FFA District Convention Scheduled in Wayne Feb. 23; 16 Chapters to Be Here

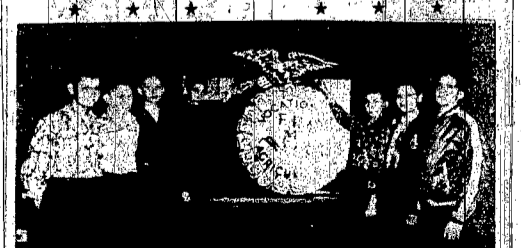

Orientation Course

The orientation course at the Campus school is divided into three parts—the educational, the vocational and the personality development of the student.

The first two developments are studied the first nine weeks, taking into consideration the broad areas of work students are interested in and have the capabilities for doing. In this first study, the students take tests and questionnaires to help them know their skills and aptitudes.

In selecting a vocation that they think they might like, the students plan notebook work on facts concerning the career—its advantages, disadvantages, hours of working, education, the experience necessary for advancement, and other necessary qualifications.

The two subjects education and vocation, are combined by finding how much education is needed in certain vocational fields. Students figure out how much study and how many years are necessary for particular occupations.

The second quarter, orientation students study personality development. Manners, etiquette, personality, dating, relationships with others in home and school, good grooming and understanding yourself are taken into consideration in this unit. Pamphlets and books are available to those who wish them for library reference work.

The orientation course, offered to freshmen, is planned to fit the needs and wishes of the students. The course is taught by Bill Weaver, guidance supervisor.

Algebra Class

The ninth grade algebra class has just completed a unit on simultaneous equations. They have discovered that in everyday environment many unknowns can be solved by using simultaneous equations.

They are now starting a unit on factoring and products. This knowledge will be later used in the solution of equations.

Geometry Class

The geometry class is now working with circles. Such properties as chords, arcs, central angles, tangents and secants are being discussed by the class. The class discovered that the circle is one of the greatest inventions of all times.

Commercial Arithmetic

Commercial arithmetic students are new experts on banking principles and methods. They have discussed the services a bank has to offer such as deposits, checking accounts, loans and mortgages. A quick way of computing interest at six per cent has been the paramount activity the last two days. Some of the students have had experience in getting the school's money ready for deposit in the bank. Milton J. Hassel is mathematics supervisor in the Campus school.

The PTA of the Campus school met Monday evening. Each of their regular meetings. "What our Town Needs" was the subject of panel discussion. Moderator of the panel was John Kyl, president of the local association. Other members of the panel were John Lewis, Clifford Dahl, Ed Bahe and Joel Jeffrey. Refreshments were served by the seventh and eighth grade mothers. Mrs. Ray Schreiner was chairman of the serving committee.

Second Grade

Since Christmas, the second graders have been very busy. They have been reading the books "Friends and Neighbors" and "Up and Away."

In arithmetic, the students have been learning more about telling time and about the use of the calendar. They have also been learning how to use such measures as the teaspoon, tablespoon, quart, pint, half-pint, gallon and cup. The students have been counting money by fives and tens. They have also been learning about the fractions one-half and one-fourth.

They have also been developing an understanding of superlatives. Also, the pupils have been talking about numbers.

Mrs. Emil Dupsky sent us an odd bulb in water.

In science they have been studying magnets. They have also been discussing the weather and keeping a weather diary. The students are

also learning to read the thermometer. In social studies, the class has been studying about the baker and his work. They visited a local bakery where Lloyd Bradford taught them many things. The students also saw a film called "Bread." It showed the work of a big city bakery.

Mrs. Henry Johnson, came to the classroom to tell the pupils how she makes bread at home. She brought samples of the various ingredients and mixed them together for them. They saw the bread rise. She told them why they use the various ingredients. She also treated them to sweet rolls that she had made in her kitchen at home.

Karen Beckenhauer, with the help of her father, brought the students wheat from the field that they may watch it grow. She also brought a jar of the grain and some binding twine.

Among other things they have been doing is to make a list of contractions and to learn the words for which each stands.

Since their Weekly Reader had a story about puppets in it, they made some puppets. Each of them told a story in which they used our puppets. Some of them played "The Three Pigs." The class is dramatizing "The Gingerbread Boy" and "Lazzy Jack." The students have also done some finger painting.

New student teachers in the room are: Evelyn Larson, Shirley Terwilliger, Alice Maier, Katharine Wendell and Dorothy Henshaw.

Third Grade

This week the science unit on magnets has been of great interest. The children experimented to find out what the magnet would lift. They learned about the magnetic field, how to make short time magnets of nails, needles and other interesting facts concerning the use of magnets.

Stories concerning travel in pioneer times are very popular at present.

A trip to the industrial arts shop to see some of the tools used in woodwork is being planned in connection with the housing unit.

We used an old-time metal candle mold to make some candles. The procedure used was as follows:

A string was knotted at one end and drawn through the mold for a wick, and at the other end the wick was fastened with wire in the mold. After several days we poured hot water over the mold to soften the candle a little on the outside and then it slipped right out. Now the class plans to find out how long the candle will burn.

Through the industrial arts shop instructor showed the class how a power saw and a lathe work. He gave the group some wood samples which will be used in the class exhibit.

In order to improve spelling, child helpers have been chosen to work with children who find it hard to learn their words.

Fourth Grade

Early in January, Frances De Eoerl college student from Rock Rapids, Ia., showed the class many articles from Holland and told them about a recent visit with relatives there. She has helped the children plan individual correspondence with boys and girls of Holland.

Miniature clay and dinosaurs were made in science class. Donna Hughes brought snapshots of dinosaur models she had seen in The Black Hills region.

Disk Jugel and Danny Beeman scored Michael Perry and Billy Regg as afternoon soccer team captains. Games were close but Billy Regg's side won the series.

Fifth Grade

The fifth grade has learned about the raising and use of rice and sugar cane which are produced in the coastal mixed farming region.
