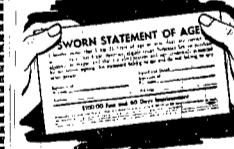

Another Step To Prevent Minors From Drinking

This sworn statement of age is another method the brewing industry recommends to discourage minors from misrepresenting themselves to retail licensees in an effort to purchase alcoholic beverages.

A youth of questionable age is required by the beer retailer to sign the statement, stating that he is 21 or over and that credentials he presents as proof are his own. Should he misrepresent his age, a minor is subject to a fine of \$100 or 60 days imprisonment, or both.

This is a severe penalty, but one that the brewing industry endorses. The industry strongly opposes drinking by minors. It has long cooperated with enforcement officers in repressing sales to those under legal age.

This is further recognition of the industry's sincere efforts to operate in the public interest.
