Public Power Districts Hold Meet Here

R. O. Haas, Wayne, was general chairman of the administrative leadership conference of public power districts in this region Monday and Tuesday at Wayne's REA building.

Eight districts included, besides Wayne, were the Elkhorn Rural of Battle Creek, Cumby Rural of West Point, Niobrara Valley of O'Neill, North Central Nebraska Rural of Creighton, Northeast Nebraska of Emerson, Stanton County Rural of Stanton, and Cedar-Knox County of Hartington.

Forty managers and six directors were present, including six representatives of the public power district. These were M. E. Hays, Denver, Colo., and Dave Miller, of the management division; Kirkbride, Lincoln, and Huff, Denver, with the engineering group; Ed Kaska, auditor of the power; and Howard Fredrich, Lincoln, of the applications and loans division.

Conferences have been held all this week in different sections of the state, and the region comprises members of Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado and Wyoming.

Hays reported that the REA's in Nebraska are not delinquent on debt service payment, and in most cases advanced payment have been made. Over \$8,000,000 on principle and interest have been paid to the REA since its beginning.

Topics for 1952 discussed were operating and maintenance, employee relations and training problems, financial planning and management, besides debate and discussion concerning the making of policies and different sections in the power supply program.

34 Counties Instead of 93 Suggested in Nebraska County Consolidation Plan—by Camp

Farm Bureau Secretary 'Probes' County Mergers

The Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation is probing the matter of county consolidation for Nebraska. In the January issue of Nebraska Agriculture, published by this farm organiza-

tion, its editor, Bernie Camp, wonders why no strong movement has never developed to consolidate counties. Citing a suggestion along this line he made in May 1950, he said, "We wonder if such consolidation would not provide more efficient county government and lower taxes. Our county governments were set up in the days of the horse

and buggy, when it took all day to get to the county seat and back home from most parts of the county. It's something to think about. And, apparently having thought about it, Camp presents his plan for county consolidation, which he said is, "Merely a suggestion to get folks to thinking about it. To see what can be developed in the way of simplifying county boundaries in Nebraska."

Editor Camp's suggestions follow: "County government is expensive and often guilty of extravagances, particularly under a system which divides the county into commissioner districts with each commissioner administering his own district. It becomes expensive and extravagant when each commissioner feels that his district must have a full complement of road building equipment. Such extravagance is often encouraged and abetted by the equipment companies whose salesmen are anxious to make bigger and better commissions on equipment sold the county."

"Nebraska has 93 counties which represent as many county administrations, and in cases where the commission system of government is used, as many opportunities to be wasteful and extravagant in equipment purchases. Each separate county administration includes a county sheriff, attorney, treasurer, judge clerk, board of commissioners or supervisors, superintendent and other officers and deputies."

"The suggested consolidation calls for a total of 34 counties instead of 93, eliminating 59 county governments. County governments and county boundaries were laid out in the days of the horse and buggy, and in those days (1850 to 1860) the counties were efficient government units, being generally of a size convenient for the available transportation. Since those days the speed of transportation has increased 15 or 20 times, figuring the speed of the horse and buggy as 3 to 4 miles an hour and that of the modern automobile as 45 to 60 miles an hour. Today in a modern automobile as much ground can be covered in fifteen minutes as was covered in half a day when these county governments were organized."

"By combining present-day counties a number of advantages would be gained. 1. Reduction of the number of sets of county officials, permitting savings in administrative costs. 2. Probable reduction of county tax assessments, or, at least, making available the savings in administrative costs for such services as better roads and modernization of road systems. 3. Modernization of county offices, and possibly elimination of unnecessary and outmoded functions."

"The reorganization and consolidation of county governments ought to be part of a general overall modernization of county government, including: 1. Legal prohibition of splitting counties up into commissioner districts for administrative purposes; and a legal requirement that county boards of commissioners and supervisors act as a board of directors whose primary job is that of setting policy not administering it. Such reorganization of county government might well consider the possibility of making the office of county commissioner or supervisor attractive from a standpoint of sufficient salary and prestige, with legal provisions against the acceptance of gifts and honorariums from equipment and supply companies for purchases made. 2. At present county commissioners and supervisors bear a heavy responsibility with little recogni-

tion. Salaries of commissioners and supervisors are on a per diem basis or of similar low pay for the job done. For some the temptation to accept gifts and honorariums is viewed as an opportunity to make up salary deficiencies. For the man who is completely and scrupulously honest, administration of county business, the sacrifice of time and personal interests is great."

"2. Legal requirement that all county purchases be made through a county purchasing office; and that all but minor purchases be made on a basis of competitive bids let at publicly called meetings. Records of all bids presented, including those accepted and those rejected, should become a part of the public record, kept on file in the office of the county clerk."

"3. All equipment owned by the county should be listed in an annual inventory which shows the original purchase price, purchase date, annual depreciation, and similar data to make it possible for any citizen to go to his county treasurer and trace the history of any piece of equipment, particularly heavy road building equipment."

"Since road and bridge building is the primary job of county government, it might be well to require in addition that on Jan. 1 of each year, the county commissioners be required to file with the county clerk and publish in county newspapers a proposed program and mile by mile map for county road and bridge activities during the year ahead."

"4. At the same time the commissioners might be required to file with the county clerk a map and report mile by mile of road and bridge work accomplished during the past year and the costs of that work."

"These records would be available to any citizen and taxpayer who wanted to examine them. Furthermore, prominently located in the county courthouse should be a large map of the county, showing all the road systems in the county, which would be kept up-to-date as to work accomplished and work proposed."

"Such a broad program of county government reorganization is not likely to be received with enthusiasm by present office holders and their friends because it would mean the elimination of approximately two-thirds of the county political jobs in Nebraska, forcing that number of presently employed county personnel to look for new jobs."

"The only way in which such simplification and consolidation can be accomplished is by unified and consistent demand of taxpayers."

"Nebraska laws already provide the legal provision for consolidation of county governments. (Revised Statutes of Nebraska, 1943, Article 4, Consolidation of Counties, Sections 22-401 to 22-407.) This law, however, provides for action by two or more adjoining counties. In the case of the proposed consolidation, this law probably would not apply; therefore, making necessary legislative action to provide the machinery for statewide county reorganization and consolidation. There is the possibility that such reorganization and consolidation could require amendment of the State Constitution also."

"The job of county consolidation is not one to be lightly undertaken, for its effects would be far-reaching. It is something that should have wide discussion throughout the state. It is impossible to accomplish, even though it is improbable that it will be done in the foreseeable future."

"Some day such reorganization and consolidation may come, but it will have to be in answer to a consistent and persistent demand on the part of taxpayers, after a long period of education and study."

Certainly it is quite encouraging to witness youngsters this age with so much enthusiasm about a designated hobby. Her interest will no doubt grow to a more profitable pastime.

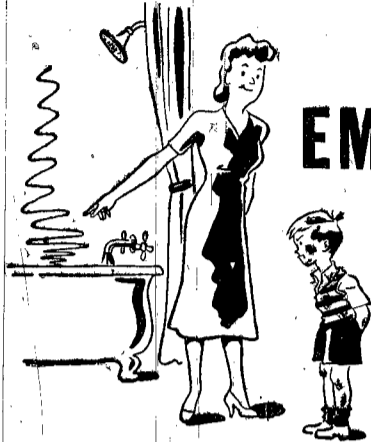
