



In the matter of usefulness to human beings, a meat animal is a mighty versatile critter.

It'll come as a surprise to many people to learn that only about half of the animal is actually meat. In years past, much of the other half used to be thrown away or destroyed.

But that's no longer the case. It is said of pigs that the packers save everything but the squeal—and that's almost literally true of all the other meat animals as well.

The non-edible half is the source of an amazingly long and varied list of by-products—including a great many articles the average family uses every day.

Average family uses every day.

Here are a few of them: bone for china; gelatin for mershmallows; hides for leather goods; chemicals for automobile tires; landin for coametics; hair for upholstery; fats for soap; wool for clothing.

And animal glands, which are carefully saved by the packers for the pharmaceutical concerns, are the source of valuable medicines such as cortisone, insulin, pepsin and various hormones.
