College Survey Reports Spending by Students

Citizens of Wayne now have facts and figures on the economic advantages of the State college; and those figures show that the average student enrolled spent \$10.67 per week off campus in the community.

The statistics are a result of the extensive study made by the Business and Economics departments under Lawrence Mackackack, professor of economics and sociology. A 14-page report of the survey includes the following data:

The student body spends about \$3,000 per week and \$30,000 for the regular nine-month session. Typical expenditures show a total of \$3 to \$4 for meals and lunches; \$1 to \$2 for recreation in Wayne; \$3 for automobiles; \$5 to \$6 for sundries, drugs, etc.

Clothing expense ranges from \$11 to \$21 each semester. Semester spending for school supplies, jewelry, gifts, photography, records, music, dental and medical, beauty parlors and barber shops range from \$50 to \$80.

Variations in class spending reveal that seniors spent the most each week with juniors and freshmen next in line. Men spend more than women. Women students find the junior year is the most expensive of all.

About 30 per cent of the students surveyed drive cars.

The report notes that these statistics do not include summer school students, nor do they cover expenditures of the 70 faculty members or large maintenance staff.

The Wayne Chamber of Commerce points out that there are other indirect economic benefits which cannot be measured.

The college is a center for contests, tournaments, entertainments and educational gatherings which bring thousands to the community annually.

Colleges likewise exert a general influence in adult education, orderliness and morality and all these factors have economic consequences.

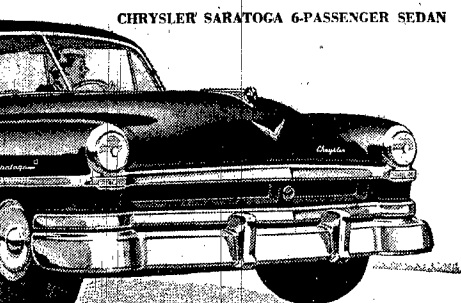
