Late SPORTS WSTC Drops Cage Test to Morningside

The curtain went up on Wayne State's 1951-52 basketball squad Tuesday night when the Wildcats fought a score-setting battle with the Morningside Maroons which ended with the local leathers on the short side of a 65-77 score.

The spirited Wildcats defied the pre-game protesters who gave the touted Iowans a heavy edge over Wayne. The game indicated that Chuck Ober's current squad may offer the roughest competition in NCC play that Wayne teams have been able to for the past several years.

The teachers took an early lead in the game when forward Roger Miller sank the first basket of the evening. The Maroons caught up at 5-4 and the score tipped the Wildcats 12-11 with three minutes left in the first quarter. The quarter ended with the Maroons holding a 17-16 edge.

26-32 at Half

The Iowans had their best period of the evening during the second quarter when forward Kenneth Filb and Ray Knauer traded scoring shots to tie Morningside an 11 point lead at 17-28 their largest margin of the evening. Toward the end of the half, Wayne's Don Tidgen hit his range to cut the margin to 26-32 when the whistle sounded.

The Wildcats came back strong in the second half, and passed the Maroons at 36-35 with two

quick tallies by guard Mike Mallette. The two teams tied at 40-40 all again at 42-42, and the Iowans crept ahead to hold a 47-48 lead at the end of the third period.

Two long bulls-eyes from deep on the floor by Wayne's Ted Lindberg, 6-ft. 3-in. freshman from O'Neill, sparked the third quarter play.

In the final period, the Wildcats dogged the heels of the Maroons, leading them once and tying them twice before Morningside guard Dick Norman sank the score that put the Iowans ahead to stay at 55-53. The final whistle sounded at 71-65.

Tietgen High Scorer

High scorer of the game with 20 points was Wayne's Don Tietgen, who held second place in individual scoring for the Wildcats last year. Norman led the Iowa squad with 19.

Some hobbies begin as a result of illness, some because of a special liking, and still others out of necessity to keep busy. The latter was the reason Cob Olson started his lamp-making hobby.

It was during the winter of 1948 and 1949, during the incessant blizzards, when the hobby sprang up. He also blames it onto the fact that it is impossible for him to relax, so instead of "picking his bangs," he made lamps.

Two from Pumps
 The first efforts were two ordinary lamps made from two old bicycle pumps. He painted them green, wired them and added shades. To this collection were added two coffee grinders treated in the same manner, and a couple of kerosene-burning Aladdin lamps. One was a Chinese elegant lamp with ebony base, and another which he wired was the first chandelier which hung in the telephone exchange in Wayne.

Plywood Statuette
 Several of the others which Olson has made are constructed with the use of laminated plywood. He calls them "plywood statuettes." The statuette is coated with plastic to make it seem as one unit. He wires them by the following operation:

In order to wire statuettes, an upright center post is needed, or animal statuettes, a hole is bored through the center of the unit; and for those of children, braces are used with a child on either side of the upright and a concealed wire runs up the center of the upright. The socket is applied and finally the shade. Olson makes shades out

of pictures which are coated on the back with raw linseed oil to make them transparent when the light glows.

Has Woodwork Hobby Too

Mr. Olson feels that his true hobby is woodwork, which he has done most of his life. He was just large enough to handle the tools when he began. Hobbies, he believes are for fun and not to make money; however, he has done two projects for money.

One of these includes four dozen miniature covered wagons he made for a woman in Brookings, N. Y. He made a large bird cage for the love birds of Mrs. Sam McKeivie, wife of the former governor of Nebraska.

Makes What-Not

Besides 10 of the 20 lamps he has

made, original what-nots adorn the Olson home. The basement of his studio downtown contains all types of power tools; some of these are jigsaw, belt, drum and disk-sander, flexible shaft, hand grinder, eight-inch table saw with filling, arbor, brass paint outfit, drill press and turning lathe.

The Wayne photographer feels that everyone should have a hobby, which they can do when they get older; they "can't play tennis" or do such active things as they age and must have something interesting to occupy their time. If a person likes his hobby, he may create something different, not new, but something which can give him happiness and satisfaction, believes Olson.
