'Don't Want Parking Meters' - Farmers, Merchants, Others Opposition Carries 7-1 Vote Margin

Wayne Herald readers are voting overwhelming protest to installation of parking meters in Wayne this week in The Herald's parking meter poll.

By Wednesday 530 ballots were returned in the poll started last Wednesday by the newspaper to determine public sentiment toward meters.

Votes against meters held over a 7-1 margin when the ballots were tabulated Wednesday afternoon. The county was 454 against meters and 22 for.

The ballots also had spaces for voters to check whether they thought meters would result in more parking space, or they would not add parking.

Nearly half of the votes cast were from farmers. Wayne merchants voiced another large percentage of the voting.

Results of this poll will have no effect resulting in either installing or not installing meters. That's a matter for the city council to decide.

City Council Meets; Sets '52 Tax Levy at 16 Mills

City officials met Tuesday night and passed an ordinance which sets the 1952 tax levy for the city of Wayne at 16 mills. This is 3 of a mill less than last year's levy.

The new levy will provide about \$60,000 in revenue. City Clerk Walter Bressler reports one mill produces about \$3,700. The budget for this year is \$458,500.

There were only two changes from last year's tax levy. Only two mills were needed for payment of interest on intercession bonds.

The complete ordinance and breakdown of figures and mill levies will appear in next week's Herald.

Other business included discussion of the parking meter problem. It was decided since city merchants had indicated there was no pressing parking problem that nothing would be done about installation of meters.

Bids were checked on a 13-ton truck chassis for the street department. No conclusion was reached as to which truck to purchase.

## To Pearl Harbor With The U. S. Navy

By Mark E. Cramer

Excitement aboard ship was not long in coming aboard the Sicily as she sailed down the channel at San Diego and out to sea.

"Man Overboard" brought every man aboard to attention long enough to listen to the loud speaker system and it actually happened before the ship got out of the channel. Many regulars aboard had never seen a man overboard before. Regardless of the fact that there was a possibility the man had jumped, the didn't want to leave home) speedy action rescued the sailor. Tho' our ship did not stop, a small boat was put out to get him - and bring him back to the ship.

Goodbyes to families and friends as a ship leaves on a long tour of duty are not pleasant memories. We witnessed that from the ship's deck. Let's make a quick comparison:

There were approximately 1,100 men (ship's company and two air squadrons) on the Sicily. Probably about the number of men who live in Wayne. If all of them were leaving at once - today - for six months more duty in the Korean "police action," perhaps you can visualize the number of cups, families, wives, children, sweethearts and friends who would be on hand to say goodbye.

Wonderful food and plenty of it for our selves in the navy. I ate with the officers, the captain, admiral's staff and the crew. Here is a sample meal with the crew's mess:

Tomato soup, big bowl; crackers. Roast beef on a long tour of duty. Vegetables, potatoes, green salad, cake and pie, hot rolls, butter, jam, coffee.

A sailor can have all he wants to eat, and believe me they get it. There's beef in a long tour of duty. Apparent everywhere, the food is tasty. After eating the sailor files, by a cleansing vat, where he dumps all leftover food as garbage, rinses

his tray by dunking it in soapy mixture between two big flat brushes stacked it with others for complete cleaning and sterilization.

Water used and consumed on ship is distilled daily—from sea water, and it's pure distilled water. The Sicily makes 36,000 gallons a day, uses 6,000 gallons in the boilers - remainder is available for ship's use.

Daily average kilowatt hour consumption of electricity energy is 11,807 and during flight operation it is 18,000.

### He'll to Leland Herman

One navy man came looking me up after noting a name from Wayne listed in the ship's paper (published each morning). He was Leland Herman who worked for Leland Herman here, and helped the local Poiled Herford breeder handle his show herd on fair circuit. Veit had several acquaintances here. He is from Estelline, S. Because the Sicily was ferrying a cargo of planes across the ocean, there was no flight action during our cruise.

Disappointing to be sure, but at least it gave the opportunity to prove about the ship and find out how many interesting departments there are, even on a small carrier, entirely apart from flight deck action.

I don't believe I have ever been with a group of men who were more courteous and considerate than the officers and men of the Sicily. This was especially true when it came to answering questions or taking time to explain technical matters in language that a novice could comprehend. All of us (the guests, that is) felt that this friendliness was genuine, not just a put on show. They were a great bunch, a "story book" sort of crew.

A major reason for the fine spirit aboard ship was Captain William A. Schoech who has a character and personality that inspires friendliness and confidence. Even the happiest of ships is no "after-

from at the country club. A captain like Bill Schoech, however, can set the pace in producing a sound morale that helps to make crowded conditions aboard ship life infinitely more endurable than they might be under a different sort of leadership.

Capt. Schoech, an Annapolis graduate and a career man in the Navy, is also a qualified carrier pilot. He was born in Iowa but now calls Alexandria, Va. his home.

Surprisingly enough, Captain Schoech said that Mid-west farm boys (who have usually seen nothing bigger than an inland lake before entering service) make excellent sailors. He said that they are used to hard work, are familiar with machinery, have initiative and are used to the idea of seeing a project through—invaluable factors in this complex, highly mechanized modern Navy of ours. They seem to adjust easily to life aboard ship, he stated, and quickly develop sound sea legs.

Reports indicate Ehlers was shaken up in the mishap but it was not believed he was seriously injured. The Wayne men caught rides home and Ehlers was treated.

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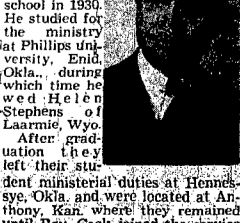
An autopsy revealed Ehlers suffered a punctured intestine and internal injuries.

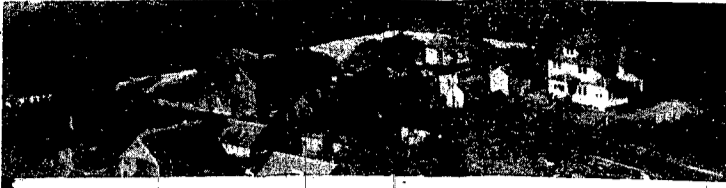

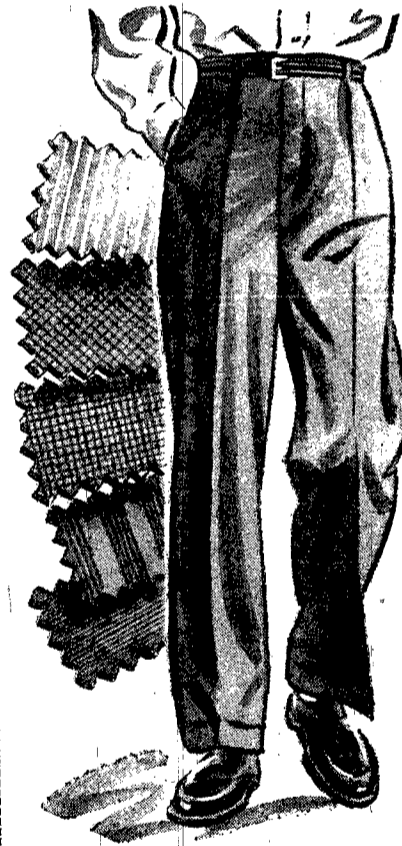

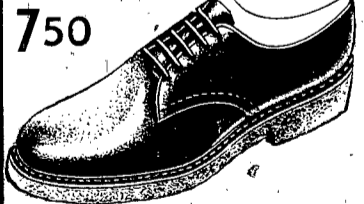
