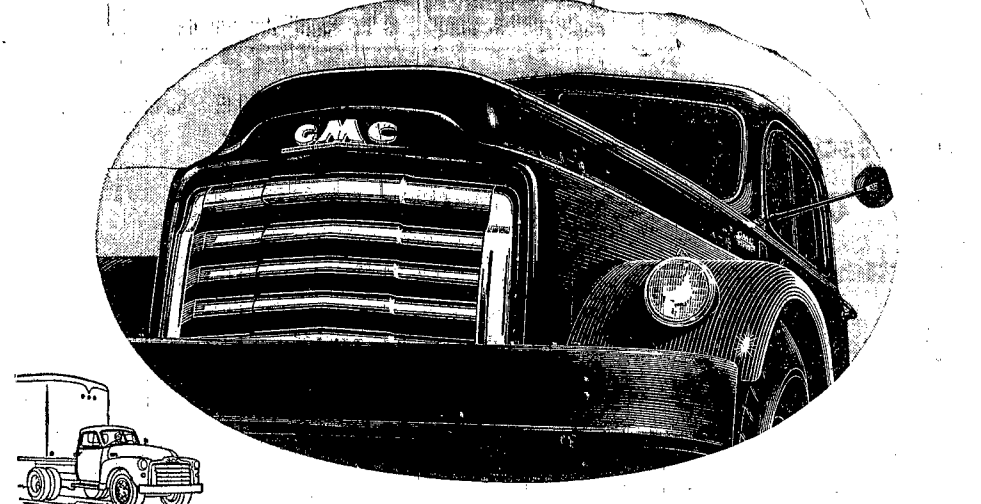

Henry Korth Farm Identified



Wayne Herald readers were quick to identify Mystery Farm No. 1 last week as that owned by Henry Korth and located eight miles south of Wakefield. The farm is operated by Wendel Korth. First to phone The Herald with identification of the farm was Bernhard Koch of Wayne. Mrs. Alfred Test, Wayne, and Mrs. Ed Grubb, Wayne, verified his identification.

First Mystery Farm Is Korth's! In Family 71 Yrs.

Seventy-one years of farming were represented in Mystery Farm No. 1 which appeared in last week's Herald. Three readers were quick to identify the farm photo as that belonging to Henry Korth, located eight miles south of Wakefield.

The farm is operated by Mr. Korth's youngest son, Wendel. Henry Korth has farmed the quarter for 71 years. Three generations of the Korth family are now living on the place. Henry lives in the small house at the extreme right in the photo at left. Wendel and his family, which includes two boys, live on the other house.

Grandfather to 22 children, Henry Korth has four daughters and three sons, all of them married. Wendel is the only child living on the home place.

General diversified farming makes for most of the activity on the Korth farm. Corn for a good sized herd of hogs is the main crop. A bull that was purchased this Wendel now has 40 head of mixed cattle, including a purebred Short-spring. He also has 28 sows and some hogs on feed.

Seeking the facts on new farm practices and procedures, Wendel attends the veteran's training school at Wayne.

Mrs. Wendel Korth is also active in farm organizations. She is a member of the Farm-Fans extension club and the Ladies Aid of St. Paul's Lutheran church which is located only two miles from the farm.

The two Korth boys, Roy 6 and Warren 2 1/2, occupy a good deal of her time. Roy is currently attending school at district 27.


