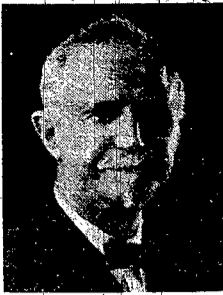

Campus School Instructor Has Post Mark; Stamp Collection



Coral Stoddard's postmark collection was originated as "a convenient source of motivation" for youngsters in her Wayne Prep fourth grade. It is a hobby which has grown out of her work and it definitely has a useful purpose.

Miss Stoddard's collection started after she had seen the group of postmarks exhibited by one of her pupils. Soon after that she began a course in her class to combine language and Greek history.

The students would choose a location identified in Greek history, such as Eros, or Apollo. She instructed each youth to write a letter to one of these places, and she sent the letters at a post card to each from herself to the postmaster under cover. The postmasters sent the letters to Miss Stoddard and the postcards to the children.

Interest augmented and soon the children were choosing other towns, with such bid names as "Bird, in Island," "Book," and "Bumble Bee." "Christmas," "West We Go," and finally the shortest name "T. O. K. A."

Miss Stoddard is impressed with the importance of such training for children of this age group. It has two-way significance; children learn much about the United States, and they learn to write intelligent letters.

The youngsters hunt town names in atlases, and they look through the postal guide; they find out that there are other places besides Wayne," Miss Stoddard commented.

There are 200 of these postmarked letters, 1,300 foreign postmarks, and 3,000 United States postmarks. Thirty countries and islands are included in the foreign collection from Turkey to South Africa and from Spain to Cuba. She has several German postmarks, secured before World War II.

There are also metered postmarks and they are those cancellations which individual firms have originated. They are slogan cancellations and are used for advertising in many cases. A few of these may be seen in almost everyone's mailbox, with "Welcome to the Beach," "Come to the Fair" and such banners written across the stamp.

Miss Stoddard's stamp collection is now in the process of being changed from one book to another. She embarked upon this hobby 20 years ago, incited by her nephew and his collection.

This hobby has grown through a very gradual accumulation, said Miss Stoddard. She has seven different sets including the famous Americans set.

The new United Nations first day covers will be ready for distribution Nov. 1 and Miss Stoddard plans to acquire it. First day covers, said the teacher, are letters with those stamps issued for the first day, and they usually include commemorative stamps. The "covers" are the whole envelope with the foreign or domestic stamp still on it.

Stamp Club Formed During the year, usually after

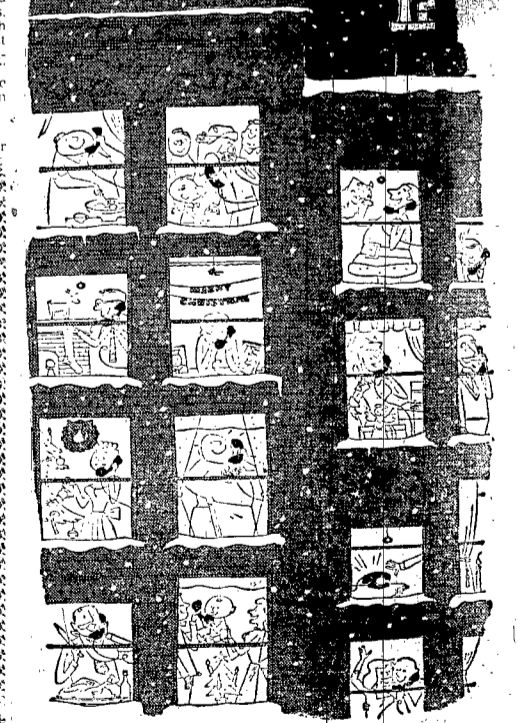

Green Light

In mid-November cattle raisers and other meat experts expressed the belief that the national meat shortage had ended.

This was the result of various favorable influences, one of them being the fact that our cattle population now totals 90,000,000, close to the all-time high.

But one important factor deserves special mention. In the words of a New York Times editorial, "While we have heard much about the crippling of control legislation at the hands of Congress, a case can be made to show that the present turn for the better in the meat outlook is attributable in part at least to one of the relaxing amendments passed by Congress."

The OPS some months ago had under consideration placing ceilings on meat at the live cattle level.

In other words, here was a case where less control—not more control—acted as the spur which helped bring abundance where there had been scarcity.

There is a lesson in that for those who hopefully think that the easy way to solve any problem is to pass more laws and to saddle enterprise with more regulations, more red-tape, and more edicts.

No economic system ever devised by man has worked half so well as supply and demand in the free market.

The dramatic change which took place in the beef situation after Congress wisely restrained OPS from imposing ceilings on live cattle is evidence of that fact.

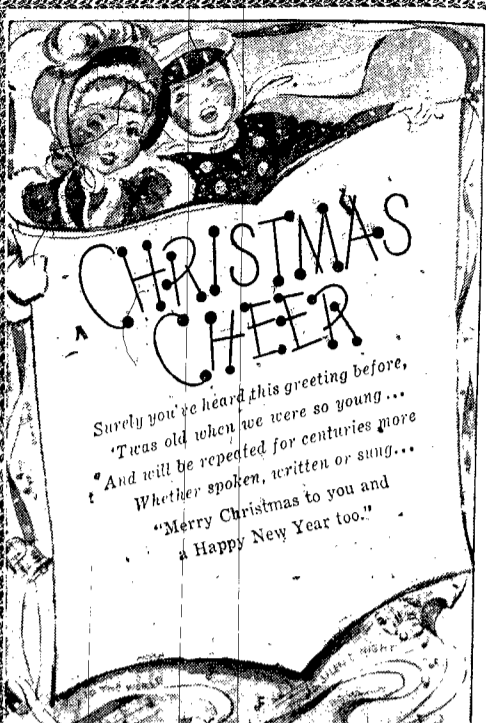
