That story is tetifeless manner in which our free press a hammered home day after day, chaper by chapter, shocking facts about the insupercere and corruption of countless ablic officials to say nothing of the grand hemes of bureaucratic spenders of tax nds to socialize and control industry, orkers and consumers.

orkers and consumers.

Never in the history of this country has a free press stood more solidly between rivate citizens and oppression.

We all owe it a permanent debt of gratide for the manner in which is has ferted out weaknesses, dogma, and whiteash in matters ranging all the way from reign policy to government administration.

foreign policy to government administration.

Few people appreciate the scope of the American press. It is as yest as it is unique. It consists of highly efficient wire services, several hundred metropolitan publications, many of whose names are bywords in the home, plus more than eleven thousand country daily and weekly newspapers owned and operated by thousands of editors who fully realize that back of all our political, international, about a simple principles we must adhere to in order to make our ountry tick.

They know that to enjoy the liberties our forefathers fought for, we must save the system which they built to giarantee them.

A major item of good news is the fact

A major/item of good news is the fact that such editors in every corner of the land have risen with unprecedented vigor to challenge the threat to personal free-dom and national survival that faces the nation from within.

dom and national survival trat races the nation from within.

That this threat is real and iminent should be ominously evident to all. More federal taxes have been collected from the American people, in the last seven years than in all preceding years since the founding of the nation—some \$260,000,000,000 from 1739 through Jane 30, 1945; which includes of course the years of World Wars I and II.
