Near Record Vote Cast Tuesday

A near record vote was cast in Wayne county Tuesday in the presidential primary election when an estimated 2,200 voters went to the polls.

The top total in recent years was set in 1930 when 2,405 voters went to the polls.

In the national election, county Republicans were heavy supporters of write-in presidential candidate Robert Taft and senatorial candidate Hugh Butler. Both men received about a two-to-one edge over his nearest opponent.

Democrats gave Robert Kerr their backing in the gubernatorial race. Anderson led Robert Crosby by a slight margin on the Republican ballot and Walter Raecke took a commanding edge over his Democratic foe.

Few City, County Contests City and county races provided few contests as most of the candidates were running unopposed.

However, in the county assessor's race, incumbent Henry Arp defeated Arthur Mann on the Republican ticket.

The heavy vote, record number of write-in votes and handling of four different ballots gave local election boards a difficult time.

Returns from Wayne's second ward were not in and tabulated by the time The Herald went to press Wednesday afternoon.

County officials reported that was the first time election boards had trouble completing the counting of votes at least by early Wednesday morning.

A summary of the county voting appears elsewhere on this page. The totals are incomplete and go through the county clerk's office.

Some of the write-in votes cast included the following: Henry Arp running for county assessor on the Republican ticket was given three votes; Donald Albert Sherman, president of the Board of Education, was given one vote; and one vote for county assessor on the Republican ticket was given to T. S. Hook.

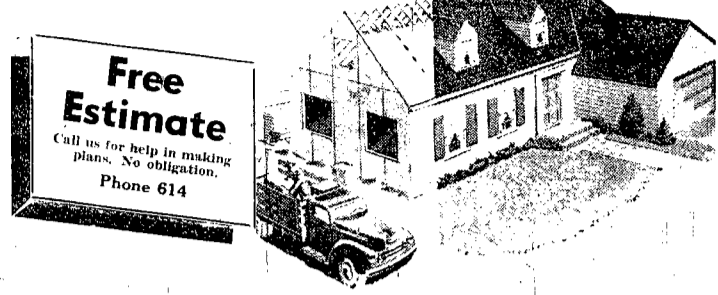

Politics As Usual

Another instance of "politics as usual" was recently noted in press releases from Washington.

Our law makers, who we as voters sent to the capitol to study and pass important legislation so that this fine country of ours might continue to remain strong and free, approved a bill that repealed an earlier piece of legislation providing for a charge of 10 per cent on sales of 50 or more of the new two-cent postal cards.

Now, just why the bill allowing the additional charge on postal cards was passed in the first place is quite beyond our realm of thought.

Proponents of the bill explain that the charge was made to keep the government from competing with private firms. It has also been reported that a lobby supported by advertising agencies promoted passage of the bill to discourage advertisers from using the postal cards as an inexpensive way of reaching the public.

Those are the two best arguments for the bill that have been forthcoming so far and we feel that neither explains why our representatives and senators should have taken vital time, that should have been spent on important legislation, to even consider such a bill.

It is not only our federal lawmakers who are guilty of "polishing the apple when they should be making pies."

We had the same type of legislation passed here in our own state when the car license plate identification system was changed and later changed back to the usual numeral system.

At first you might be inclined to laugh, but we are certain if you give the situation a little thought you will be as disgusted as we are with our "thinkless" representatives.

Taxpayers are contributing more money than ever before to the federal coffers to support legislation passed by the same men who support such trivial laws.

We can only hope the men on capitol hill benefit from the experience and thus keep their blunders to a minimum.

Cooperative Spirit

If the blizzard that struck Wayne last weekend was good for nothing else it did prove that Wayne residents are cooperative.

Several local implement dealers furnished men and equipment to open alleyways and clear parking areas of snow when city equipment broke down.

The equipment was also made available to other businessmen who wished to clear drifts of snow blocking entrances and parking spaces.

Most motorists were quick to dig out their autos parked on the street so that graders could open the thoroughfares to traffic, and businessmen were quick to shovel their walks even though the task was back-breaking.

It was certainly nice to see people helping each other with their problems.

We certainly hope this cooperative spirit is not reserved just for emergencies but will be with us all the time.

Meat for 1952

Increased meat production is imperative if the consumers are to be provided with their normal requirements. But the extent of the increase will depend almost entirely on whether livestock growers can see any incentive to produce and market under conditions imposed by government regulations.

In 1951, demand for meat was very strong, and the purchasing power was there to sustain it.

Yet the average American actually ate three pounds less meat in the year that just ended than in either 1950 or 1949.

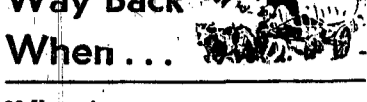
Production of lamb and mutton went down 17 per cent to hit a 33-year low. While prospects for a moderate increase in beef production were favorable as 1951 began, threats of price rollbacks and imposition of controls so disrupted marketings that the supply dropped eight per cent. The sole increase in meat supplies was in pork.

The outlook for the current year is good. Supplies can be expected to increase about three or four pounds per person.

However, there is one big "if" in this forecast. That increase can take place if regulations and policies do not curtail marketings and disrupt distribution too severely.

We have a meat industry which is eager to provide us with more meat and is fully capable of accomplishing it. But the most efficient industry on earth cannot do its best when unsound and arbitrary controls hold it back.

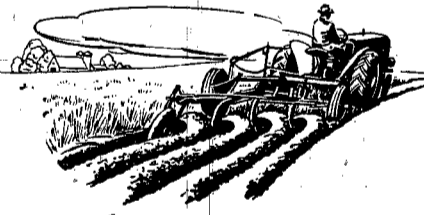

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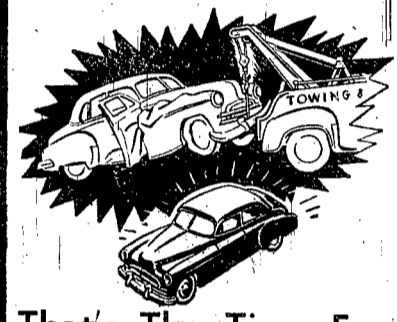
