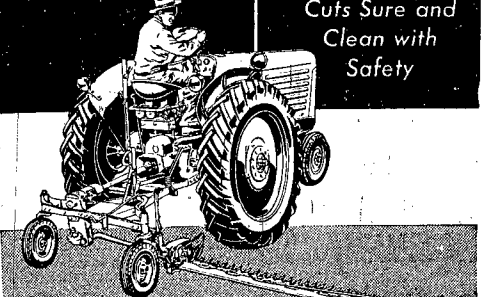

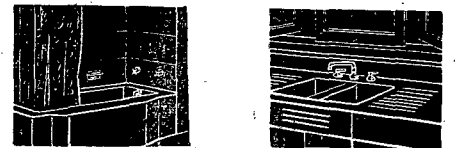

## Swimming Pool Issue

This week we climax our discussions of possible city projects with a factual summary on a swimming pool for Wayne.

Like the sewer disposal unit, the swimming pool proposal is not a new one. It has been hanging in the air for many years.

At the present time the only pool in Wayne is a small indoor pool located at Wayne State Teachers college. It is not a public pool but arrangements have been made so that the youngsters in Wayne can swim there in the summer time. The pool is available to campus school students during the entire year.

However, so far as a swimming pool is concerned, the pool at the college is not the answer to Wayne's problem even if it could be opened to the public, and it can not.

Wayne has not always been without a swimming pool.

Many years ago Henry Kay operated a pool south of town. The pool itself is still there but in ill-repair. Whatever equipment there was has long since been dismantled or rendered useless by the weather. While the pool was in operation there was always the problem of cars bogging down or getting stuck in the mud and lands around the pool and the seepage and flooding from Logan creek.

Henry owned the property after Henry Kay. He offered to sell the pool and 22 acres of land surrounding it to the city for a park but the townspeople did not accept the proposal, and the pool was abandoned. Bernard Meyer now owns the land where the pool was located.

So it seems that if Wayne is going to have a swimming pool it will have to construct one.

When you think of construction you immediately think of the cost involved, so we look there.

Information from a bulletin put out by the Council of Engineers at Iowa State college, Ames, Ia., indicates that a town the size of Wayne would need a pool to handle maximum crowds up to 360 persons. About 75% of the space in the pool would be less than five feet deep and would include a large wading and recreation area.

State health officials estimate such a pool would cost from \$75,000 to \$125,000 depending upon the equipment wanted and how elaborate the furnishings were. This estimate does not include the cost of the land.

Wayne, a town of 2,200, built a pool in 1951 that cost \$68,000. Fremont's new pool cost approximately \$260,000.

It is not probable that a swimming pool would support itself in this part of the country very long.

The last organized effort to promote a pool was shortly after the close of World War II when a number of organizations, primarily women's clubs, took the matter up with the city council. At that time there was debate as to a possible location—north of town at the Memorial park or in town.

Several organizations have discussed the issue this year, but no organized effort to promote the project has been forthcoming.

If Wayne were to build a swimming pool the townspeople should not expect it to pay for itself.

A swimming pool should be looked upon as an investment in health and happiness—as an investment in and for the young people of our town.

## Cancer Control

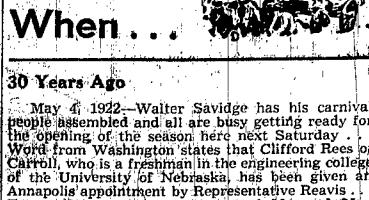

Statistics show that one of every five persons in Wayne county will eventually have cancer and among cancer victims only one-third now have a chance of being cured.

However, it is possible to double the number of cures through early detection and prompt treatment of the disease by radiation and surgery.

### Many of the great men of history

have spent time in jail. Long ago Jesus pointed out that one generation slays the prophets and another generation builds monuments in their honor.

In our own day, Mahatma Gandhi spent much time in jail. He was confined for 2,089 days in Indian prisons, and 249 days in South African jails—a total of more than six years behind the bars. He has no horror of imprisonment, no sense of being disgraced. On the contrary, he actually enjoyed prison life. On one occasion when he was at liberty, he started a friend by stopping in front of a high wall, stroking it as one does a horse, and exclaiming: "This is my favorite jail!"

Mr. Gandhi's imprisonments came as the consequence of his efforts to win freedom for his people. He was opposed to violent revolution but insisted that the British let his people go. His campaigns of non-violent, non-cooperation were based on these ideas:

1. When confronted with flagrant evil-doing, never acquiesce or consent to it. Therefore, British rule of India must not be accepted, but resisted.
2. Never resist evil with evil. Therefore, do not take up arms against Britain. A new type of resistance must be substituted for revolutionary war.
3. Resist evil with good. Therefore, engage in non-violent non-cooperation with the alien government. At announced times refuse to pay taxes, resign government positions, and in other ways refuse to help the evil-doers continue their evil-doing.

Last week's Mystery farm is one of two farms owned by Mr. Claussen. It is a 120-acre farm located three miles south of Wayne.

Mr. Claussen farms in partnership with Alvin Willers who lives on the home farm adjoining the Mystery farm. The 180-acre home place gives the two men 300 acres to manage. Mr. and Mrs. Claussen lived on the home farm, which was the family farmstead, for 42 years, before moving to their present home six years ago.

Although the operation on the two farms this year is primarily crop raising, 65 head of stock cattle are being fattened and 20 stock cows are being pastured. Generally 500 to 600 laying pullets and hens are kept on the farms but not this year.

Crops on the two farms are planted on the contour. Improvements include a new granary and a windbreak which was planned in 1946. The home place also features

Mrs. Marvin Pospishil, Mrs. Forrest Magnuson, and July 11, who attends school at District 59, and a son, Gene, who works in Wayne. Mrs. Magnuson is now making her home with her parents as her husband is in the service.
