





OBITUARY

Peter Ulrich, son of the late Peter Ulrich, Sr. and Marie Elizabeth Ulrich, was born July 15, 1884, in Sheboygan county, Wisconsin. He died at his home in Hoskins on March 10 at the age of 87 years, seven months and 24 days.

Peter Ulrich spent his early days in his parental home. He attended a country school and had two winters of night school from a minister who taught him to translate from German to English. During these years, he also learned to play the organ.

At the age of 17, Mr. Ulrich went to work as a hired man on a farm near Genoa, Wis., and later near Grinnell, Ia. In the spring of 1885 he came to Wayne county where he first worked for Frank Pals near Hoskins and later for William Wagner east of Norfolk.

In April 1885 Peter Ulrich, Sr., came to Nebraska and bought a section of land 3 1/2 miles west of Winslow. Peter Ulrich, Jr., acquired the southwest quarter of this section and built the main section of the house in which he, with his family, lived for many years.

In the spring of 1889 he planted 4,900 trees which were the beginning of an apple grove which has for many years sheltered the farm place.

Mr. Ulrich was throughout his active years, a progressive farmer. Mr. Ulrich served on the local school board and was a loyal supporter of his church in many ways, serving as organist and pianist. In early years he was a member of Immanuel Reformed church southwest of Winslow.

About 1908 he and his family transferred to the Evangelical Free church of Hoskins. He served this church as pianist, trustee, member of the building committee and Sunday school teacher.

On Jan. 11, 1888, Mr. Ulrich was married to Emilie Waechter. To this union were born three sons and three daughters, George, Ella, Hattie, Anna, William and Otto. The last two sons and his wife, Emilie, all died within a period of two months in the spring of 1895.

On May 12, 1897, Mr. Ulrich was married to Helena Mias and to this union were born three sons and a daughter, Alfred, Walter, Erwin and Esther. Mr. and Mrs. Ulrich observed their golden wedding anniversary in 1947.

Mr. Ulrich retired from active farming in 1943 but continued to live on the farm until December 1948 when he and Mrs. Ulrich moved to Hoskins.

In addition to those mentioned, Mr. Ulrich was preceded in death by a daughter, Mrs. Ella Ulrich, on Mrs. H. C. 1932, a son, George E. Ulrich, on July 28, 1948, a grandson, Clarence Utecht, a casualty in World War II, and a great-grandson, Frederick Dvorak.

He is survived by his wife; three daughters, Mrs. Hattie Ulrich, Mrs. H. C. 1932, and Esther Ulrich, a registered anesthetist nurse at the Methodist hospital at Scottsbluff; three sons, Alfred of Manitowish, Minn., Erwin of Bridgman and Walter, pastor of the First Presbyterian church at Bridgman; five brothers, Otto, Edward and August of Winslow, Fred of Hoskins and Rev. George of Amazonia, Mo.; 20 grandchildren; and 28 great-grandchildren.

Joseph N. Smolksi, 59, naturopath and chiropractor in Wayne for 26 years, died at his home here about 1:30 Saturday afternoon after an illness of several months. He was born to Mr. and Mrs. Saly in 1892 in Minsk, Poland; June 20, 1892. He was schooled in Europe and there earned the ND and DC degrees.

Mr. Smolksi came to America in 1912 and first located in Sioux City where he was employed in a packing plant while attending barber college evenings. He operated a barber shop in Hartington for 20 months and then sold his business to go to Minneapolis to attend physiotherapy school. He worked in a barber shop and held beauty parlor evenings, and earned his degree in physiotherapy.

He later attended the National College of Chiropractic in Chicago and received the DC degree. He held licenses as a naturopath and chiropractor in five states and had renewed all of them recently. He was preparing to take the Nebraska basic science examinations this spring.

Mr. Smolksi married Mary Corbin in Sioux City, May 13, 1913. The following children were born to them; Joseph, Jr., who is practicing law in Denver; Mrs. Donald Dalby of Sedalia, Colo.; and Mrs. Clifford Watkins of Van Nuys, Calif.

Mrs. Smolksi died during the influenza epidemic in 1918. Mr. Smolksi married Florence McGinly in Hartington May 15, 1929. Children born to this union were; Mrs. Kenneth Whorlow of Wayne, Mrs. Fritz Reich of Hartington, and Jeanne Smolksi, who teaches school in Miami, Fla.

Besides his wife and six children, Mr. Smolksi is survived by 14 grandchildren; two brothers,

Adolph of Sioux City and Florenz in Canada; and a sister, Mrs. Jennie Knapski of Sioux City.

Mrs. Mary E. Fish was born to Mr. and Mrs. Solomon Zoorion Dec. 23, 1870. After the death of her mother when she was an infant, she was brought to Nebraska by her father in 1872. She was raised to womanhood by Mr. and Mrs. William Maxfield near Papillion.

She was married to Webster E. Fish March 18, 1890. The following year they moved to Belden and made their home there with the exception of two years in Dixon. Mr. Fish died in 1944 and since then she had partially made her home with her son, Lloyd.

Mr. Fish was a member of the Belden Royal Neighbor camp for nearly 50 years. She was also a member of the women's society of the Methodist church.

Survivors include her three children; Angie, Mrs. Russell Preston of Wayne; Lloyd of Belden; and Mabel, Mrs. Edward Pflanz of Belden.

Arnold Willbrandt Arnold Willbrandt Brundieck, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Brundieck of Pilger, was born Nov. 6, 1918, northwest of Wisner. He died at five o'clock March 8 at the Wayne hospital at the age of 33.

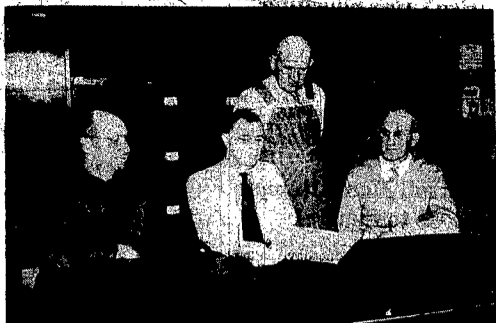

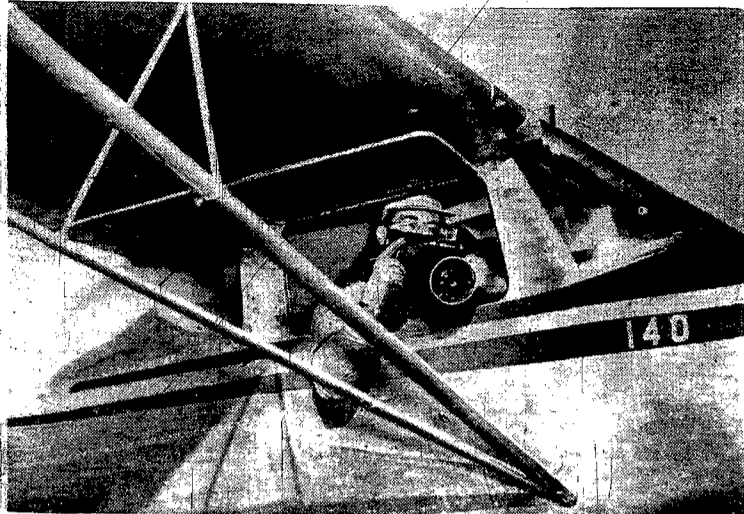
Who will be the first to identify the farm each week?
