Candidates for certification in education were Marvin M. Thompson, Laurel, and under the category, certificate in agriculture registered in college of agriculture.

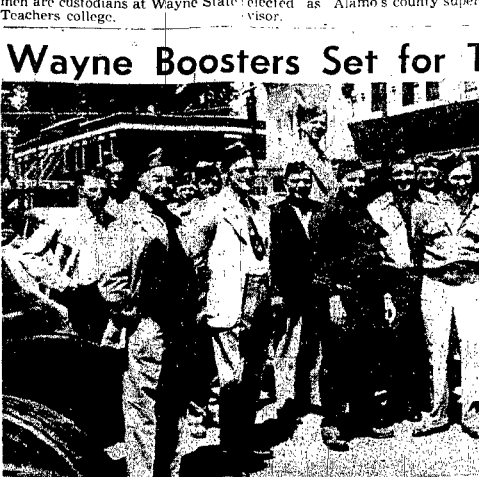
Boys' State Candidate Runs for Office

Place Order For \$12,000 In Supplies

After numerous meetings seven farmer-owned telephone companies located south of Wayne have developed a plan for completely rebuilding all of their lines.

There are 47 miles of line in this territory serving 93 customers.

The lines will be regrouped and split so that there will be fewer customers on a line. When the job is completed there will be 12 lines with 110 customers.

Three rural schools in this territory will then have telephone service. Five lines will change from magnetic (crank type telephones) to common battery (lift the receiver) type services with divided ringing.

Place Order

At a meeting held on May 29 the representatives of these lines met with representatives of a supply company of Norfolk and placed a \$12,000 order for materials, including 833 poles; 299 X-arms, and 24,690 pounds of high strength wire.

The work of rebuilding the lines will be done this fall after materials are received. The farmers will contribute the labor and will be assisted by an experienced Northwestern Bell construction foreman, who will furnish a list of tools.

The directors elected to represent these companies are Berneri Koch, John Heineman, John Lowler, Willis Meyer, Emil F. Meyer, E. P. Cauve, Edwin Flier and Harvey Larson. Mr. Larson was selected secretary-treasurer for the group.

These officers held a number of meetings with W. G. Schulz, Northwestern Bell Telephone company manager; and R. E. Bennett, district rural supervisor of Omaha, who assisted in developing plans for rebuilding the lines.

The Van Metres have two daughters, Mrs. Ethel Dederling and Mrs.



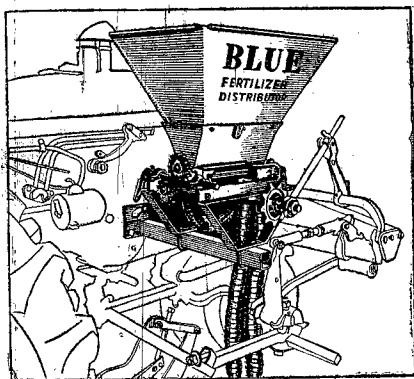

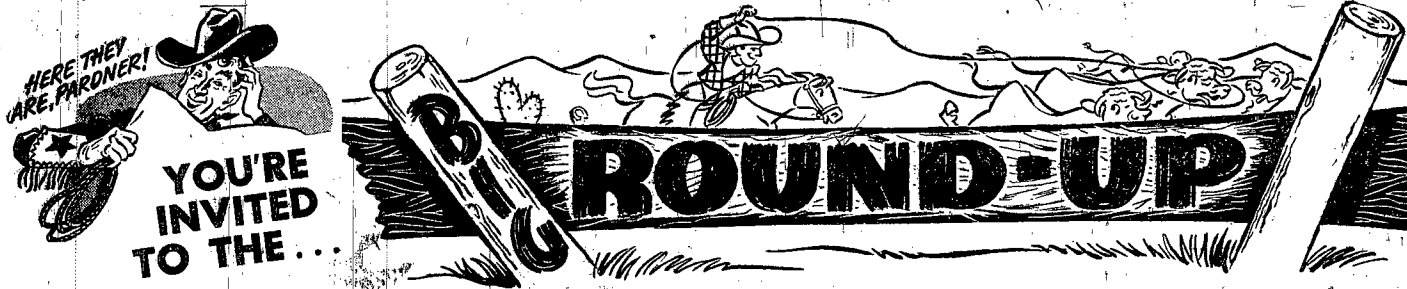

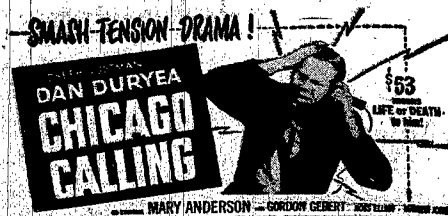

City's New Dude Ranch Movie Theatre Opens Thursday Night

Shows Held Every Night, Rain or Shine

Mothers, fathers and baby sitters come into their own tonight as the Dude Ranch drive-in theatre holds its grand opening. Opening of the theatre, located one mile north of Wayne on highway 15, was announced this week by Owner Phil March, owner of the Gay theatre in Wayne. Much of the work on the theatre is yet to be completed due to heavy rains which slowed construction during May. Rustic picket fences and guard rails will be erected as soon as materials arrive. Shows Every Night. March said the theatre will re-

main open rain or shine and would start pictures each night at dusk. Two shows will be scheduled nightly.

A concession stand and rest rooms are available on the theatre grounds. Bottle warmers will be on hand for those mothers who bring small tots to the show.

The theatre follows a western theme throughout. The buildings and screen are faced with log siding and attendants will wear colorful western costumes.

Several local contractors participated in the construction of the new theatre.

Frank Thielman was general contractor with A & M Sales and Service doing the plumbing. Electrical contracting was in the hands of Lester Electric. Gravel for the ramps and driveways was furnished by Pioneer Hollostone company. Lumber and building materials

were furnished by Carhart Lumber company. Hansen and Meyer handled the grading.

300 Car Capacity
The huge screen is 50 feet high and will have a picture area of 47 feet by 34 feet. The projection booth is 205 feet from the screen. The theatre has a capacity of 300 cars.

Approximately 1,000 tons (20 railway carloads) of gravel were used to cover the grounds and ramps.

Funeral Rites Monday For Allan B. Cherry, Former County Doctor

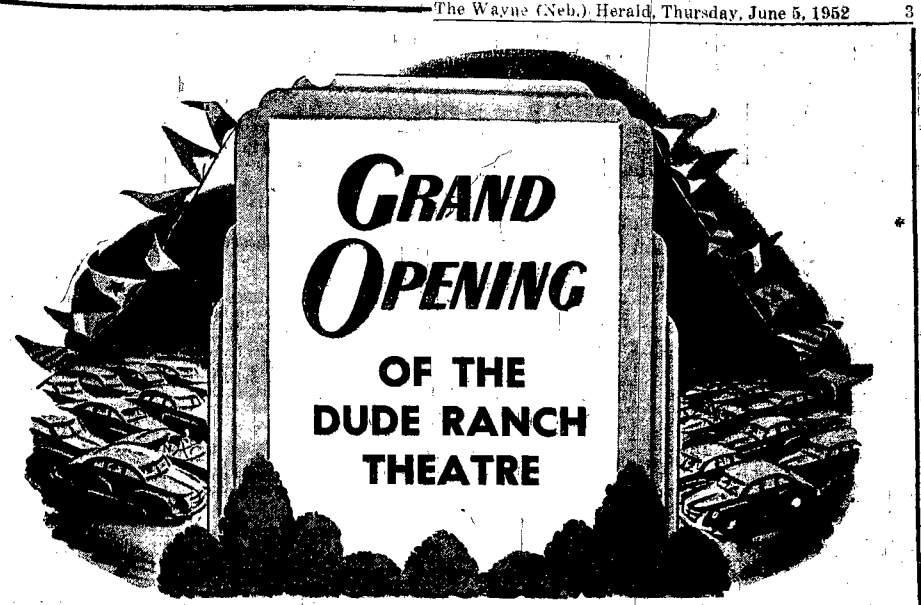
Funeral rites were held in Pasadena, Calif. for Dr. Allan B. Cherry, 80, former resident of Wayne and Winside for many years. Dr. Cherry died at his home on Memorial day in the afternoon. Rev. B. D.

Shulden officiated at Memorial Chapel of Ives and Warren, and entombment was in Mountain View Mausoleum in Pasadena.

Dr. Cherry was the youngest son of James M. and Ellison McFarland Cherry, and was born in Iowa City, Ia. Sept. 20, 1863. When a young man, he went east to New York state to spend some time in the family of his uncle, Joseph McFarland. He attended high school there, and assisted in his uncle's drug store.

After returning to his home in Iowa, he graduated from Iowa State University and the Medical school connected with it. He was married to Ella M. Miller June 1, 1889.

For 25 years, beginning in 1890, he practiced as physician and surgeon in Winside. At the end of that time, having sold his practice to Dr. J. G. Neely, Winside, he retired from his life as a doctor, to a quiet place in Pasadena, Calif., where they built their home in 1920, on East Mountain street. Dr. Cherry was a member of First Methodist church, Pasadena, Calif. He is survived by his wife, a son John A. of San Francisco, Calif., and several nieces and nephews. Also surviving are Mrs. G. C. Francis and Mrs. Ralph Prince, Winside, nieces of Mrs. Cherry.

'First-Hand' Look at U. S. Navy

Publisher Cruises to Pearl Harbor

By Mark E. Cramer

Note: Mr. Cramer of The Herald has just returned from a 15-day cruise with the Navy. As guests of the Secretary of the Navy—a representative group of media-west newspaper, radio and business men traveled by navy ship to Pearl Harbor, Hawaii—spent a week there and returned to the mainland on the navy flying boat Mars.

"Aye, Aye, Sir!" It just didn't seem right to refuse the U. S. Navy when they asked:

"Will you be our guest on a cruise aboard the aircraft carrier, USS Sicily from San Diego to Pearl Harbor, Hawaii and return aboard the flying boat Mars?" So I accepted. In fact I immediately telephoned the office of Commander Frank Richardson, director of public information, Great Lakes, Ill., to tell him I was in favor of the idea and a letter was on the way.

Air transportation was furnished May 7 by the Navy from Great Lakes to San Diego, with one stop at Kirtland Air Force base, Albuquerque, N. M. The plane could be boarded at either place. So George Dobry (St. Paul, Neb.) and I headed for New Mexico. He was the only other Cornhusker newspaper man on the cruise.

At Albuquerque we joined the entire group of 15 guests—and we are a motley crew. Here is the navy's list of guests:

- Commander Bryan was an excellent "shepherd." He herded us all

to the officer's club for a fine steak dinner at Albuquerque (the plane reached there about 5:30 p. m.—a time hereafter to be known only as 1730 hours). Back to the big four-motored plane at 2000 hours (that's 8 p. m. you landlubbers) and four hours later (at midnight—2400 hours) we glided down and landed at North Island Naval base, San Diego.

A bus standing by as we left the plane took us to the V.O.Q. (Visiting Officers Quarters) for the night. . . . A beautiful place built around a floor-to-ceiling patio, with large twin-bed rooms for two.

My roommate that night was Mr. Debbis (see list). And I shall remember him. Next morning he showed me his new electric razor kit—and I asked him if it was the type that could be plugged in for use either in a car or regular home outlet. He answered:

"Not in a Car"

"Oh no, not in a car! I'm a railroad man myself, and don't drive a car much." (He is vice-president of the Gulf, Mobile and Ohio.) Room for the night and breakfast cost \$2.75. And what a breakfast! We could have fruit juice, hot and cold cereals, eggs, sausage, hot cakes, french toast, potatoes, coffee. . . . IF you could eat it all! But we were at breakfast by 7 a. m. and the bus was again standing by to take us to the USS Sicily at 7:45.

We left on the exact time set, were aboard the Sicily 20 minutes later. She sailed at 8:50 a. m., May 8.

This ship is an escort carrier, the smallest type carrier in four navy, 537 feet long. That may sound like a lengthy ship—almost two blocks long—but when you see the size of the planes (with the load they carry), take off and land on this little "postage stamp" in a great big ocean, one wonders how they do it.

Imagine a twin-motored plane, carrying eight guns, ammunition, and a 1,000 pound bomb taking off in a two-block strip on a city street at home! That is routine here.

The Sicily was in action off Korea for five months in 1950, four months in 1951, and is on her way back "that-a-way" now. Her record of damage to the Communist enemy in Korea is proudly shown on the bridge.

Here it is: Destroyed—39 enemy tanks, 34 railroad locomotives, 34 artillery units, 39 freight cars, 780 supply warehouses, 66 smaller supply ships (junks), 300 enemy troops, 43 bridges.

In addition, the air squadrons continued to fly close air support for Marine troops.

Captain is Iowa

Captain W. A. Schoegh, a native of Ottumwa, Ia., and a graduate of the naval academy, Annapolis, commands the Sicily. He is a pleasant and competent man, age 47.

We Oppose Parking Meters In Wayne. What's Your Opinion?

If city officials follow up action taken at their last regular meeting Wayne will soon have parking meters.

Since the meeting we have tried to find whether or not the city council acted with "solid backing" of Wayne businessmen and those concerned.

Although there has not been too much outspoken criticism against the meters the majority of the businessmen feel that Wayne's parking problem is over-exaggerated and that there is no need for installation of the mechanical devices.

Most people are of the opinion that parking meters would provide a good source of revenue for the city but that the city coffers are not in need of monies by this means.

To more accurately find the people's feelings toward parking meters in downtown Wayne, we have furnished a ballot on the front page of today's Herald so that readers can express their desires on the problem. We want everyone to fill out a ballot and return it to The Herald office so that we may know your wishes.

After considerable deliberation and a great amount of visiting with merchants and farmers alike, The Herald has come to the conclusion that parking meters offer Wayne more headaches than parking space.

As stated elsewhere, we have tried to present both sides of the question and will continue to do so, even though opinions presented may conflict with our own personal editorial viewpoint. We feel that the newspaper is the soapbox of the people and all are entitled to use it to express themselves as they wish.

It is our opinion that nothing can ever be done in Wayne or any other small county town to park ALL cars that come to town on a Saturday night and park ALL those cars right on MAIN STREET! It is physically impossible—we folks just have too many cars. And we think that people that come here or to any other small town realize that fact and meters won't change it materially.

It is apparent that Wayne's parking problem is over-exaggerated. On Saturday nights, cars are seldom parked more than two and seldom up to 3 blocks from Main street. Omaha or Sioux City would brag out loud if they could get all their customers that close to the main business block!

Wayne, like other county seat towns, experiences its worst parking problems in a period of about 2 or 3 hours on Saturday night. Is it worth all the trouble of meters to do something for that short period? Is it worth all the headaches that enforcing parking meter time limits brings; the fines and the hard feelings that such fines bring? We have enough trouble trying to enforce other laws within the town. What would it be with parking meters? And parking meters are useless for space turnover unless followed with rigid enforcement.

A city like Sioux City or Omaha, with daily crowds, can get away with meters without much difficulty. But in a town like Wayne, the relationship is on a much closer and intimate basis, which makes the enforcement problem much more difficult.

Parking meters do not make more parking space available; they do (if enforced) give turnover of space but the biggest point that meter salesmen make is that they pour money into the city treasury. Wayne's financial standing is one of the most solid in the state. The city is not in dire need of the extra monies parking meters would furnish.

In our opinion, the trade area does not favor parking meters. If the farmer doesn't feel that parking will be benefited, then why should Wayne undertake the proposition? What good town doesn't have some parking problem on Saturday night?

Present parking regulations should be rigidly enforced and off street parking for businessmen and employees could be made available. It has already been suggested that space behind buildings be made suitable for parking.

Another idea that has been kicked around is that if we merchants want turnover of space on Saturday afternoon and evening, we should be able to easily place a two-hour parking limit in the business area on Saturday. It would take an officer to

chalk the tires. That can be done without meters, and it would give Saturday turnover, if that is what is wanted. It would get rid of the all-afternoon and evening roosters. Is it worth a try?

Now the writer again repeats that this is only one man's opinion. You folks who read this and wish to express your opinions, we'll be glad to publish them. We are not trying to convince anybody to think as we do on this subject. The editorial pages are a place for expressions of opinions — let's have yours.

We are heartily and fervently in favor of anything which will make shopping in Wayne easier and more pleasant. We believe we have one of the top towns in the state and one of the top trading centers.

We enjoy good business relations with the people who live in the territory adjacent to Wayne. We want to make it still easier and more convenient for them to trade in Wayne.

We are sure that the business men of Wayne have the same ideas. But we have not been convinced that parking meters will help in any great way. The main argument in their favor is the one which the parking meter salesmen stress too much, namely, more money for the city treasury. Parking would be aided very little.

Towns around us have meters. Why not let us advertise the fact that you can still drive to Wayne and buy a loaf of bread without paying a penny parking tax!



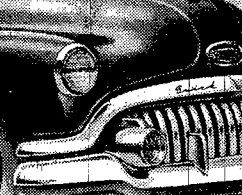

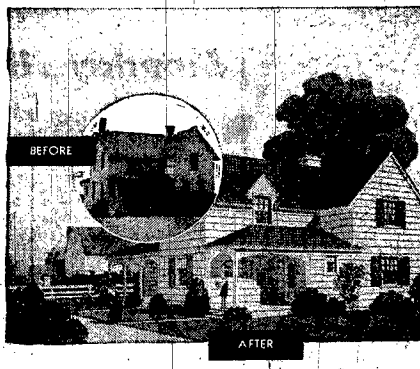
