Many Humorous Quips Made At Public Library by Residents

"That was a good book you gave me last week and I'd like another just like it." For a person who says that, Mrs. F. A. Milder, city librarian, has nothing but a blank stare and the silent question, "Which book?"

For one month the Wayne public library circulates 2,400 books and magazines, with 1,000 of those books checked out to children. Six hundred books are loaned to rural teachers and 400 magazines are checked out a month.

However, checking out books and magazines is not the only duty of the librarian, and Mrs. Milder enumerated a few of the other things done at the library.

Trains Assistants
"Most people think that dishing out books is the only thing we have to do, but really that is the smallest end of it," she stated. She trains her assistants during most of the time they are with her. Rita Kirwan has been there five years and Janis Derry is taking over for Mrs. Dale Thierolf who has been there a year and a half.

Other duties performed are cataloging and mending books and magazines, filing cards, caring for shelf books, rearranging magazines, sponsoring weekly story hours for two groups of children, making posters, and being general hostess to persons who expect to be entertained with idle chatter while there.

Telling the pre-school and school age children a story is just part of the task connected with the story book programs. There are wraps to be put on and taken off, discipline to be enforced, and many books and magazines to be checked out for the youngsters. The librarian also features art work in connection with her story hour. Many times as she tells the story, she illustrates the characters with clippings or drawings.

Other times she gives the children clay to mold characters or objects related to coming holidays. Last week they made heart-shaped vests for Valentine's day.

Groups Meet in Basement
Hobby groups and several club and committee meetings are held in the library basement. Last summer the library housed an art exhibition for the town's benefit.

And here is where high school and college researchers dwell upon volumes for themes. At times the books borrowed by some individuals seem questionable, but they are always "for a written paper at school."

"Library work is like housework; one person can't say what are and what aren't the monotonous jobs because everyone has a different impression," Mrs. Milder dislikes most filing the four cards for each of the many books.

When a new book comes in it is subjected to the following processing: The filing is done, back is shellacked and a reference number is imprinted; then the inside pocket is pasted into place.

It sounds relatively simple to discard a book, doesn't it? But it is "not as simple as it sounds" to quote the city librarian. All cards must be pulled and much book-work is required of this.

Wayne Rates High
Probably the extra duty which takes the most time is keeping

daily, monthly and yearly financial and circulation reports. The final yearly statistics are sent to the state library commission, and the commission in turn issues a report to all libraries in the state so that each town may see how it stands. Wayne's circulation has been one of the highest in per capita rating for several years.

Mrs. Milder has worked in the Wayne library since 1938 and has been head librarian since 1944. To her it seems that she has done that type of work all her life. She was librarian in the West Point Sunday school and church when she was in her "teens." The only time off from her library work was to raise her two children.

From her work with books evolve many humorous tales, many familiar and unheeded behind-the-counter happenings.

One day a few minutes before opening time, a woman marched militarily to the desk and announced to the librarian that she didn't like that book which Mrs. Milder had recommended. The latter had a difficult time convincing the lady that some books appeal to some persons and do not appeal to others. The local book committee tries to provide books read all over the United States, and folks may choose their favorites from that versatile group.

Many persons believe that librarians live, eat and sleep in the library, and they abandon library hours completely. One such person was a lady who always waited until five minutes before closing time to bring in a box of books to be checked in, and to check out a box full again.

A favorite visitor of the librarians, a little boy who is very punctual about the closing hours, was there one day commenting about the new watch he had received for Christmas. Every five minutes the child took out the watch to check on the time.

At five o'clock this day the child curiously announced to Mrs. Milder and the lady with the box of books that it was closing time, wasn't it? However, only the child went home and the woman remained until 20 minutes after five. Mrs. Milder would like to rent that child and his punctual watch.

Another child afforded a laugh

to the librarians when she sighed and said, "Mama finally got a new baby, so I can come to story hour again." It seems mothers with new babies are busier and have less time for older children.

Adults also furnish humorous moments. There is an elderly gentleman who makes the library his second home, tediously copying volumes from encyclopedias, and trying with such diligence to find an error in the volumes of knowledge. One day he read that a pharaoh had put his son to death, and would not believe even Mrs. Milder who assured him that it had been done several times in days long ago.

Jumbled Titles
Even funnier are the jumbled titles of books given the librarians by waiting readers-to-be. A girl one day insisted that the name of her book was "Murdered by the Inches." Mrs. Milder finally found the book, entitled "Murder in the Yard."

Anyone such as Mrs. Milder, who is provided with a wealth of material should write a book, and perhaps the librarian will someday contain an anecdote of the week. At any rate, being librarian in a small town is not boring.

"The book that disappears most and stays out the longest is Emily Post's 'Book of Etiquette,' and second is 'Robert's Rules of Order.'"

Sometimes Mrs. Milder serves as an information bureau. Once a phone caller asked "Could you tell me whether Truman is a democrat or republican?" After Mrs. Milder reassured the voice that the president was a democrat, it spoke: "Goody, I won my bet!"

Children always have an innocent way of completely obliterating anyone's hope for success! Rita Kirwan was alphabetizing cards one evening for the following day. This is a process that somewhat resembles the game of "solitaire." A Wayne child, was sitting her in turn, as she shuffled the cards around. He asked her how much her salary was and when she replied he said, "That is quite a lot for just piddling around like that, and talking to people all the time!" There was no silence in the library for several minutes after that.

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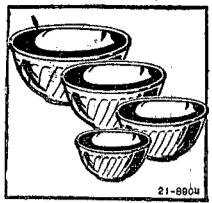

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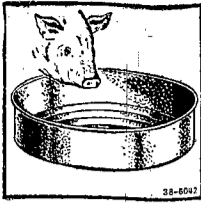
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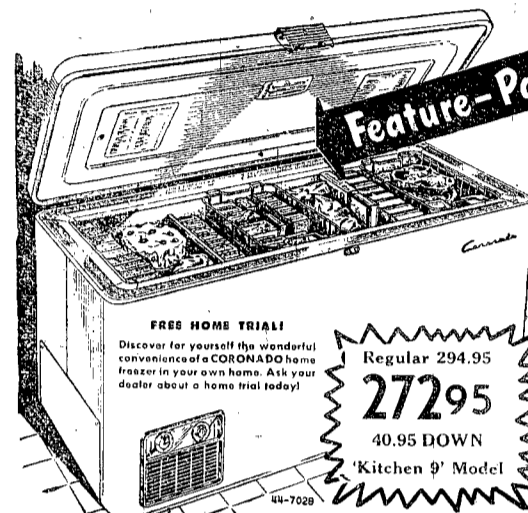
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
