Average Wayne County Farm Receipts Rate High in State Northeast Region in Top Quarter

Wayne county rates in the upper one-fourth of the counties in the state based on cash receipts per farm, according to November's issue of "Business in Nebraska." Information for the University of Nebraska publication was obtained from bureau of the census and department of agriculture reports for 1949.

The most prosperous and most rapidly growing part of Nebraska, according to the report, is a band of counties extending southwest from South Sioux City to Grand Island and McCook. Specifically, these counties lie mostly in the Elkhorn, lower Platte and Republican river valleys.

Break-down of average farm size, added cost of seeds, gasoline cost and gross receipts was given by state, region and county. Number of acres per farm and gross receipts were as follows:

These figures show the northeast region second highest in the state. Although farms are smaller in this region they produce a higher value per farm.

Wayne county's average farm of 193 acres produces a gross cash receipt of \$10,583, slightly higher than the regional average.

Only four counties in the state had higher average cash receipts per farm than Wayne county's \$9,615. This indicates heavy feeding programs which probably account for higher cash receipts from a smaller farm.

The amount of cash receipts per farm indicates the buyer power per farm. It does not, however, show the net income per farm since production expenses have not been subtracted. Produce and livestock products used on the farm have not been added, and government payments and other income items have not been included.

Evening Voc Ag Classes Start Monday at WSTC

Conservation Program for '52 Planned

When you get right down to it soil and water conservation has to do mostly with individual farms. The 1952 ACP assistance will be Roberts, chairman of the Wayne county PMA committee, stated. That's why, under the 1952 Agricultural Conservation program, we start with the conservation problems on the individual farm.

"In this farm by farm approach, we will seek to determine not only which conservation practices are needed on each farm but which practices are needed most to help that particular farm produce what is needed to meet defense requirements and at the same time check soil deterioration and build the productivity of the land for future increased production."

The 1942 ACP assistance will be conditioned on each cooperating farmer carrying out a conservation plan which will outline most to conserve of the soil and water resources to make possible the production of commodities needed in the defense effort. Each cooperating farmer will base his year-by-year conservation efforts on an over-all conservation plan developed for his farm with the assistance of state or federal agency representatives.

Financial assistance under the Agricultural Conservation program will be limited to practices designated by the farmer which the committee considers essential to increased and sustained production.

Where individual farmers cannot be contacted by a local PMA committee, letters will be sent to each farmer. On this letter, or "sign-up" form, the farmer will designate the practices he intends to carry out in 1952.

Two More Car Mishaps This Week

The never ending toll of car accidents rose two more this week in the Wayne territory, according to Sheriff Hans Tietgen.

A two-car crash west of here and a car-corn picker collision north of Wayne were reported.

A Friday evening accident occurred one and three-quarter miles west of Wayne on highway 98 when an eastbound auto driven by Mary E. Thompson, Wayne, hit loose gravel and skidded into the path of a westbound car driven by Mrs. Leonard Moore, Carroll.

Mrs. Thompson's daughter, Mildred, was badly bruised. Both cars were badly damaged.

The Moore vehicle was the same one involved in a hog-car crash about two weeks ago.

The other mishap took place Monday evening three and one-fourth miles north of Wayne on highway 15.

Robert Thum, farmer northwest of Wayne, was driving south and crashed into the rear of southbound tractor-mounted two-row corn picker driven by Max Ash, Wayne.

The impact of the collision threw Ash off the tractor and sent the tractor-picker unit into the ditch on the left side of the road. Sheriff Tietgen took Thum to Wayne hospital for treatment of head, chest and leg injuries, after which he went home. Ash suffered bruises.

The front end of Thum's auto and the picker were badly damaged.

Direct Air Mail Pouch To Omaha Announced

The volume of air mail, both parcel post and letter mail dispatched at the Wayne postoffice has increased to the extent that an all-air-mail pouch direct to the air mail field at Omaha has been established.

This pouch is made up daily, except Sunday, at 4 p.m., and connects with planes leaving Omaha at midnight the same day.

For example, letters so mailed will reach Chicago by 9:30 a.m., New York City by 12:50 a.m., Salt Lake City by 6:55 a.m., and Los Angeles by 10:05 p.m. the next day.

If special delivery is used with air mail, delivery the same day is assured. Air mail is also dispatched at 5 and 6 p.m. However, the plane connections are not as good as the direct 4 p.m. dispatch.

Campaign for Needed Polio Funds Marked

With a staggering total of over 15,000 new and old polio cases now requiring medical care, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, through its local chapters and the March of Dimes, is preparing its greatest appeal for support.
 Clifford M. Dahl, Wayne county campaign director, declared today.
 Meeting at Kansas City
 Participating in a regional meeting of March of Dimes directors and representatives just completed in Kansas City, Kan., Dahl issued this report on the present polio situation:
 "For four straight years polio epidemics have swept the country, piling up 133,000 cases or an average of over 33,000 cases a year. The result has been a terrific carry-over of patients who are struggling to overcome the after-effects of the crippling disease."
 "During all this critical time the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has endeavored to live up to its promise to the people that no case shall be denied adequate care because of lack of funds. The load has been so heavy, however, that the national foundation has plunged into debt each year to the extent of five or six million dollars.
 "In other words, the March of Dimes has not kept pace with the march of polio. The time has finally come to put the national foundation on a balanced basis. We cannot continue in the red."
 Drive Opens January 1
 "We have unanimously determined to set our sights much higher than ever before. The coming March of Dimes will open on January 2 and continue through January 31 instead of opening on January 15, as has been the custom. The American people, we feel sure, will support this expanded program."
 "We were told at the meeting that scientists and doctors are at last closing in on polio. Now is the time to keep this fight adequately supplied with the dimes and dollars needed, not only to help those who have been stricken but to continue the research work to conquer infantile paralysis."
 Late figures on polio cases this year show a total ending Nov. 3 of 25,597. Epidemic aid already sent by the national foundation to chapters which have exhausted their funds now totals \$7,254,316. Thus far this year, the national foundation has shipped 536 respirators (iron lungs) to places where they are needed.
 The March of Dimes meeting included representatives from the states of Missouri, eastern Kansas, eastern Nebraska and southern Iowa.

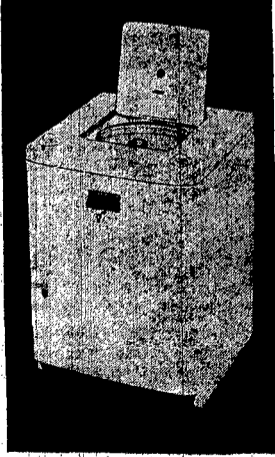

AAUW Hears Review Of 'Forrestal Diaries'

Dr. George W. Dunn, minister in Sioux City, reviewed "The Forrestal Diaries" for Wayne branch of AAUW and guests Thursday evening at the college faculty lounge, about 40 attending. The speaker was presented by Mrs. J. T. Bressler, program chairman. The diaries of the late Secretary of Defense James Forrestal, edited by Walter Mills and E. S. Duffield, reveal the statesman's understanding and foresight in the world situation. As early as 1944 Mr. Forrestal predicted that complete subjection of Germany and a "let down" of Chiang Kai Shek in China would leave "vacuums" in these countries and that the areas would be available to Russian communism. Mr. Forrestal realized how easy it is to destroy but how long and difficult is the process of rebuilding an economic and political order with justice and understanding. In concluding, Dr. Dunn stressed the hope that Mr. Forrestal's insight might prompt people everywhere to pray that governments may bring wisdom, justice and order. Flower Gardening Favorite Diversion of Joan Kabisch

"Flowers bring friends; to share them is not only to gain a friend, but it is also good for the flower," spoke Mrs. Dorothy Kabisch, and Joanne about their favorite mother-daughter hobby.

Chain of Friendship

They feel there is a continuous chain of friendship born out of their hobby; exchanging flowers with others and encouraging children to visit their flowerbeds. Children are seen in the backyard during the summer gathering butterflies, guiding their dogs carefully over the stepping stones so the flowers will not be damaged.

Cacti and Foliages

The Kabischs specialize in cacti and foliage, the latter because they are "in bloom" all the year around. A few of the more different ones are the bird's nest, a large leafed cactus, bishop's cap (a cactus shaped exactly like one) and a powder puff which also takes its name from its shape. Several varieties they own need not be rooted such as a variety of fern resembling baby tears, and a scrappy-looking "evergreen forest."

Planted Outside in Spring

All flowers grow inside the Kabisch home are planted outside in the spring; a few of the more delicate ones are planted inside the pots. The backyard of the home, which overruns completely to the curb, is overrun by many kinds of flowers. The "green thumbs" don't bother with landscaping but plant the flowers where they will

grow best. Mrs. Kabisch named all the flowers in their collection, and the number covered four pages in a regular journalism notebook. A few of these flowers have eccentricities, and to enumerate: Dutchman's breeches is a wild flower and when it is finished blooming, it dies. The wood root is named sensibly; when the stem is queered, red juice oozes out. The Kabischs have one they call "Rocky Mountain flower" because they took the flower off a mountainside. The anemone bulb is planted sideways, another strange feature found in the growing of flowers.

Gets Suntan

Joanne has loved flowers as long as her mother can remember. Mrs. Kabisch recalls that when Joanne was a small child, she would cry whenever the bees on the farm would pick at the flowers in the rain. Besides the opportunity of being outdoors, Joanne stresses the fact that working with flowers in the summer helps a much-wanted suntan along.

Too Much Moisture

It is interesting how different a habitat different flowers need. Some need so much more water than others and some need drier weather. Extreme moisture this year was bad for the cacti, stated the Kabischs. They named their favorite flower as the zinnia because it is a care-don't bother with landscaping but plant the flowers where they will

It is an inexpensive but beautiful flower. The folks stressed that the like common varieties and do not plant anything spectacular.

Besides this time-consuming hobby, Joanne collects menus, programs, cat pictures and costumes. The largest of her 22 menus is over most two feet long and she has one from the original Brown Derby in Hollywood. Several pictures of cats are mounted on the walls of the Kabisch home and they own two pedigreed Siamese cats.

Mrs. Kabisch and her daughter have an original and refreshing mother-daughter hobby, and they indulge in it with true hobby spirit.

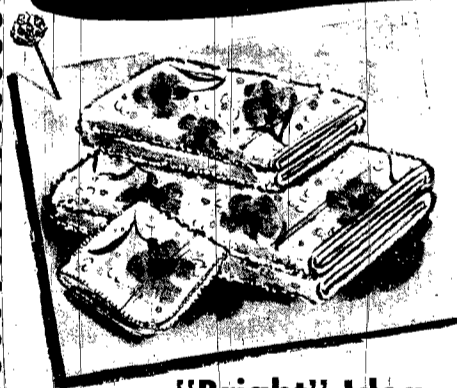

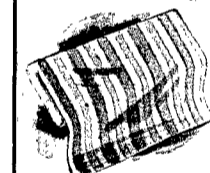

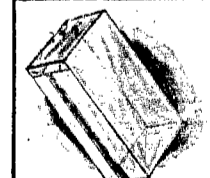

Oakland Takes Husker Crown; Blue Devils Suffer 14-6 Loss

Horton's 11 Plays Best Game of Year

Wayne High won everything but the ball game Friday night as Oakland downed the Blue Devils 14-6 at Memorial stadium to win the Husker Conference divisional play-off and stretch their winning streak to 18 games.

Playing their best game of the season, Coach Horton's eleven outplayed the Oakland Vikings 16-5. They moved the ball up and down the field all night but could not cross that elusive goal line. Twice the blue and white had a first down and goal-to-go but could not crack up the TD.

An early second quarter drive failed when a safety was assessed after Mark Horton had driven to the two-yard line on the second down. A fourth down plunge by Gil Gronquist, who merely broke loose several times during the game, found the goal line six yards away and the visitors took over.

In the final period, a runner on David McKeen's line on his way to a touchdown which he was hit and fumbled on the one-yard line. Oakland's line sophomore back, Ronald Kohnert, recovered on the four to stop the threat.

Two Quick Thrusts
Oakland hit the game in the half with two quick scoring thrusts. A 24-yard punt by halfback Bill Jipp changed a field goal for the visitors in the second period. A 24-yard B. F. Fisher to Jipp pass play set up the scoring opportunity.

But it was Fisher who really did the damage. On the first play from scrimmage on the second half, he hit on tackle and went 74 yards to score after Wayne defenders seemingly had him stopped for little or no gain. Tom Tibbels hit the line for both conversions.

Except for those two plays which accounted for nearly half of the rushing yards gained by Coach Fischer's charges, Wayne's hard-charging defense had Oakland's highly rated backs stopped cold. But these two plays meant the ball game.

The Blue Devils scored their touchdown early in the first quarter when they went 32 yards in six plays and kicked like they went going to blow the ball game wide open.

Tietzort and Gronquist went through the line for five and four yards respectively and quarterback Dan Skelahan sneaked for two to tie Wayne a first down on the 10.

A 19-yard Meyer to Jim Atkins pass that put the ball on the three was nullified by an off-side penalty.

Pheasant and Quail Seasons Close Sunday

Lincoln Sunday, Nov. 25, will probably prove to be the most popular day of the year as it marks the end of both the pheasant and quail hunting seasons.

Pheasant and quail hunting has experienced better extremes, ranging from poor to good. Inclement weather, extremely heavy vegetation cover and slow corn harvesting hampered hunting for ring-necks during the early part of the season.

Since, however, hunting has improved. A recent report from the central part of the state indicated that pheasant hunting success was good. Most of the hunters were bagging about four birds each. The hunters were having their best luck in weedy corn fields.

Pheasant began grouping during the latter part of the season which also helped improve hunting conditions. The harvesting of fields resulted in more concentrations of birds.

Quail hunters were not too numerous during the 25-day season. Most of the hunters worked with dogs. Those hunters didn't experience too much difficulty in taking the bag limit of seven quail.

The pheasant season started on Oct. 26 while the quail hunt got under way on Nov. 1. Next open season is deer for 1,200 special permit holders. The deer season will be held from Dec. 3 through Dec. 17.

Doane Hits Wayne State 13-6 Friday

Doane's Tigers tumbled the Wayne State Wildcats into third place on the NCC ladder Friday afternoon by downing the local teachers 13-6 in the final game of the 1951 season.

The Tigers started the game with a jolt, when Harold Summers, Doane fullback, scampered 80 yards for a touchdown on the first scrimmage play after the kick-off.

Doane freshman Carroll Zaruba then booted the extra point, setting a new NCC individual scoring record of 68 points — one point more than Al Bahe of Wayne compiled in 1949. Bahe set his record against Doane in the final game of the 1949 season.

The 25-mile-an-hour wind that howled across the field slowed both attacks, but undoubtedly hurt Wayne's drive more than Doane's.

The Wildcats couldn't muster a passing attack to go with their rugged grind through the line. Seven times the Wildcats pitched and seven times they missed connections.

Wayne's score came after the backs began to roll late in the first period. The 42-yard drive to a touchdown began after Stan Hale's punts in the wind rolled dead. A 14-yard sprint by Don Kane was the key play and Butch Ohlund rammed over off-tackle from the ten. Luebke's attempted extra point failed.

Doane strode 58 yards for its first quarter marker in nine plays. Doane's Dick Anderson put the ball into position by heaving a 22-yard strike to Bob Erickson, and Joe Chapman went across from the two. Gale Mathiasen's try for the extra point was wide.

The Wildcats lost their chance to tie the game in the last seconds of the battle when a lateral twist-out of Kane's hands on Doane's Jim McKenzie, Doane tackle, and the show was over.
