According to U. S. News and World Report, the tax take of the federal government alone in the next fiscal year will amount to \$472 for every man, woman and child in the country. That is about the size of the average percapita income in 1931. It is 120 times as much as was the tax take in 1900. In spite of this incredible burden of taxation, the government, according to official estimates, will still be more than \$14,000,000,000 short of meeting its costs, and that money must be bor-

To quote U. S. News directly "Altogether, the people are expected to provide \$76,000,000,000 for the government in the year beginning next July 1. That is half again as much money as the people were asked to contribute to government at the peak of World War II. It is eight times las much as the government such as the go the government spent in the most lavish years of the New Deal and more than 13 times as much as the government collected in those years."

"Opposition to the introduction of government health insurance in the United States is intensifying in agriculture," the Monitor said. "The biggest of the farm organizations, the American Farm Bureau Federation, with a membership of 1,452,000 families, redently reiterated its hostility. The Farm Bureau's annual convention adopted a resolution declaring, "We oppose any form of compulsory health tinsurance."

"Similarly, the National Grange, oldest and second largest of the farm bodies, at its convention a short time previously voiced again its stand against any plan of national compulsory health insurance or socialized

"Rural rejection of government health insurance has been little recognized in larger circities, which usually hear much more of labor's viewpoint. But though labor's call for compulsory health insurance has been much better publicized, it remains the demand of a minority... Meanwhile agriculture provides a balance against labor on this issue and a formidable safeguard."

In agriculture, which deals daily with, such eternal matters as soil and weather, the old virtues of independence and self-reliance are still in vogue.



In August of 1949, President Morey submitted preliminary plans for the new dormitory to the board of state normal schools, with the basic design which has been changed only slightly since.

John Latenser and Sons, Omaha architects, submitted, a final design for the new structure, and the state board gave final arproval in January of 1950.

In February of 1950 the board authorized the college to call for bids on the construction of the building. Gesigned to fit into the general building pattern of the general building pattern of the campus, and in April bids were accepted from the following firms Wilson Construction Compliance for general constructions. Ground was broken for the hall in May of 1950 and the actual construction was underway. As was the case with the other dormitories on the campus, the building was financed by the issuing of revenue bonds, so that tax money would not be used for the project.
