### Cash for the Farmer

When it comes to cash income, meat is to biggest thing in the life of the farmer.

Last year meat animals brought him the nice round sum of \$9,500,000,000,000 almost one-third of his entire cash income from all crops plus government rayments. No other single source of income came even close to the receipts from meat.

And the meat income was \$1,000,000,000,000 greater than in 1949.

The virtue of livestock, from the farmers point of view, is that it can be raised in factically all locations and on any scale rom one animal, up. There are great suches, which produce thousands of head!

But a very large percentage of the meat we consume is found, in the accumulated supply produced by farmers who raise a few animals each year as a sure and steady source of cash.

In the meat business, there is room for ll, and all are needed.

A healthy meat industry is of the highest mportance to the farmer and rancher—ust as it to the consumer, who wants his tasks and chops and hamburger to be vailable when he desires them.

That kind of a meat industry was built in the free, competitive market, under the supply-and-demand economic system. And the pity is that that kind of market is always undermined and weakened when government takes hold of the reins with price and other controls.

We are seeing that now—with meat scarifies in many consuming centers, growing lack markets, and dislocations all along he line in the normal process of production and distribution.

In the long pull, a controlled economy arms everyone—except the bureaucrats. When it comes to cash income, meat is e biggest thing in the life of the farmer.
