That 50th Postcard

Another of those federal government oundrums is to be noted in the increase, if postal rates which took effect all over ne nation on January 1.

That, question is how is it possible for cach of the first 49 postcards, bearing two cents postage, to cost two cents each for a total of 98c, when the fiftieth one brings the total cost of \$1.10? According to the regulations which have been sent out, that is the procedure; and the fiftieth will cost 12c.

These further regulations are issued, or inless the local postmasters set up a different procedure, it is expected that most orlers will be given in the 49 quantity. Unquestionably, it will require a bit more work to handle the odd quantity, but when 82 can be saved on a 1,000 postcard order, here is no question but that folks will atempt to make theisaving. Of course, it may require 21 trips and a purchase of 49 cards on 20 trips and 20 on the final one to get he complete order—but then \$2 is \$2.

What the motive is back of the department order is hard to understand—just like a lot of other orders which emanate from Washington.

The idea has been advanced that the order is probably attempting to do away with the extensive use of the postcard in every attegory of life, but for all liwho have used cards, it is evident that the use will still go on.
