Feeder Cattle Gains on Pastures

A study to determine the returns from the use of pastures in livestock production was started in 1951 by the Department of Agricultural Economists at the Nebraska College of Agriculture. Plans are for the study to be carried on for about five years in different parts of the state.

In 1951, records were obtained on dry land pastures from 44 cooperators in Wayne, Cuming and Dawson counties. These 1951 records were obtained almost exclusively from men who were using pastures for their cattle while on full feed. Fifty-five records were obtained from the 44 cooperators, of the 55 records, 38 were on steers, 15 on helfers and two on mixed herds.

Results for 1951 Only

The pastures studied in Wayne and Cuming counties were predominantly brome and alfalfa. Those studied in Dawson county were chiefly alfalfa or native pastures. The cattle were generally turned on the pastures in May and removed in September.

Weights of cattle and feeds as used were Weights of cattle and feeds as used were estimates given by the feeders for the most part. Practically all cattle were finished in dry lots for varying periods of time before being marketed. The data which follows is for only the period of time that the cattle were being fed while on pasture. The results shown are not given as definite conclusions, but they show what occurred under 1951 conditions in the feed-lots of the cooperators. More information is needed before accurate conclusions can be drawn as to relative values of different kinds of pasture.

Eronic and alfalfa or bronic and clover pas-tures indicated best results. See the following table.

It should be kept in mind that the above figures on protein and hay consumption are averages and in many instances neither was fed, while those who did use such feeds, fed much larger quantities than the averages showns.

Dairying . . .

Milk prices continue to advance, up 8% over a year ago. Butter prices appear to be stabilized. Per capital production of milk lowest since 1924. Butter consumption 50% of pre-War World II average. Oil prices for margarine about ½ of a year earlier.

Pasture Rentals

Such a broad question as what pasture rental rates should be charged per acre is difficult to answer because of the tremendous variations in the carrying capacity of the pastures. Carrying capacity varies with the kind of pasture coverage, its age natural fertility, care, rainfall, intensity of graz-

ing, etc. Therefore, any rental should be adjusted upward for good pastures and downward for poor pastures.

Returns Proportional to Contributions

Perhaps the principle most commonly used in figuring pasture rental rates is: Returns to all parsons concerned should be in proportion to their contributions. For example: From the 1950 U.S. Census reports, the average value of farm land in Dakota County is \$110.93 per acre. Much of the pasture land would be of less value and much of the crop land of higher value. Since, the enumeration of farm land in the spring of 1949, values have gone up roughly 15%. Let us assume that \$100 is a reasonable average value for pasture land, and that it takes on the average of two acres of pasture to carry one animal unit per year (grazing year — 6 months). If more or less acres are needed to carry one animal unit, adjust accordingly. Perhaps the principle most commonly used in

"Better Prices"

Prices showing some sign of encourage-ent. Most grades selling under ceiling. H. M. onway's National Livestock Market Service se better prices in the coming spring weeks, ut warns that an end of inflation means enerally lower prices and income for armers.

If the average gain per animal unit is say 250 lbs. for beef cattle, the value of this gain at 30 cents per lb. would equal. \$75.00. According to the above criteria, where returns are proportional to contributions, the landlord should get about 2/5's of the gain because \$19.00 is 2/5's of the total expense of \$49.00 (\$19.00 plus 30.00 equals \$49.00). Thus the maximum rent that the landlord would charge for pasture that would net 250 lbs. gain would be \$26.00 per year per animal or \$13.00 per acre (where an animal unit requires two acres of pasture.

Example No. 2 -

Landlord's Hay Equals Pasture Rental

Another way of figuring the rental value of land is to calculate the value of hay it would produce if not grazed. As an example: suppose an acre of a particular pasture would grow 1½ tons of hay which would be sold for say \$16.00 per ton, the hay from this acre of land would be worth \$24.00. If the landlord's share is ½ then the landlord should get ½ of the hay or about \$12.00 per acre. This would be the maximum rent the landlord would charge for pasture of this quality with prices at this level. To arrive at the monthly rate,

divide the annual rental by the number of months during the grazing season (\$12.00 divided by 6, months equal \$2.00 per month per acre or \$4.00 per month per animal unit.

Differences in pasture productivity or hay ces may be hard to figure the rental for any

According to reports of the Federal-State Statisticiantal Lincoln, in 1951 the "average cash rent per acre for pasture or grazing land" in the crop reporting district in which Dakota county lies, first example, was \$5.83 per acre per year.

Animal Unit Defined

In order to apply the procedure of determining pasture rentals to actual livestock, we must consider first the question: What is an animal unit? An animal unit is expressed in terms of the amount of feed consumed. As a standard of measurement, one cow, one horse, of one mule has been designated as the standard, or one animal unit. The proportion that each type of livestock is of an animal unit is as follows:

unit is as follows:

Cow, (beef or milk) steer or heifer, horse or mule or bull, 2 years old and older in the spring — 1 animal unit (a. u.).

Cow and calf — 1/4, (a. u.)

Yearling 2 \(\frac{1}{3} \) (a. u.)

Cattle on feed 1 \(3 \) to 1/2 (a. u.)

Weaned calves — 1/4, (a. u.)

Sheep — 1 \(7 \) (a. u.)

Sow, gilts, boars — 1 \(7 \) (a. u.)

Poultry 1 \(100 \)

When the pasture rental figure has been de-termined for an animal unit, it is multiplied by the number of animal units for each type of livestock.

Poultry . . .

If in our first example, \$26.00 is the pasture rental to be charged per animal unit per year, the annual rental for the following animals would be as follows:

Cow, horse, mule 2 years or older — \$26.00 per a. u. or \$13.00 per acre.
Cow and Calf — \$32.50 per a. u. or \$48.25 per acre.
Yearling Calf — \$17.34 per a. u. or \$8.67 per acre.

Sheep — \$3,71 per a. u. or \$1.86 per acre.

\$3.71 per a. u. or \$1.86 per acre. It should be remembered that the above rental price is simply a guide under the specified conditions as listed. The rental price will vary up or down depending upon the type, the demand, the quality of pasture, the amount of rainfall, etc. But of great importance, rentals will vary depending upon the bargaining power of the parties concerned. When pastures are in short supply the landlord may be able (cattle owner agreeable) to charge a higher rate, and conversely, if pastures are not in great demand, the cattle owner (landlord agreeable) may be able to rent the pasture at a lower rate.

Example 3 —

Rental Equals 10% Land's Value

Another example and quicker method of calculating pasture rental is to set the rental value equal to about 10% of the value of the land. The rate of 10% on land value on \$100.00 per acre would mean a rental of \$20.00 per animal unit. This would be \$6.00 per animal unit lower than the returns — contributions of \$26.00 in the example.

One disadvantage of a rental tied to la values is that the price of land is not nearly

sensitive to weather and market conditions as a rental that is tied to pounds of animal gain

At times, in the Sandhills area, many stockmen pay one-half of the gains as rent, (based on 380 lb. weaned calf). This sin oughly 20% returns on the present value of \$35.00 to \$40.00 land. Other ranchers are now paying \$5.00 per acre on \$35.00 to \$40.00 land which is roughly a 13% return on the land's value. Percentagewise, the rental in the first example is about 13% of the value of the land.




