NEBRASKA FARM OUTLOOK



The MONTHLY FARM OUTLOOK is reprinted from Notes on Nebraska Farm Business, a monthly publication of the Department of Agricultural Economics, Agricultural Extension Service, College of Agriculture, University of Nebraska, Lincoln. This uthorizative report is reprinted each month by the State National Bank of Wayne as a service to our customers and friends.)

Economic Situation

For the first time in eight months, the index of prices received by farmers in October reversed its downward trend and rose four points. In Nebraska the same index rose five points. This is evidence that inflation is still may become stronger this winter.

The general outlook for agriculture the coming year is optimistic. There will be adjustments in price relationships between commodities, but net farm income is expected to be about the same as in 1951.

expected to be about the same as in 1991.

; Even though prices in general are expected to be higher on most products, production expenses and taxes will take a larger bite out of farm income than last year. The word of caution in 1952 will be "efficiency." Low cost farm production costs and efficient feeding will make the difference between profits and loss. tween profits and loss

It appears that present beef ceiling prices are only slightly below what prices would be if the market was normally free.

Outlook for Beef Cattle In 1952

Increased number of cattle on farms, a moderate increase in slaughtering and slightly lower cattle prices at the time of largest marketings will probably characterize the cattle situation in 1952.

No drastic change in price is anticipated, assuming that the demand for meat will be sustained by continued high incomes of consumers.

Cattle Numbers Going Up

Cattle numbers on farms in the United States are expected to increase from 84 million at the beginning of this year to 90 or 91 million on January 1, 1952. Slaughterings in 1952 are expected to be 104 above 1951 for cattle and 15 higher for calves. A further increase in cattle on farms during 1952 is anticipated, though this will likely be smaller than

June 30, 1952. In the latter part of the year, however, when
cattle marketings rise seasonally, some price reductions
may take place.

Looking beyond 1952, the stage is set for a continued increase in numbers of cattle on farms and greatly expanded
slaughter. It is conceivable that there may be ever 100 million cattle on farms by 1955 and that slaughter of cattle and
calves might reach 40 million head, compared
with 26 million head in 1951.

Cattle Prices May Readjust

Such a change in beef supply would likely bring a substantial adjustment in the relationship of cattle prices to prices of other farm products. This relationship has recently been above average. For example, during the nine months of 1951, the price of steers at Chicago was 174 per cent of the average price which farmers received for hogs compared with a more normal relationship of 125 per cent in 1922-37 and 137 per cent during 1932-41. A return to approximately average price relationships in future years would not necessarily mean a drastic price reduction. If productivity, employment and incomes in the United States should continue upward, the decline in prices of beef would be moderate. However, economic depression and a falling general price level would have very serious consequences to the cattle industry.

than a year ago. In three important cattle feeding states (Illinois, Iowa and Nebraska) there were two per cent more cattle on feed October I this year than on the same date last year. In Nebraska alone the number was four per cent greater this year. The average price of sockers and feeders at Kansas City in September 1951 was \$31.90 per 100 bs. This was \$5 higher than the price a year earlier and only \$4.78 lower than the price of choice steers at Chicago for the same month. This price spread is narrower than normal.

Feeding in 1952 May Not Be Profitable

Returns from feeding in 1952 will likely be less than in the past two years, based upon the price relationship cited above and the assumption that prices of fat steers at marketing time in 1952 will be about the same as they are now. Should slaughter prices be reduced either by weakening of demand or by unforeseen increases in cattle marketings, returns from feeding might be very small. Likewise a reduction in the presently favorable ratio of cattle prices to the price of feed grains would materially shrink the profit margin of cattle feeders. The price of feed grains is expected to be higher in 1952 than it was in 1951.

The Feed Situation

Feed grain supplies will be considerably smaller than last year while hay and protein feeds will be available in larger quantities. This is the situation in Nebraska as well as for the United States.

According to the November 1 estimate, a 1951 corn crop of 3.1 billion bushels is expected. The carry-over October 1 was about 750 million bushels. This would make a total supply of 3,855 million bushels. This is slightly less than the supply available last year but is larger than for any year prior to 1948.

Corn Estimates Down

The November 1 com crop estimate for Nebraska is 206,598,000 bushels. This would be an average of about 28.5 bushels per acre. The 1950 crop yielded an average of 37 bushels per acre. Early frost has reduced both the yield and the feed value of a large acreage of corn.

Other grain supplies are also lower than last year. On October 1 the total feed grain supply was estimated at 120 october 1 the total feed grain supply was estimated at 120 million tons last year. The 1951 supply will actually be less than 120 million bushels because of the lower corn production.

Less Oats, Barley and Sorghums

The feed grain situation is much the same in Nebraska The oats and barley crops were short because of generally low yields and a smaller than usual acreage planted. The acreage of grain sorghims that matured is very low. Frost damage to the Nebraska corn crop is much more serious than anticipated earlier. The feed value of much of the corn is very low. Yields will probably be much lower than many farmers expected. There may be considerable spoilage unless the soft, poor quality corn is fed this winter.

Much Hay but Low Quality

The hay supply is large both for the United States and Nebraska but the quality is below average. High quality hay is very scarce in some areas. The total supply of high protein feeds will probably be larger than last year. Supplies of oil cake and oil meal are expected to set a new record.

More Livestock, Less Feed

The important factor to the livestockman is the relationship of feed supplies to the number of livestock. Total livestock numbers are expected to reach a new high during the 1951-52 feeding period. The supply of feed grains per animal unit will be slightly less than the average for the last five years but considerably above the pre-World War II period. Protein feed supplies per animal unit will be slightly less than last year but also much higher than during the

The Hog Situation

Efficiency will be the key word to profits from hop production in 19529-Those who fail to make use of sound practices may receive little if any returns for the labor and equipment used in the hog enterprise.

The hog-corn ratio is lower this fall than in any autumn since 1947. Prices of hogs are not expected to be much higher in 1952 than they have them in 1951. The price of corn, however, is expected to continue its upward trend.

The total production of meat is expected to be higher in 1952 than it has been in 1951. Most of the increase, however, is expected to take place in beef and veal. The total pounds of hogs marketed in 1952 will probably be little if any larger than in 1951. This fall's large pig crop will cause heavier marketings of hogs during the first half of 1952 but will likely be partially offset by smaller marketing during the last half of the year as a result of an anticipated small decrease in spring farrowings. Furthermore, hogs will probably be sent to market at a little lighter weights throughout 1952 as a result of the relatively unfavorable hog-corn ratio.

Feed Prices Higher in 1952

Feed grain prices are expected to be higher in 1952 than they have been in 1951.
Unless price ceilings on meat are either raised or eliminated, it seems reasonably certain that costs of grain will rise more than the price of hogs. Even so, efficient hog producers can still manage to make money at raising hogs.
Any grains which must be purchased between now and the fall of 1952 should be purchased now. Supplies of protein feeds are large and will be relatively cheap.

Feed Balanced Diets

Gains are most economical on balanced rations. The simplest method of balancing the hog ration is to self feed both the grain and supplement and let the pigs balance their own diet. (Certain protein supplements such as soybean meal which are exceedingly palatable may be used more economically with other less palatable sources of protein.) Protein requirements are relatively high when pigs are small land the amount of protein consumed may be surprisingly high to anyone who has never self fed protein. However, as the pig gets heavier, the amount of protein consumed in relation to corn decreases. In the end, the pig will have made a much more economical gain than if the protein supplement is omitted or fed in less "alarming" quantities by

hand. Antibiotics used in the ration will do much to over-come or offset unthriftiness of young pigs (up to 100-125 lbs.) However, they do not substitute for sanitation.

Keep Your Porkers Comfy

Clean, dry bedding should be provided at all times. Plenty of water, warmed only enough to remove the ice and chill and available to hogs in a place where they do not have to go far to get it on a stormy day will speed up gains. Good green alfalfa hay can be fed to advantage, either as a part of a mixed ration or in a hay rack of some kind.

Feed Your Sow for More Pigs

Feed Your Sow for More Pigs

Since a great deal of the success of the hog enterprise depends on the number of pigs weaned per litter, it is important that sows and gilts be fed properly, yet economically. Old sows should have from 1.2 to 1.4 pounds of feed per day for each 100 pounds of live weight during the gestation period. Gilts should have 1.8 to 2.0 pounds of feed per day for each 100 pounds of live weight. The amount fed will depend not only on the ration mixture, but also on the condition of the sows. The amount of feed should be increased to approximately the upper limits as the gestation period advances. Plehty of bulk in the diet in the form of good quality oats or alfala hay is desirable along with corn. or grain sorghums. Approximately one-fourth to one-fifth of the ration should consist of a good supplement (if the supplement contains 35% protein).
