

Annual Flower Show Planned Here June 6

Summer Session Registration at WSTC Monday; High Enrollment Is Indicated

Classes Will Begin on Tuesday

Wayne State's summer sessions will get underway Monday with the registration of students for the first term, which runs until July 25. Registration for the post-session will be held July 26.

Classes, which will convene on Tuesday, have been lengthened to run a full hour each this summer, and the sessions will close at an earlier date than usual this year. The longer class periods allow the student to take the same amount of credit in a shorter period.

Included in the summer program are a series of workshops in current educational problems in which concentrated study with specialists in various fields is undertaken. The workshops will cover such topics as audio-visual education, problems in elementary school curriculum, community problems, world understanding and others.

Speech Clinic Here
In the post-session, Allen Litzgren, speech specialist of the Dr. Lord's school for handicapped children in Omaha, will return to the campus again to conduct the annual clinic for the diagnosis and treatment of children with speech defects. Services of the clinic are offered to handicapped children in the area, who may either live at the college during the session or come to the campus daily from their homes.

Graduate courses for students working for advanced degrees will again be offered at the college this summer. These courses, under a program worked out with the University of Nebraska, may be transferred to the university to apply on a master of education or a master of arts with a major in education.

Graduate courses offered this summer include History of Education in the United States, Management of Small School Systems, Organization and Administration of Audio-visual Aids, Education and Vocational Guidance, History of the West and Milton.

Raecke Proposes Planned Road Program, Efficiency

A sound highway program, revision of present election laws and more economical, efficient state government, were advocated by Walter Raecke, Democratic candidate for governor, in an address before a joint meeting of the Wayne Kiwanis and Lions clubs Monday night at the Lions club rooms.

Approximately 100 members and guests were present to hear the Central City lawyer, who is a former speaker of the Unicameral.

Raecke proposed a definite schedule of road construction and repair to solve the statewide road problem. He pointed out, however, that the citizens of the state will have to show that they are willing to expend more money for roads before the road construction projects can be stepped up in speed.

The speaker cited two basic items necessary to the solution of the road situation. They were proper use of available funds and appropriation of the needed

The annual flower show sponsored by the local Woman's club will be held at the city auditorium on Friday, June 6, from 1:30 until 9 p.m., according to Mrs. Willard Wiltsie, president of the club.

"Here Comes the Bride" is the theme of this year's show. Mrs. Henry Ley, chairman of the program committee, announced.

Last year's show was attended by an estimated 500 persons and it is hoped that this year's program will attract even larger crowds.

A total of nine sections and 66 different classifications are open to exhibitors. Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Emery of Sioux City are slated to judge the entries.

Rules for the show include the following:

1. The show is open to all amateur flower growers for competitive exhibit.

2. Specimen exhibits must be grown by exhibitor.

3. Only one award to an exhibitor in each class. There will be a first, second and third place award to one distinguished exhibit in each class with a purple ribbon awarded to one distinguished exhibit in each class.

4. Flowers used in artistic arrangements need not be grown by exhibitor. House plants must have been in the possession of exhibitor for two months.

5. Entries for exhibit will be received from 9 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. All exhibits must be left in place until 9 p.m. Doors will be closed for judging at 11:30 a.m. and will be open at 1:30 p.m.

6. Exhibitors must furnish containers for specimen blooms. Milk bottles serve well.

7. Each specimen entry should be labeled with variety names, if known. Stem length, horticultural excellence and placement will be considered in judging exhibits in specimen classes. (Specimen statistics should be correctly named when possible).

Wayne Man Awarded Six Road Jobs

J. N. Einung, Wayne, was awarded six contracts totaling \$45,031.10 for maintenance gravel resurfacing of highways in this area. State Engineer Harold L. Aulten announced Monday.

Einung is to receive \$7,390.30 for supplying and placing 2,630 cubic yards of gravel on Nebraska No. 35 between Emerson and the intersection with No. 15, near Wayne.

He is to receive \$9,088.20 for adding 3,060 cubic yards of gravel on No. 9 between Ponca and Allen and on the spur between Waterbury and US 20.

On Highway 35 a \$4,071 contract is for putting 1,473 cubic yards of additional gravel on No. 35 between Wayne and Winside.

The Wayne county contractor is to receive \$8,346.20 for adding 3,460 cubic yards of gravel to the 19 miles of No. 12 between Overt and the intersection with No. 15, north of Hartington.

He is to receive \$11,485.50 for placing 4,650 cubic yards of gravel on No. 99 between Pierce and Wayne.

He will add 1,630 cubic yards of gravel to No. 115 between US 20 at Belden and No. 98 south of Carroll at a price of \$4,149.90.

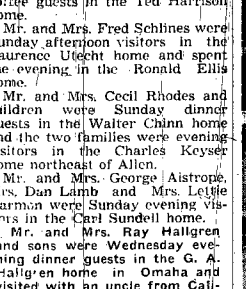

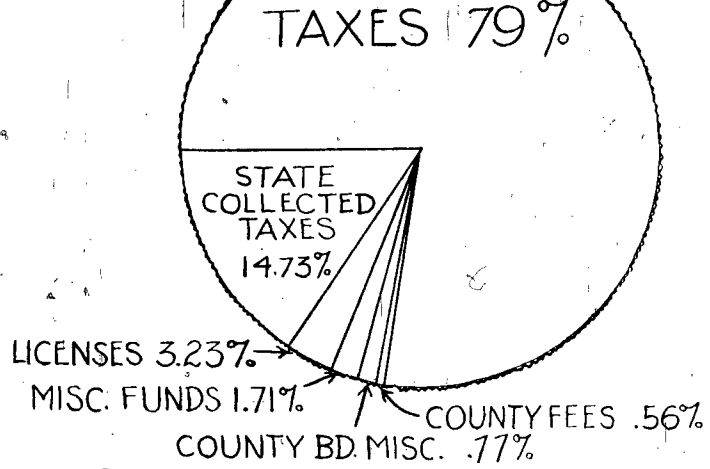

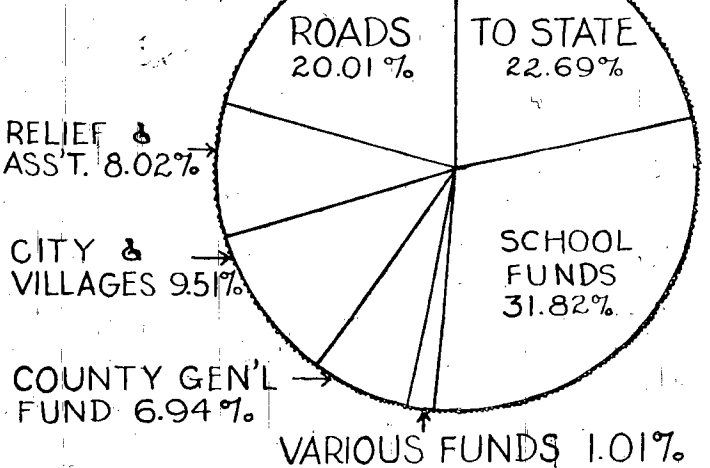

Audit Reveals 20 Percent of '51 County Expenditures Went for Roads, Bridges

Schools Take Biggest Bite From Funds

Approximately 29 per cent of Wayne county expenditures during 1951 went toward road and bridge work, it was revealed last week in the annual audit of the county's financial status prepared by Ray C. Johnson, state auditor of public accounts.

The audit, which covers the 11 months from March, 1951 to Jan. 31, 1952, shows the county spent \$941,134.53. Receipts during the same period totaled \$1,490,676.63. Largest expenditures shown on the report went for school funds. These amounted to \$299,445.86, slightly over 31 per cent of the monies spent.

Taxes account for the major part of county receipts, the audit shows. County taxes brought \$940,578.64 into the county, exactly 79 per cent of the total receipts. Collections by the state in the form of assistant's mail, route, gas tax, school opportunity and pari-mutuel amounted to another \$175,408.23 or 14.73 per cent.

Approximately 22 1/2 per cent of the monies collected by the county were turned over to the state. This total was 213,533.72. County relief and assistance expenditures amounted to \$75,521.89 or 8.02 per cent.

Only 6.94 per cent of the expenditures went for county administration, which includes salaries of all county officials and employees. Cities and villages in the county received \$89,525.61 of the total collected. This is over 9 1/2 per cent of the total expenses.

The graphs accompanying this story reveal the sources of county funds and also the expenditures. Each portion of the circle represents the portion of the county dollar received or expended.

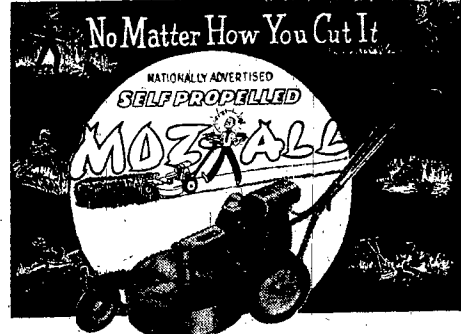

State PMA Official Gives Potato Report

(Editors Note: Because of the serious potato shortage now facing us, we thought our readers might be interested in the following PMA report.)

The reasons for the current potato shortage are seemingly not too well understood by too many people. Some people believe that the government, through the Commodity Credit Corporation, was taking part of the 1951 potato crop off the market.

The potato price support program was reportedly costing too much money. Actually the cost of the potato price support program for the 17 years 1933 to 1950 was 14 cents per person per year.

In other words, while the price support program cost an average of 14 cents per person, the increase in the price of potatoes from the 1931 crop, as compared to the 1950 crop, amounts to \$3.37 per person.

According to March 1 intentions of farmers to plant potatoes in 1952, when there is no price support program, the 1952 acreage will be the smallest in the United States since 1887.

It is important consideration, regardless of the cost of the commodity, is whether or not the commodity is available.

The shortage in the supply of potatoes is largely due to these factors: Since there was no price support on potatoes in 1951, the planting was 19 per cent below the 1950 planting.

Also because of there being no price support, many acres of potatoes were not harvested in 1951 because at harvest time the price to the producer was less than the actual harvesting cost.

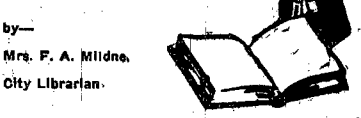



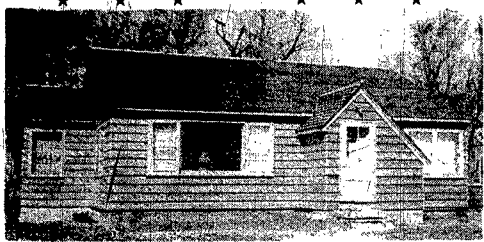

Extension Tour Includes E. W. Lundahl's New Home

House Just Completed In February

The remodeling history of the E. W. Lundahl home six miles east and one north of Wayne represents a complete transformation. The basement was dug in 1945 and the remodeling of the house began in November and was finished in February of this year.

The one-story, six-room home, one of those to be visited on the Extension club tour in June, was at one time very narrow; the new 10 inches wide. Duncan McQuistan from Wakefield supervised the work.

The dark walls in the living room are brown with a pink trim and the woodwork is white pine finished in a birch color. Dark green wall-to-wall carpeting accentuates the white shaggy throw rugs here and there. The off-white ceiling and the light glow coming in through the huge windows (12 feet on the east and 6 feet on the south) give the home a "bright appearance."

The traverse drapes have a chartreuse background, and the leaf design on the drapes is the color of the walls. The red in the drapes accentuates the red damask port, lamp and chair, and the same green and white in the rugs are in the drapes also. A 10-foot accordion door separates the living room from the den.

Three walls in the den are pink-brown and one is papered in a dark green leaf design. Drapes are the same as those in the living room, and the room is lighted by three white lamps.

Jeanine Lundahl, 15, has a light blue and white room with dark blue trimming. The master bedroom is pale green with drapes in pale red, green and white. The

built-in wardrobe has expansive drawers below it.

The kitchen has gay yellow walls and blue trimmings is used throughout. The table top and chrome kitchen set are both blue, and the curtains are blue and white polka dot. The bath is in blue and white. A utility porch was built on the west side of the home.

In the hall, which is painted light green, is a hidden stairway which leads to the attic. The stairway rests flat on the ceiling and until it is pulled down resembles panel work.

The Lundahls lived on the farm for 15 years before buying it in 1944. The farm is 320 acres, 160 acres of which they own. The Lundahls have many plans concerning the landscaping which they will get in within the next year. The house will be painted white and there will be red window trim.

Their son, Glenn, 22, attended Wayne State and graduated from the University. He is in the army now.

The Lundahl home shows what can be done by taking an older house and putting a new face on it.

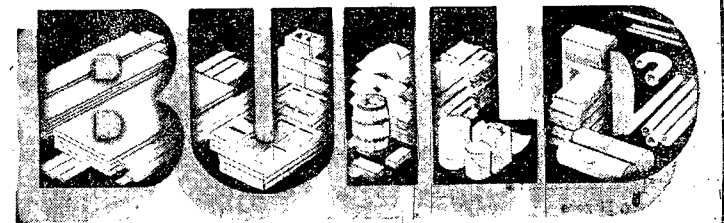

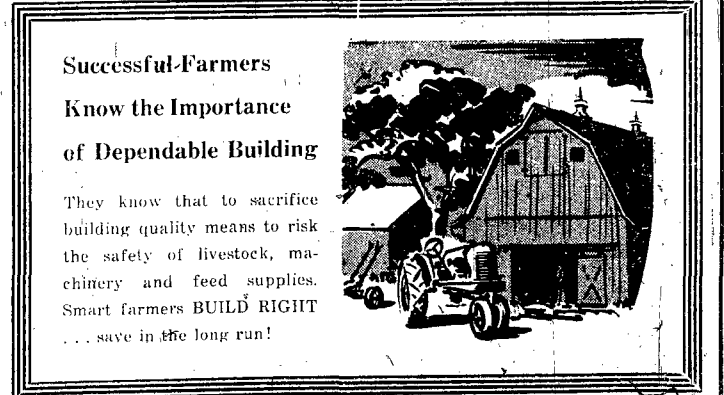

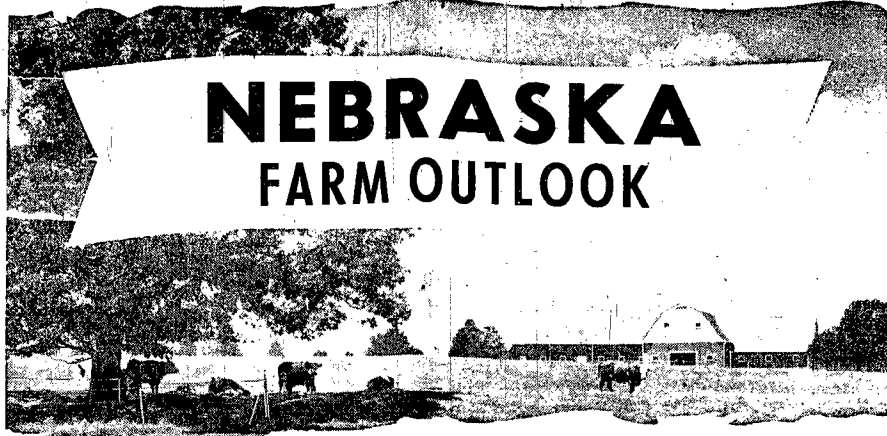

Economic Situation

There is increasing evidence that the economy is becoming more and more a buyer's market. This widespread easing in prices reflects relatively large supplies of many products and prospective increased supplies of durable goods, especially for consumer use, as well as some softening in both consumer and business demand accompanying a slower rate of defense expansion than previously indicated.

Despite some weakness in prices, underlying economic conditions are strong. Personal incomes continued near the high level of recent months. Apparently rising incomes are resulting in some

the fall of 1951. So far in 1952, the ratio has been even less favorable than it was in the unfavorable period of early 1947 and much less favorable than at any other time since 1940.

It should be remembered, however, that many farmers who had soft corn realized more for their corn by feeding it to hogs, even at these low prices, than if they had sold the corn for cash. Marketing of hogs during the summer and fall of 1952 will be smaller than those of 1951. Hog slaughter will continue to be comparatively small until mid-1953, at least.

Increasing Per Capita Consumption

increase in consumer buying. Retail sales after adjustments for seasonal differences have picked up over the fourth quarter of 1951. With prospects for higher wage rates in the steel industry and some other major industries, consumer incomes are expected to continue to rise. But because of slackness in some industries, particularly those producing nondurable goods, wage increases this spring may not be as general as a year earlier.

The Hog Situation

The number of hogs marketed during the first few months of 1952 has been much larger than during the same months in 1951. Those who had hogs

to sell received disappointingly low prices and only the most efficient producers managed to make anything on the hogs which went to market during this time. The hog-corn ratio has been relatively unfavorable since early in

feed and general "know how" to put them on an August or an early September market can expect to receive a satisfactory price for them. Experienced and efficient hog producers who have the feed or can obtain it at present prices might well consider buying good healthy early pigs if they have the time and facilities to handle them. The situation is not sufficiently promising, however, to warrant much increased production on the part of those who

are inexperienced hog men or who have been rather unsuccessful in years past.

Feeds for 1952 Uncertain

There is little reason to believe that the hog-corn ratio will become much more favorable than it was last summer and early fall. Production of the four principal feeding grains per grain-consuming animal unit is expected to be about the same this year as it was last year if farmers carry through their planting intentions. However, the carryover of feed grain will be smaller than in the fall of 1951. Above average corn yields would improve the situation considerably and as a consequence the prospect for profit from pigs farrowed in the fall of 1952 would improve. The recent "get tough" attitude of the food and drug commission, if carried out, could result in the release of a considerable quantity of wheat for feed purposes.

Should I Continue To Raise Hogs?

It is important during times of poor feeding ratios to consider all of our alternatives. There are other ways of disposing of corn. Should I feed my corn, or should I sell it? Can it be fed to hogs as profitably as to some other kind of livestock? What practices

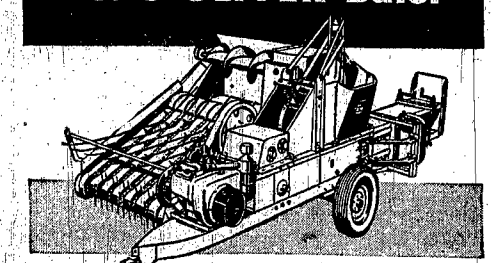

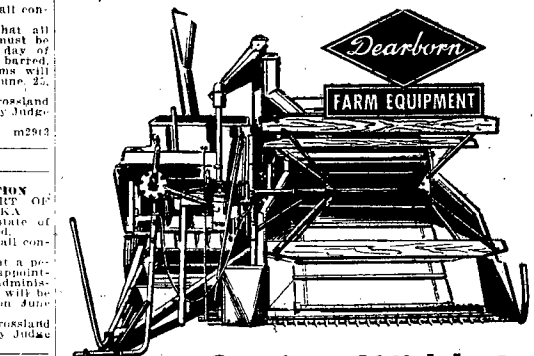

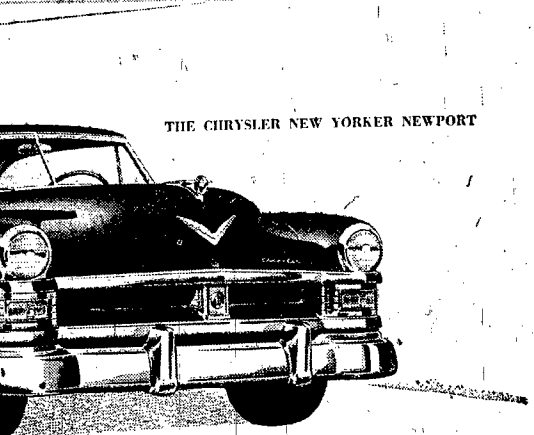
