EASTER PEACE

These were the first words of the first Easter sermon. They were spoken to those who gathered on the evening of that first Easter day. They must have brought to those who heard them a four-fold peace.

When nations believe in God, and trust in Him there is peace. When they despise and reject Him there is war. Therefore it would be inspiring to read history without having to stop and shudder at names like Thermopylae, Waterloo, Gettysburg, Meuse-Argonne, Stalingrad, Normandy, Anzio, Guadalcanal, Iwo Jima, Tarawa, Seoul, Heartbreak Ridge. Yet we clearly know the reason why—wherever all the forces of self-interest combine to dispute God's right to the command of the soul.

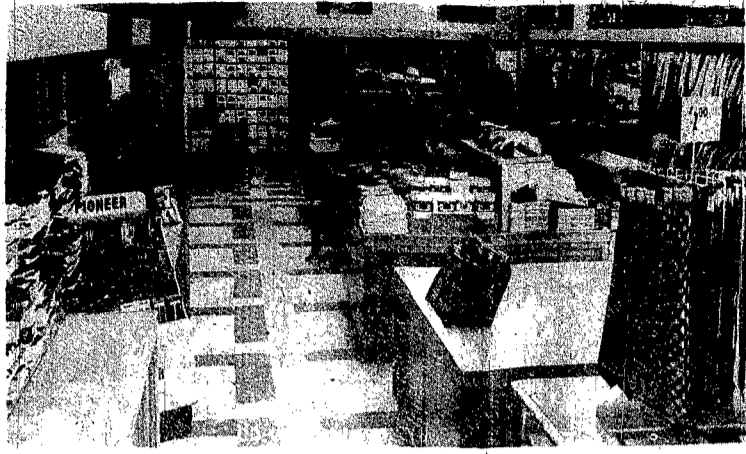
