Review of 1951 Indicates City's Growth Continues

The city of Wayne continued to move ahead in 1951. Figures compiled by the Chamber of Commerce indicate a steady, healthy growth of the city and its facilities.

The community added \$450,000 in residential housing during 1951. Commercial improvements were just below the \$100,000 mark. The boys' dormitory at the college campus neared completion during the past year adding to the construction totals. Final cost will be about \$400,000.

Utility figures of for further progress through the period road water use below record totals - but 118,114.00 gallons were pumped into the mains. Electricity consumption, usually considered a reliable indicator of general community health, reached a new record. Light plant superintendent Norbert Bretzger reports an output of 1,736,810 kilowatts as compared with the 1,400,000 figure for 1950.

December, 1951, produced the high monthly high 24 hour period and high 15 minute load in history of the plant, Thursday Dec. 20, was the high day. The year saw six days when the plant generated more than 16,000 kw and on day when the load hit 17,000 kw.

Gas company officials estimate a 15 per cent increase in natural gas production is now serving with the city.

County Judge Crossland Fines '51 Violators \$1,860

County Judge W. A. Crossland fined 148 violators during the past year for violations.

Most of the arrests made were traffic cases handled by city, county and state officers.

The record book showed the violators donated \$1,860 for their mistakes. This total was \$395 less than the sum taken in during 1950 when 32,225 in fines were levied on 152 arrests. These figures do not include court costs.

January was the busiest month for Judge Crossland when he fined 14 persons \$290.

Monthly amounts received from fines were: January, \$115; February, \$165; March, \$35; April, \$125; May, \$270; June, \$155; July, \$175; August, \$70; September, \$125; October, \$120; November, \$115; and December, \$290.

The past 12 months. The increase would be much greater if production and distribution bottlenecks had not been created by the international situation.

Telephone officials report that more telephones than ever before are being used in this area. In the past year 37 telephones have been added to the switchboard to send the total number handled by local operators to 1586.

Additional cause for pride lies in the municipal financial status. Original paving bonds for the city totaled about \$900,000 in 1922, with \$195,000 being refunded in 1932. At the turn of this year, final payment was made and the entire debt is off the books.

Total bonded indebtedness of the municipality today is \$83,279.45, with \$5,000 due on the auditorium by 1954; \$4,000 due on airport in 1954; \$20,000 due on library in 1963; and the remainder in paving district 15, 17 and 19.

Post office officials reported gross postal receipts hit a new high in 1951 at \$38,390.33. Although the Wayne post office failed to hit the \$40,000 figure needed to obtain first class status, postal authorities are confident that 1952 will be the year.

First class status would mean a change in accounting and a possible increase in employment. Receipts for the year were \$268,707 higher than in 1950, when the total was \$38,091.63. This may not seem like much of an increase but mailing costs are generally "pennies" rather than "dollars."

miscellaneous matters and parcels not exceeding eight ounces in weight.

Special delivery letters and other first class mail not exceeding two pounds will be 20 cents. Rates on other classes may be obtained at the postoffice.

The minimum charge for registered mail has been increased from 25 cents to 30 cents. The new 30 cent rate does not carry \$5 indemnity that the old rate carried, but insures only safe delivery. It now costs 40 cents to secure the \$5 indemnity.

Rates for insuring parcels valued at not more than \$50 will be the same, but it will cost 20 cents to insure packages valued at not more than \$100 and 35 cents for those valued at not more than \$200.

Return receipts for insured and registered mail costs seven cents in stead of five.

Second Class Mail
Second class mail, newspapers and magazines, will be raised to two cents for the first two ounces of weight and one cent for each additional two ounces. This increase becomes effective April 1.

Our blanket of snow continues to stay with us. The only thawing day in the past week was Tuesday.

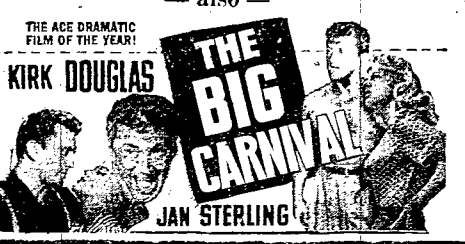
Weather recorder Archie Wert reports Friday's (1 inch) of snow contained 87 of an inch of moisture for the only precipitation recorded in the past seven days.

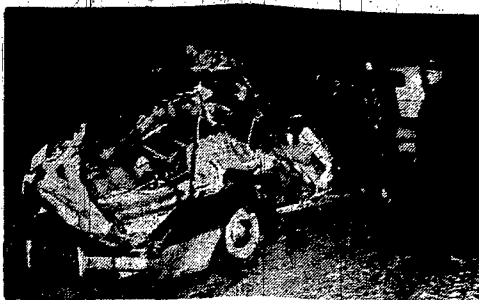

Construction, Flying of Model Planes Bud McNatt's Hobby

If anyone sees a small, bright red plane aimlessly gliding through the air, probably in a circle, please notify Bud McNatt immediately. Some time ago he was flying a free-flight plane when it got in a cross wind and left the country, and the plane not like Lassie did not come home.

Started When Nine
McNatt began the hobby when he was nine years old, being drawn to the adventure of aviation as almost all small boys. He has made 300 planes inclusive he estimated, many have been given away and he has sold several. He has eight hanging in the hardware store downtown.

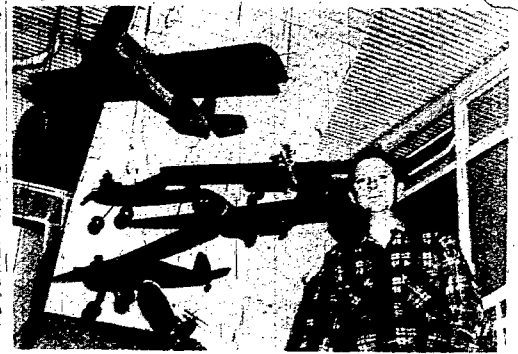
The first plane he built was a wind-up rubber band powered plane, which came in a kit to be cut out and assembled. The plane parts were made of balsa wood and tissue paper and his first construction took him about three days to finish.

First Gas Model
When he was 15 years old he made his first gas model, a free-flight one which had a seven-foot wing span. After the war he completed the rest of the planes. He has flown many of them at the golf course.

Besides the free-flight plane, those which run without any guide, there is the control line plane controlled by an operator on the ground. The "U-Really-Control" consists of a reel and two steel wires. The reel may be let out for more length, but the common length is 75 feet. These may be guided to operate almost any stunt from the loop to the figure eight all performance depending upon the operator.

From \$8 to \$95
His model airplanes range in price from \$8 to \$95 with almost every type done at one time. The \$95 plane which took three weeks to make, has a horsepower engine which makes 32,000 RPM and the engine is so loud that the owner stuffs cotton in his ears before operating the plane.

To fly the "U-Really-Control" planes, the following steps are needed: wire hand control, fuel and fuel pump and starting batteries. There are two kinds of motors, the ignition type with coils and condensers and batteries, and the diesel type. The latter requires a telephone battery to start and runs on its own power when warmed up.

Gas needed to fly these two ranges from a tablespoonful to several tablespoonsful. Some run for a minute before running out, and others run for several half minutes. The planes are operated by flipping the propeller over with the forefinger.

Covered with Silk

The wings and body of the model in construction are covered with silk. Several coats of dope are used to finish the model, strength and appearance. A first coating covering is used to protect the finish from the elements of the motor. Balloon tires are used for shock absorbers.

McNatt describes building model airplanes as a "nerve wracking job" but recommends that young fellows with an artistic perspective. He encourages boys to follow his hobby, because the educational standpoint and because he feels it important that young men not lack some constructive to do as an avocation. He wishes information to those who wishes it.
