Sewage Disposal Plant

Several projects and purchases are being discussed by the city officials these days.

Among them are a sewage disposal plant, a street sweeper, extension of the mercury street lighting system and a swimming pool.

Of course, some of these projects are receiving more serious, consideration than others. It is possible that action will be taken on some in the near future.

We would like to examine these various projects during the coming weeks, beginning with the sewage disposal plant.

State health officials have long requested all towns and cities dumping sewage into public waterways to construct sewage disposal plants.

The biggest advantage of a sewage disposal plant is more sanitary living conditions for all concerned. The operation makes water in the streams and cities farther down stream. It also makes, the streams a better habitat for fish and other marine life. It so happens that a survey made by state officials puts Wayne on the "black list" with three other Nebraska towns as far as sewage disposal is concerned.

The sewage disposal plan in Wayne is no new proposal. It has been "on the stove" for a number of years. In 1938 plans procuressed to the stage where blueprints were drawn and estimates taken.

At that time an adequate plant would have cost about \$60,000. It is estimated a plant would now cost over double that figure, or about \$150,000. Of course, this would be a larger plant wapable of handling a greater capacity than the plant considered in 1938.

As the situation now stands, the project of constructing a sewage disposal plant still stares city officials and residents in the face.
