County 1952 March of Dimes Drive Underway; C. M. Dahl Heads Campaign

Need Funds To Offset Big Deficit

The 1952 March of Dimes opened in Wayne county yesterday with the avowed objective of putting the fight against polio on a "pay-as-you-go basis" after four successive years in which the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has gone into debt fighting the only epidemic disease still on the increase in America.

"During the last four years," said Clifford M. Dahl, Wayne county campaign director, "the nation has experienced its worst polio years in history."

"The estimated deficit at the end of 1951 is \$5,000,000. Thus the 1952 March of Dimes will be mortgaged for this amount before any money may be set aside for scientific research on the disease organisms that lie ahead next summer," he said.

Christmas Seal Sales Lagging

Responses from 87 of the 140 outside Nebraska Christmas Seal chairmen for the selling period up to December 21, indicates sales in approximately half the communities are still under reports for the same number of selling days last year," states Delmar R. Serafy, Nebraska Tuberculosis association official.

"The first report this year indicated a decrease of approximately five per cent outstate; today's figures are still two per cent less than the same period last year. Total sales for outstate communities reporting at this time show a gross of \$80,278.85 compared with \$81,413.46 in 1950. Final sales for these areas in 1950 totaled \$96,515.12. Goal is \$45,000.

This shows the total still \$16,236.27 less than last year's final sales in these communities. This year's state goal of \$183,000.

Wayne Couple Mark 1586 Phones Used in Wayne Area

More telephones than ever before are being used in this area. W. G. Schulz, manager of the Wayne office of Northwestern Bell Telephone company announced.

Since 1947, 551 telephones have been added to the Wayne jurisdiction to run the total number of telephones handled by local operators to 1586. There were 1035 phones in service in 1941.

In the past year, 35 telephones have been added to the switchboard. An average of 4,500 calls are handled daily and sometimes as high as 7,000 calls are completed, handled daily.

700 Circuits Installed

An additional 44,000 has been installed in the Wayne plant during 1951 and two more toll circuits to Sioux City were installed.

In the Wayne area 401 farmers have telephone service and 51 residents have extension telephones.

There are 47 employees in the Wayne office, 13 of whom are operators.

Two Wayne Men Hurt In Accident

Two Wayne men suffered injuries in a two-car crash four miles west of Norfolk Saturday night.

Harold Kohrt, 23, received possible internal injuries, several broken bones in the right arm and severe cuts on both hands. His condition was described as "not so good."

Leonard Jensen, 21, driver of the auto, suffered possible broken ribs, chest injuries and bruises. Jensen's injuries were not thought to be too serious. Both are in a Norfolk hospital.

The accident happened, Patrolman Hugh Spradling reported, as an eastbound car, driven by J. B. Hammond, Norfolk, pulled out of a filling station and rammed Jensen's huto which was also going east.

Pinned in Wreckage

Jensen's auto hit a bridge railing and burst off the steel railing. The impact threw Kohrt into the rear of the car where he was pinned in the wreckage.

Blacktop Construction Planned

State highway engineers have released information which indicates relocation of Highway 35 from Hoskins to Wayne.

Latest reports from the State Roads and Irrigation department reveal the following changes:

The Norfolk to Hoskins route will be essentially the same as highway 81 connecting with highway 35.

North to 98

From Hoskins the road will be routed east to a point five miles south of Winside. From there the road will be constructed straight north through Winside to the present highway 98 and into Wayne.

Proposed plans call for construction of blacktop to begin on the west end of the project in 1952.

Present highway 35 between Hoskins and highway 15 Junction four miles south of Wayne will become Federal secondary roads to be maintained essentially as at present but by the county and local governments.

OBITUARY

Louis C. Nuernberger was born Feb. 16, 1879, in Putnam county, Ill. to Mr. and Mrs. Louis Nuernberger. He died at 12:30 a.m. Dec. 25 after suffering three strokes the previous day.

In 1883 Mr. Nuernberger moved to this community with his parents to a farm south of Wakefield in Wayne county.

After attending elementary schools in the Wakefield community, he attended Wayne State Teachers and graduated from the University of Nebraska in 1907.

He was married to Amy Leonard Jan. 16, 1907, in Wakefield and to this union were born four children, three sons and a daughter, Robert E. Little Rock, Ark. Marvin, Craig, and Louis Dean and Faith Marie, Wakefield. He is also survived by his widow.

Mr. Nuernberger operated a general store in Wakefield from 1904 until 1924 when he retired. From 1915 to 1920 he was vice president of the First National bank of Wakefield, and from 1915 until 1935 he was president of the Wakefield school board.

Mr. Nuernberger was elected to the state legislature in 1931 and again from 1935 to 1937 when he served on several committees: education, fees and salaries, banking, railroads and communications, highways and bridges, and public welfare.

He also served as a member of the Dixon county selective service board for several years. At the time of his death, Mr. Nuernberger had reached the age of 72 years, 10 months and nine days. He was a member of Corinthian Lodge No. 83, A. F. & M., York Rite of Norfolk, Tangier Shrine of Omaha, and a Goodwill Ambassador of the Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben, besides being an active member of the Wakefield Lions club and active in church affairs.

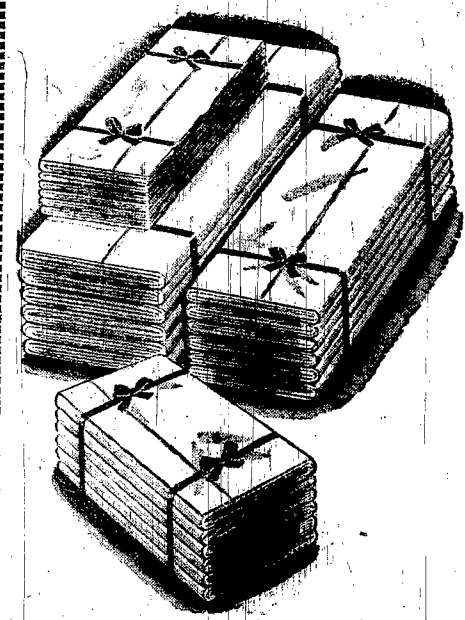

Wayne State's Wildcat basketball squad is ushering in the New Year in the Morningside invitational tournament at Sioux City, which started Wednesday and will wind up with the final Saturday night.

Other teams which will be in Sioux City for the invitational are Sioux Falls college, Westminster college, Yankton college, Manhattan (Miss.) State Teachers college, Buena Vista college, Omaha university and Morningside.

The Wildcat's schedule calls for an opening with the Braves of Sioux Falls at 5:30 Wednesday afternoon. The records of the two teams so far this season gives the Wildcats a slight margin over the Sioux Falls squad.

The Wayne teachers ring up a victory on their first round, they will meet the winner of the Westminster-Yankton college game (probably Westminster) Friday evening. This would be the third meeting of the two teams this season, the Cats having dropped two narrow-margin games in December, 58-62 and 54-61.

Coach Chuck Obye says that the local squad is in top form for the Morningside tournament, and that they are confident that with an accurate passing game and their own confidence in their ability as a team, they will be finalists in the tournament Saturday night.

On the floor at the opening whistle will be Mike Mallette, sophomore from Hooper, and Bob Tushla, 6-4, freshman from Atkinson. Both of whom have shown aggressive play so far this year, in the guard spots. Don Trogen, high-scoring junior from Wayne, and Freshman Ted Lindberg, 6-ft., 3-in. from O'Neill at forward; and Carl "The Moose" Johnson, last year's scoring champ from McLean at center.

The Wildcats will open their conference season against Nebraska Wesleyan in Lincoln, January 12. After meeting Midland in Fremont, January 15, the Wildcats will play their first home conference tilt with Doane, January 19.

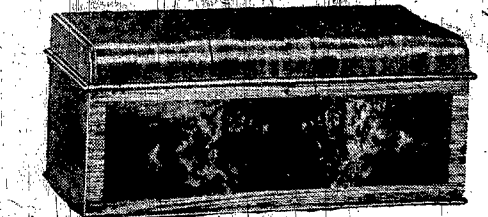

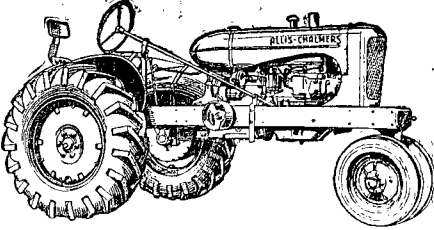

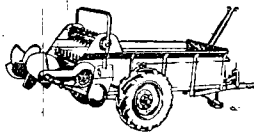
