Economic Situation

General economic conditions during the fourth quarter of 1951 displayed the high degree of overall stability which has prevailed since last summer. But many divergent shifts are taking place in production, construction, employment, and prices as the economy continues to turn but more defense goods. Increased output of defense goods has been offset by reduced output for non-defense uses, resulting in little changes in total industrial activity over the past few months.

Output of consumer durables in recent months has been running about one-third less than a year ago. This decline, partly due to restricted use of materials, reflects also a substantial certailment in consumer spending for durable goods.

The American consumer will have substantially less pork, about the same quantity of lamb and mutton but considerably more beef and weal in 1952 than a year earlier.

Throughout the first half of 1952, consumption of pork will continue at a high level. During the latter half of the year the reduced spring farrowing of pigs will result h cuts in pork supplies. In

Poultry . . .

Egg prices are expected to continue their seasonal decline. Spring production may be 4% above 1951. Storage holdings of frozen chickens and turkeys are larger and still rising.

Prices on All Grades Declining

Ster prices have followed expected seasonal price patterns in recent weeks. Prices declined during the month of December, 1951, and into January, 1952. In addition to the seasonal decline in prices, the prospect for continued declines in the beef-corn price ratio will further reduce the demand for and the price of medium grade cattle and







Prices discouragingly low. Hog-corn ratio very unfavorable; in U.S. 11.5, in Nebraska 10.5. Sow farrowing intentions down 9% in U.S. and 14% in Nebraska compared to a

feeder calves. Another factor which will influence prices is the poor keeping quality of much of the 1951 com crop. A cattle feeder who fills his yards with thin cattle this late in the season must be assured of sufficient sound corn to finish them during the summer.

Feeders who have adequate feed supplies may find it profitable to feed for the May-July market. The seasonal high in prices for the common to medium quality cattle comes usually during May-July.

Dairying . . .

Nebraska continues to ship in fluid milk from Wisconsin at high price. Nebraska produces about 75% of total needs. Storage stocks de-clining and production smaller than last year.

Prices of good and better grades of fat cattle usually have seasonal highs between September and November; seasonal lows in price are usually between February and June. Seasonal prices for the lower grade cattle, including feeder calves; have usually been reversed; that is, the seasonal highs have dome during the spring months and the lows have been during the fall months.

Feeds . . .


Stocks of corn on farms January 1 were down 34% from a year ago and 16% below ten-year average in Nebraska. Stocks of wheat were also 34% below last year, but stocks of oats and barley were slightly higher. Stocks of hay were up 15%. Nationally, stocks of corn, oats and barley were down, but wheat and rye were slightly up. About 13% of Nebraska's corn is still in the fields.

Taxes and the 'Little Fellow'






