Economic Situation

There is increasing evidence that the economy is becoming more and more a buyers market. This widespread easing in prices reflects relatively large supplies of many products and prospective increased supplies of durable goods, especially for consumer use, as well as some softening in both consumer and business demand accompanying a slower rate of defense expansion than preve iously indicated.

Despite some weakness in prices, underlying economic conditions are strong. Personal incomes continued near the high level of recent months. Apparently rising incomes are resulting in some

increase in consumer buying. Retail sales after adjustments for seasonal differences have picked up over the fourth quarter of 1951. With prospects for higher wags pates in the steel in for higher wage rates in the steel industry and some other major industries, consumer incomes are expected to continue to rise. But because of slackness in some industries, particularly those producing nondurable goods, wage increases this spring may not be as general as a year earlier.

The Hog Situation

The number of hogs marketed during the first few months of 1952 has been much larger than during the same months in 1951. Those who had hogs

sell received disappointingly low prices and only the most efficient producers managed to make anything on the hogs which went to market during this time. The hog-corn ratio has been relatively unforcement. relatively unfavorable since early in

the fall of 1951. So far in 1952, the ratio has been even less favorable than it was in the unfavorable period of early 1947 and much less favorable than at any other time since 1940.

It should be remembered, however, that many farmers who had soft corn realized more for their corn by feeding it to hogs, even at these low prices, than if they had sold the corn for cash. Marketing of hogs during the summer and fall of 1952 will be smaller than those of 1951. Hog slaughter will continue to be comparatively small until mid-1953, at least.

Increasing Per Capita Consumption

Competition from other meats will be greater in 1952. Production of chicken,

turkey, and beef are forecast to be 8. 10 and 11', higher respectively than in 1951. The per capita consumption of chicken has increased 75', and turkey 131', since 1935-89 compared to increases of 9 and 23% for beef and pork.

The small supplies of pork in prospect and a continued strong demand for food would suggest that hog prices may go as high or a little higher this summer than they did in 1951. In addition, the seasonal decline in hog prices may not occur as early as usual since early farrowings probably will make up a smaller proportion of the total 1952 spring pig crop than in recent years as the result of the shortage of corn for summer feeding. It Takes "Know How" To Get Profits

Feeds for 1952 Uncertain

There is little reason to believe that the hog-corn ratio will become much more favorable than it was last summer and early fall. Production of the four principal feeding grains per grain-consuming animal unit is expected to be about the same this year as it was last year if farmers carry through their planting intentions. However, the carryover of feed grain will be smaller than in the fall of 1951. Above average corn yields would improve the situation considerably and as a consequence the prospect for profit from pigs farrowed in the fall of 1952 would improve. The recent "get tough" attitude of the food and drug commission, if carried out, could result in the release of a considerable quantity of wheat for feed pur-
