### Funeral Rites Held In Winside April 22 For William Prince

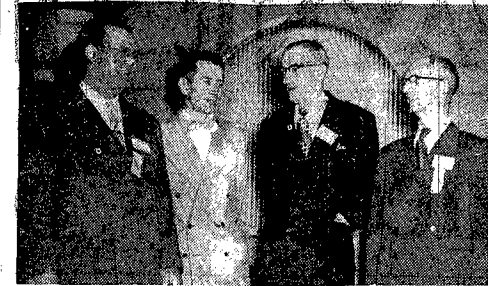

Mrs. Heine was given the honor because of her extensive civic work, faithful homemaking and ability to organize with her leadership.

She has four children. Mrs. James Griffin, a naval nurse who spent 18 months on the hospital ship Repose, stationed in Korean waters; Cleone, Mrs. Jack Anderson, who lives in Wayne, and William and Mitzi at home. William will finish college this spring, and Mitzi will finish in a year.

Mrs. Heine was Wayne county production chairman for the Red Cross for four and a half years during World War II, spending three and a half hours for two days a week in the production room. As a result of their efforts, Wayne county realized the highest Red Cross production of any county

of its size in the state. Mrs. Heine also conducted the Red Cross campaign in the county several years later.

In 1947, when the Mother's Study club in Wayne sponsored a Tom Brneman breakfast club, Mrs. Heine received the good neighbor orchid. She is a past cub scout den mother, doing it for two years.

Mrs. Heine is president of Catholic Ladies' guild and is very active in church work. She was president of American Legion auxiliary for two years, and has served as rehabilitation chairman of this organization for the past six years. She is also a member of Royal Neighbor and Degree of Honor lodges.

Besides carrying out these time-consuming tasks, Mrs. Heine has worked at a local theatre every open night for the past six years. Recognition of Mrs. Heine as first lady was kept a secret until her presentation at the tea by Mrs. Chris Tietgen, First Lady of 1951. Rev. J. H. M. 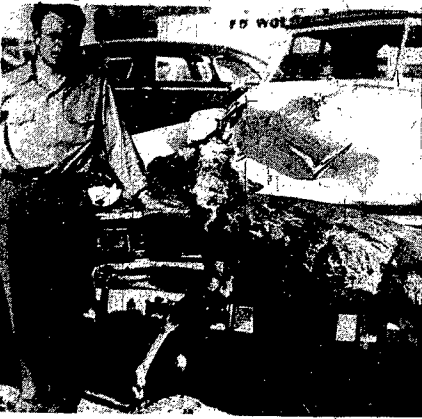

## Wayne's Financial Standing

The past three weeks we have summarized various projects and purchases being discussed by city officials and residents.

Any one of the major projects would involve the outlay of a large sum of money and if all the projects were put into operation it would cost approximately \$230,000 to \$310,000, depending on how the various projects were equipped.

This leads to some interesting questions. What is the financial standing of the City of Wayne? Is the city capable of paying for any of these projects at this time? What is the bonded indebtedness of the city? These are just part of the questions for which we have tried to secure answers.

### Bonded Indebtedness \$82,279.45

The bonded indebtedness of the City of Wayne now stands at \$82,279.45. This is a remarkably low figure considering the facilities this town of nearly 4,000 possesses. City Clerk Walter Bressler reports that paving and paving intersection districts are responsible for over \$55,000 of the total indebtedness. Other outstanding bonds are as follows: auditorium, \$5,000; airport, \$4,000; and library, \$20,000.

The city auditorium is scheduled to be paid off in 1954. The city owns the bonds against the airport and options on the library bonds cannot be picked up until 1954. Which means the city is very, very solvent.

Last year when the city fathers purchased a new generating unit they had \$170,000 of the necessary \$190,000 set aside. It is hoped that by the time the unit is installed the additional \$20,000 will be available.

The assessment valuation of property in Wayne was \$3,699,200 in 1951. During that year the mill levy was 16.3. The combined state, county, school and city levy was around 47 mills—less than half some of the residents in the state are asked to pay and considerably lower than the great majority.

There is a reason for this... Wayne's power plant. The city's light and power plant is the mainstay of its coffers. Another item to consider is the campus school, where around 150 youths are educated yearly at no cost to residents. The campus school is supported by the state.

One of the big items on the liability side of the city ledger was wiped off the books in January when the final payment was made on original 20-year intersection paving bonds. These bonds drew five per cent interest—much higher than the interest rate now commonly paid.

Getting back to the power plant, the lifeblood of the city, city officials take money from the light and power plant every month and sock it away into various funds where the money can accumulate for later need. It was from these funds that the city had the cash available for the purchase of the newly contracted unit.

When asked how much it cost to run the city for a year, City Clerk Bressler produced a report for 1951 which showed \$159,256.41 was spent. This low cost indicates exceedingly good management on the part of the city officials.

All in all, the City of Wayne, as was stated before, is very, very solvent. There seems to be no reason why it could not support a sizeable project at this time.

It is our opinion that one or more of these projects should be undertaken. A progressive city such as Wayne has to continue to expand its facilities and comforts for its residents. It can not stand still.

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# Long-Distance Call Identifies Mystery Farm



Last week the Coryell Auto company, sponsor of the Mystery Farm series, requested a "toughie" for Mystery Farm No. 6 so the editors picked a farm they believed would not readily be recognized by local residents.

However, The Herald readers were not stymied, and again the Mystery Farm was identified before 5 p.m. on Wednesday, less than two hours after the first copies of The Herald came off the press.

Berneat Gustafson was the first person to call the office and report that the farm belonged to Emil Müller and was located 4 1/2 miles north of Wakefield. Mr. Gustafson is postmaster at Wakefield and called The Herald by long distance to report his identification.

In fact, most of the calls correctly identifying Mystery Farm No. 6 were long distance calls. Other persons phoning in Wednesday evening were M. F. Ekeroth, Mrs. Louis Hansen and Gerald Baker, all from Wakefield.

Later correct identifications were made by Henry Barelmam, Mrs. Ed Kluge, Mrs. Gene Park, Marcella Mortenson and Laurence Johnson of Wakefield; Mrs. Ed Meyer, Orville Erxleben and Mrs. Mary Müller of Wakefield.

Mrs. Ben Meyer and Mrs. John Luschen made mistaken identities on Mystery Farm No. 6. Mrs. Meyer reported the farm belonged to Elmer Vaught near Norfolk and Mrs. Luschen believed the farm was Walter Gross's north of Wakefield.

As stated, the Müller farm is a 320-acre farm 4 1/2 miles north of Wakefield. Mr. Müller has been farming for the past 13 years and has been on the pre-

ent location since 1941.

The operation on the Müller farm is a closely balanced livestock-crop program. About 100 Duroc hogs are fed every year and 156 head of cattle were put into the yard this year; 86 head are still on feed. Corn, oats and alfalfa are raised for the livestock.

Terraces and Steded Waterways are in use on Mr. Müller's farm. All rolling portions of the farm are terraced and the waterways are seeded to bromegrass.

New improvements on the farm include the cement corn crib shown in the Mystery Farm photo. The crib was built in 1950 and has a capacity of 8,500 bushels.

Mr. and Mrs. Müller are the parents of four daughters: Marcella, 12; Maxine, 10; June, 5; and Phyllis, 2. Marcella and Maxine are seventh and sixth grade students at the Sunnyside rural school.

The Wakefield farm couple are members of the Salem Lutheran church. Mr. Müller is chairman of the Dixon County Livestock Feeders association; secretary of the board of trustees of the Salem Lutheran church; and member of the Farmer's union, Wakefield Community Hospital board, Dixon County School Redistricting board and local school board.

Mrs. Müller, who is still recovering from recent surgery, belongs to the Dorcas society at the church and is a member of the Women's Missionary society and Thursday club.

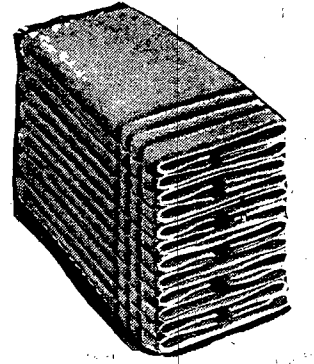

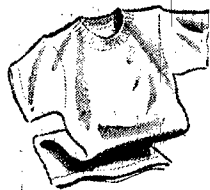

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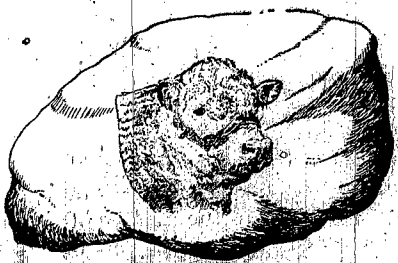

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# Sampson Farm House Second of Rural Homes Visited

One of Those Included in June Tour

The Elwood Sampson home, 11 miles southeast of Wayne, is one of the six rural farm homes to be visited this year on the home extension tour to be held in the eastern part of Wayne county in June.

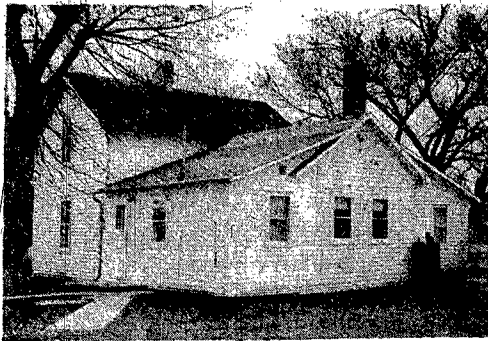
It was the second home visited by The Herald's society editor, and features remodeling of the western part of the house including a new bathroom, kitchen and entry.

Probably the most outstanding fact about this remodeling is that there was previously no plumbing in the house; for the 19 years they had lived there all water had to be carried from the well several feet from the house.

The bathroom is complete with a shower, all done in blue and peach. In the entry is a lavatory set to speed up the men's washing before a meal.

The kitchen, completely remodeled, is done in peach and blue. All plaster was torn off the walls and new cupboard work-space was put in. The utility room, remodeled in 1949, on the south of the kitchen affords a place for the freezer and washing machine.

Now the deep well furnishes

all water on the farm; water pumped automatically by the pump underneath ground in a cemented pit.

A hot water heater has been inserted in the partial basement right below the north back entry. This warms all water in the house, and oil heat is used for heating the house.

Mr. Sampson has done all the remodeling work on the farm through the kitchen, bath and entry, to the double garage, machine and cattle and hog sheds outside. Plastering is probably the most undesirable work concerned. Sheet

rock has been used in all the new walls. The kitchen is 14 feet wide and 17 long, while utility and entry rooms are 6 feet wide. There are five rooms besides the bathroom and utility. The folks have had electricity since 1942.

The front lawn of the 350-acre farm has many evergreen trees, and there is a thick and excellent windbreak north of the buildings. The farm is in a duo-partnership.

The Sampsons have three children, Ronnie, 15; Larry, 12; and Janice, 10. Janice is reporter of the Cloverettes 4-H club.

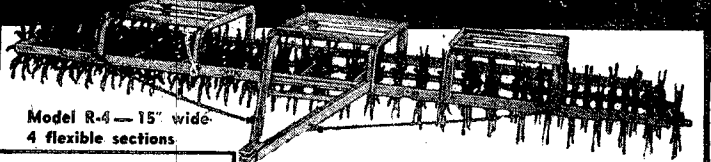

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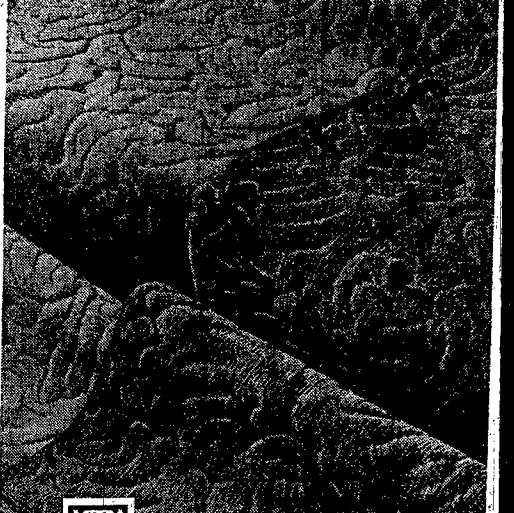

### Instrument Century Old On Tuesday

Tuesday, April 29 was the 100th birthday of the polished, rosewood melodeon which has been in the family of Mrs. J. T. Bressler for four generations.

The dark brown melodeon was purchased in Cazanovia, N. Y. by Mrs. Bressler's great-grandfather, S. D. Redfield, for his 15-year-old daughter. When she grew to womanhood, Mrs. H. McElroy retained it and gave it to her daughter, Mrs. Winifred Main. Mrs. Bressler's mother who died Sept. 28, 1951.

When it was 80 years old in 1932, the instrument had new bellows installed, and is now in excellent condition.

These instruments were extremely popular during the Civil War, in which Mrs. Bressler's great-grandfather and grandfather fought. Mrs. Main had always saved Leon Canterbury Mandeville's poem, "Mother's Melodeon," concerning the undying dignity of the melodeon during the war in 1861. Mrs.

**MOTHER'S MELODEON**  
Today you stand demure in rosewood dress, Much scarred by years but dignity faded serene. In "Sixty-one" your tones were a carress To her young voice, a carefree girl sixteen. Recruiting meetings knew your "Tramp! Tramp! Tramp!" Those hero making, marching times, and boys Were by your music lured to leave for camp. When cannon drowned your echoes with their noise, Those weary hearts knew not the dawn of peace. Proclaimed by you, but deus and damps of war. And agony. They prayed that it would cease. And long to breathe the air of home once more. What quiet hymns your muted notes now play! "Un triste souvenir d'une gloire passee."

Bressler also owns the original bill of sale, written in ornate script. To Wayne in 1928. Mr. Redfield and his family took the melodeon to Vinton, Ia. when they moved, and it was then transported to Wayne in 1928 to be Mrs. Main's seldom-played instrument.

Mrs. Bressler plays hymns on the melodeon, and the tone is much softer and lighter than a reed organ. Unlike the reed organ it has no stops to pull to regulate strength of certain keys. There are five complete octaves; on a regular piano there are seven.

The instrument stands about three and a half feet high and the wood is a rich brown rosewood. The top closes over the keys to resemble a Queen Ann desk, and the legs are very heavy with minute carving on the feet.

From the back down the center of the instrument two brass rods control the crescendo and pumping pedals, shaped like tiny brass stirrups. A large carved metal lyre is set in front of these two rods.

The label is hand engraved, and on it says "George A. Prince and Company, Manufacturers, 200 Main Street, Buffalo."

### GOD'S LIVING LETTERS

The bravest man ever to live on earth... who was he? Many nominations for this distinction have been made. High on the list should be placed the name of Father Damien, the Belgian priest who gave his life as missionary to lepers on Molokai, one of the Hawaiian Islands.

Leprosy is an ancient and terrible scourge. The Egyptians called it "death before death." It has appeared in all continents. I have seen its victims in China, the Philippines and India. It literally eats away one part of the body after another and produces excruciating pain.

Leprosy was first noticed in the Hawaiian Islands in 1853. It spread rapidly and in a desperate effort to check its ravages, the policy of segregating the lepers was adopted. The island of Molokai was selected for the leper colony.

In 1873 Father Damien arrived. He came with the knowledge that he was accepting a life sentence to serve among these afflicted people. Leprosy is a contagious disease. He would never be allowed to dwell elsewhere, and at that time he was only 33 years of age.

Conditions were indescribably awful. The lepers numbered eight hundred and were in varying stages of decomposition. Some had lost a hand, some a foot, some had a deep pocket in the face in place of a nose. Sanitary conditions were deplorable. The stench rose to high heaven. Food was inadequate. Hopelessness and despair prevailed.

For 12 years Father Damien lived among these people as a minister of mercy. Then at an early Mass he spoke of "We lepers." He continued his work of compassion until his death in 1889, at the age of 49. In the long annals of bravery, where would you find a more courageous soul than this man of God?
