Rainy Year Cuts Down Soil Work

Wayne county farmers received \$38,167.67 in payments for Group I soil conservation practices during 1951. It was announced Wednesday by T. P. Roberts, PMA official.

In 1950, \$60,000.82 in checks were sent to county farmers. A total of \$60,000 was allocated but soil practices in 1951 fell below expectation because of unusual amount of rainfall during the spring and summer months.

Group I practices are under the supervision of the Wayne County Soil Conservation district. The district has four soil officials assisting the farmers with their programs.

Officials stated no active campaign to increase the number of farmers participating in the program was staged this year. Most of the efforts were directed toward education of the younger people in soil conservation.

Following is a partial list of new conservation work done in Wayne county during 1951:

Contour farming, 2,598 acres; pasture seeding, 392 acres; tree planting, 30 acres; farm ponds, 28; terraces, 49 miles; farm drainage, 115 miles; outlets and waterways, 164 acres; stubble mulch tillage, 337 acres; rotation hay and pasture, 2,998 acres; wildlife area development, 42 acres; field diversions, 4 miles; tile drainage, 8,400 feet and roadside erosion control, 56 miles.

Pfc. Mann Sends Word to Parents about Leg Injury

Pfc. Lowell A. Mann sent word this week to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur C. Mann, Wayne, telling them of his wound received fighting in Korea on Jan. 12.

According to the letter, Pfc. Mann suffered a mortar shrapnel wound to the back of his left leg below the knee.

The wounded serviceman was treated in the hospital at Tyjon, located a short distance from Pusan. He stated the wound is not serious and that he can now get around with crutches.

Following is a short summary from his letter on the Korea fighting:

Company E of the 180th Infantry regiment was ordered to take an objective beginning at mid-night on Jan. 12. The position to be attacked was put under artillery fire for 15 minutes before the advance was made.

Pfc. Mann reported his outfit got within 50 yards of the top of the hill to be taken when the platoon leader gave orders to fall back as communications had been knocked out and an order for needed support could not be put through.

It was when the company was making its way back down the hill that the Wayne serviceman was wounded. Although he was hit shortly after starting back down, he was able to continue under his own power.

He was taken to the hospital and underwent surgery for removal of the shrapnel the same night.

Company E was sent into a reserve area after the battle, and Mann reported all of the Nebraska boys came through the engagement without injuries.

Under the baton of Serge Koussevitzky at the Berkshire Music festival, she played with the Boston symphony. In Vancouver, B.C., under Jacques Singer, she introduced the Violin Concerto of the American composer David Diamond.

Violin Dates 1711 "Dorothea Powers" concert violin, "The Earl of Plymouth" Stradivarius, bears the date 1711. The violin was found in the disused lumber room of the manor of the Earl of Plymouth in Cardiff, Wales, where it lay, clogged with the dust of 200 years.

Miss Powers will appear Sunday in the last of the Wayne Community Concert series.

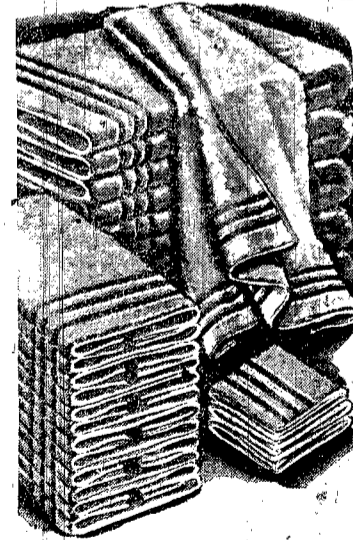

Larry Doby is on third base.

Around the chalk-lined arena, 30,000 persons are straining themselves in tense expectancy. The score is tied. Two men are out. The fate of the game centers on the white-bloused figure that shuttles back and forth near third. Indians and Yanks stand up at their benches, for the decisive moment has come.

Doby is at third.

Now! There is a white streak across the field! A cloud of dust at home plate! The umpire stands with his hands extended, palms downward.

A burst of roaring acclaim echoes and re-echoes across the space of the park. Again it bursts forth in thrilling, electric power: Sixty thousand eyes strain toward the man who is slapping dust from his white uniform.

DOBY IS HOME!

All the world's a baseball diamond. You are one of the players. Perhaps you have reached first by your own efforts. It may be that the sacrifices of your parents and friends have enabled you to reach second. Then on someone's "long fly" into the business world—a "fly" that was not "long" enough to prevent him going out—or someone's fluke on the rules of simple morality and square dealing, you have advanced to third.

The opposition against you at third is stronger than at either first or second. At third you are to be reckoned with. Your opponents converge all their attention on you. Pitchers and catchers, coaches and opposing fans, are watching to tip off your plans and frustrate them. From third you become either a splendid success or a dismal failure.

Don't die on third.

What are you doing to win the score that life is ready to make up against your name? Third base has no laurels on which you can rest. What are you doing on third? Are you waiting for someone to "bat you in"? Suppose he misses; his miss is yours, too! If you place all your dependence on someone else, his failure spells yours.

Doby's run was not a foolhardy dash. It was deliberate, mathematical work. Any fool could have led off spectacularly, but only a trained body and an alert mind could have stolen home right under the nose of the catcher whose hands were closing over the ball.

Even a game means work. Work itself is a game and has its rules as its sudden openings.

So, don't die on third.

Bring to third every bit of your honest strength; study conditions; postpone thinking of your luck until you hear the umpire call "safe."

Then you'll score all right.

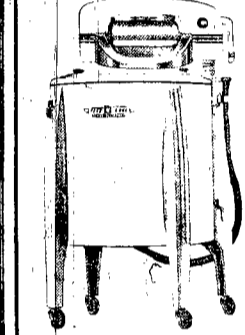
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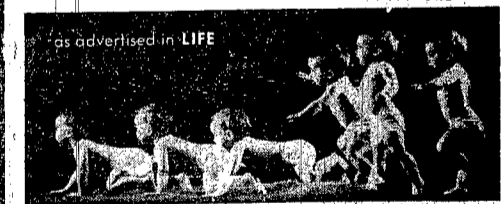


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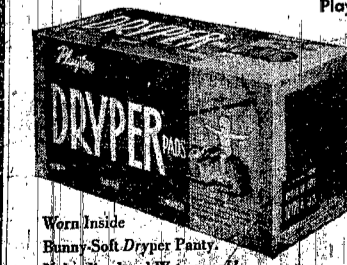
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Wayne Prep, Wayne High Score Cage Wins Friday

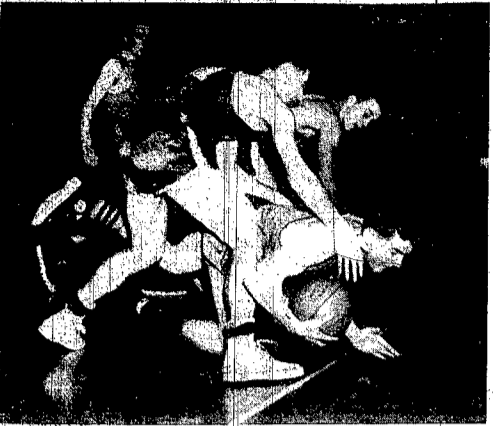
