District Declamatory Contest Scheduled in Wayne March 22

150 Students Are Expected By Officials

Nearly 150 high school students from 21 northern Nebraska towns will meet on the Wayne State campus Saturday, March 22, to participate in the Nebraska High School District Declamatory Contest. The contest is a district-wide event and is expected to attract a large number of spectators.

The student orators will compete in original oratory, extemporaneous speaking, dramatic reading, oratorical reading, humorous reading, poetry reading, radio newscasting and discussion. Each contestant will be rated according to his ability by one of the four judges who will take part in the meet.

The one-act plays will be performed in the auditorium, and the judges will award ratings of superior, excellent, good, etc., rather than prizes.

Schools entered in the contest when it is open to the public for a small admission fee are:

Judges are: L. Lasse, D. S. Williams, C. T. Fleck, and John Wiley, all from the University of Nebraska speech department; George Criswell, director of public relations at Wayne State, is contest director.

Northern Natural Gas company today filed an application with the Securities and Exchange Commission to dissolve its wholly-owned subsidiary, Peoples Natural Gas company, as a corporation.

If the dissolution is approved, Peoples, which serves Wayne, would operate under its present name as a division of Northern.

Northern would acquire the assets and assume the liabilities of Peoples and surrender to its subsidiary its stock for cancellation.

Funeral services were held at 1:45 Tuesday afternoon at the Sultz Funeral home and at 2 p. m. at St. Paul's Lutheran church.

Interment was at the Pilger cemetery.

PMA Slates Meeting for Check of 1953 Practices

The Wayne county PMA committee has slated a meeting of seven farm agents Monday afternoon, March 17, at the REA building in Wayne beginning at 1 p. m.

The meeting was called so that recommendations and approval can be given the state Agricultural Conservation program handbook for 1953. County programs must also be approved.

As all farmers in the county must be personally contacted by committee men, it is necessary to get the practices approved well in advance of January, 1953.

The following agencies will take part in the determination of appropriate and recommendations:

Wayne County PMA community committee; governing body of the Soil Conservation district; FHA county committee; county Agricultural Extension Agent; county supervisor of FHA; Soil Conservation service technicians; and Vocational Agricultural instructors at Wayne State Teachers college.

The county recommendations as to changes in or additions to the general provisions and practices now contained in the National ACP handbook and state ACP handbook will be made at this meeting and forwarded to the state PMA office before March 31, 1952.

Chest X-ray Schedule Announced

The Wayne county chest X-ray survey, its goal the free chest X-raying of every adult in the county, will begin in Carroll on Wednesday, March 26. It was announced this week by Mrs. George H. Owens, chairman.

Encouraged by Wayne county physicians as "an excellent health program," the Wayne county X-ray survey will utilize the X-ray unit owned and operated by the State Department of Health, in giving free chest X-rays to all who wish them.

The X-raying schedule for the county is: Carroll: March 26; Jan 27, Wayne State Teachers college: March 31, April 1 and 2; Wayne: April 4, 5 (a. m.), 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 14 (p. m.) and 15; Winside: April 17 and 18; Hogkiss: April 23.

"This should be one of the most important community enterprises that Wayne county has sponsored in years," Chairman Owens said. "This is not merely a tuberculosis survey—it is a chest X-ray survey. Where any abnormal condition in the chest is noted, including tuberculosis, cancer, heart disease, or other conditions, the individual is referred to his or her personal physician for further observation."

Any adult, including children of high school age, may receive a chest X-ray.

Open House Will Allow Inspection

Morey Hall, Wayne State's new \$500,000 residence hall will officially welcome visitors at an open house Sunday afternoon from 2 until 5:30 o'clock.

Parents, faculty, alumni and friends of the college are invited to inspect the new hall, which will house men students during the regular year and women students during the summer sessions.

The opening of Morey hall Sunday culminates the efforts of nearly three years' careful planning and construction, pointed toward making the new residence hall one of the most modern and comfortable residences of its kind.

The need for additional permanent housing for students on the Wayne State campus was expressed by the late President Victor P. Morey, after whom the hall was named, in the summer of 1949. Although several solutions were proposed, including the purchase and remodeling of buildings already in existence in Wayne, the desirability of a hall comparable to those already on the campus seemed evident in view of the permanent need for housing.

In August of 1949, President Morey submitted preliminary plans for the new dormitory to the board of state normal schools, with the basic design which has been changed only slightly since.

John Latowar and Sons, Omaha architects, submitted a final design for the new structure, and the state board gave final approval in January of 1950.

In February of 1950 the board authorized the college to call for bids on the construction of the building, designed to fit into the general building pattern of the campus, and in April bids were accepted from the following firms: Wilson Construction Co., Lincoln, for general construction; Wenke Farm Store, Pender, for heating, plumbing and ventilation; and Service Sales Co., Fairbury, for electrical work.

Ground was broken for the hall in May of 1950 and the actual construction was underway. As was the case with the other dormitories on the campus, the building was financed by the issuing of revenue bonds, so that tax money would not be used for the project.

The cornerstone for Morey hall was laid Sept. 11, 1950, by the Nebraska Grand Lodge of Masons, with John S. Hedelund, grand master, officiating. Principal speaker for the occasion was Dr. George Rosenlof, director of admissions at the University of Nebraska. In the cornerstone of the building were placed with Masonic records, copies of the college newspapers, alumni bulletin, annual catalog, alumni directory, student handbook and student directory.

Although when Dr. Morey passed away in May, 1951, the building had not been completely finished, only the roofing and interior finishing remained, the new men's dormitory stood as a modern and beautiful addition to the Wayne State campus. Throughout the hall, Dr. Morey's planning, foresight, and taste are reflected in the design, furnishings and interior decoration.

Accommodations for 700 The opening of the new dormitory brings to nearly 700 the accommodations which the campus can provide for students. The other residence halls—Nehardt, Pile, Terrace, and Connell—are all modern, fireproof structures equipped with up-to-date conveniences for the comfort of students.

Convenience, comfort and beauty are the keynotes of Morey hall, newest addition to Wayne State's campus.

Designed to blend in with the attractive simplicity of the older buildings on the campus, Morey hall will provide comfortable living facilities for 148 students, bringing to a total of nearly 700 the modern accommodations for students available on the campus.

Planned to reflect a home-like atmosphere by President Victor F. Morey, for whom the dormitory is named, the new hall is decorated throughout with soft color patterns. Each student room is individually finished in a blending wall and floor color combination.

On the first floor, in addition to 21 student rooms are the lounge, a small reception room, the office, guest accommodations and a head resident's suite.

In the basement of the hall are recreation rooms, a kitchen and snack-bar, in addition to trunk-rooms and storage space.

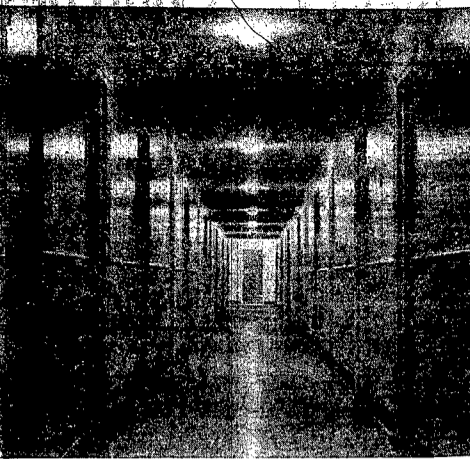

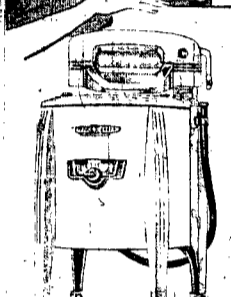

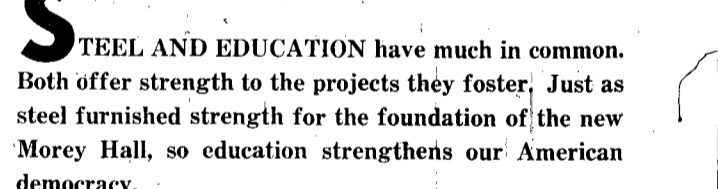
