamped their opponents in the western section while Oakland has racked up the teams in the eastern half.

Oakland will go into the Husker play-off game riding the crest of a 17-game winning streak. Wayne's last loss was to Oakland in the 1950 divisional play-off.

Wayne High did not play last week and Coach Lloyd Horton and Assistant Rod Lobe have been putting the squad through their paces polishing the offense and defense.

The local favorites have scored 22 points while winning eight straight this season. Their opponents crossed the goal line for 32 points.

Wayne's starting line-up has Jim Henegar and Jim Atkins at the end posts; Vic Kniesche and Robert Jensen at tackles; Dave Meyer and Clarence Mann at guard; Gordon Zapp at the center slot; Don Skahan quarterback; Buster Tiersort and G. Granquist manning the halfback spots and Bill Palmer at fullback.

Score comparisons show Wayne beating Wakefield 14-0 while Oakland battered them 33-0. The Blue Devils romped over Scribner, 48-0 and Oakland beat them even worse, 39-0.

Oakland won the eastern division championship and the right to meet Wayne in the Husker conference play-off by defeating Lyons last Friday night, 48 to 0. It was a

dual conference victory as the Vikings also brought home the Cornhusker conference trophy, for the first time in eight years.

The Oakland ball club, which has been at the top of the state class C ratings all season, is coached by Kenneth Fischer, assisted by Clarence Goracke.

Oakland runs primarily from a T formation. In chalking up nine victories this year the Vikes have amassed a total of 333 points, or an average of 37 points a game. Although the Fischermen are a high scoring aggregation, they have been rugged on defense with only four touchdowns having been scored against them. Since the first two ball games, West Point is the only team that has crossed their goal line.

The Oakland line is led by co-captain Bruce Baugh at guard. He is the boy that piles up the middle on defense. The other guard is Norm Wallerstedt, sometimes referred to as the best blocker on a good blocking ball club.

Fullback Tom Tibbels and Rex Fischer, co-captain and quarterback are big guns in the Oakland attack. Both are four-year lettermen. Fischer, who leads Oakland's split T offense, has piled up a good rushing record for the year. He has carried the ball 125 times with a net gain of 1215 yards. His average per carry is 9.7 yards. 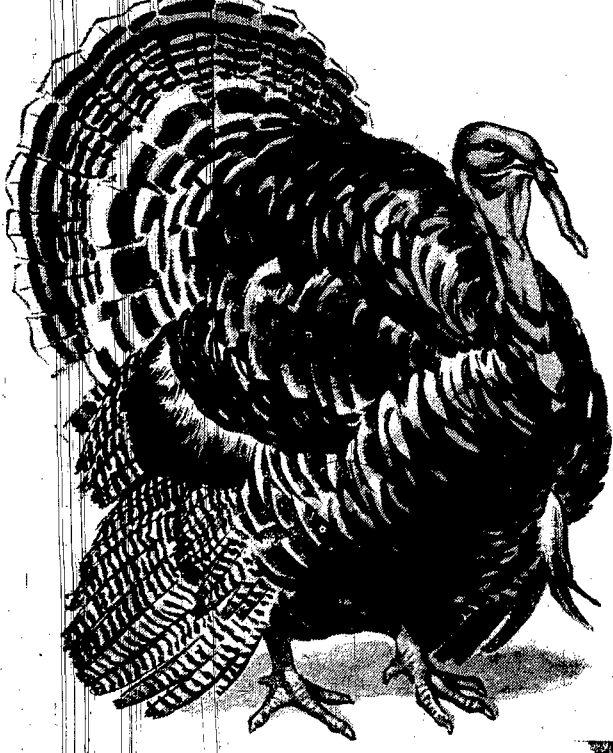

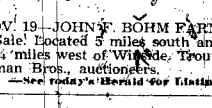
