Kindergarten Pre-testing Plans Made

County Superintendent Marie Wright urges parents of rural youths who desire to enter kindergarten in the fall but who are not of legal age to contact her office as soon as possible.

Tentative plans call for pre-testing of rural youths during the first three weeks in August. Two days, the dates of which will be announced later, will be set aside for that purpose.

Youngsters who are five years of age or before Oct. 15 are of legal age for kindergarten.

However, youngsters who will be five on or before Dec. 31 may be pre-tested if parents want them to enter kindergarten in the fall.

Superintendent Wright asks that parents of youngsters to contact their local superintendents for information concerning the tests.

The county official re-emphasized that children cannot be pre-tested for the first grade.

Emerson Field Meet Scheduled Wednesday

Late this spring the management of the Alox-Stroman farm north of Emerson was turned over to the Bachelor of Science club of Dixon and Dakota counties. Along with the management a few tests were set up in small grain, legumes, grass and corn in varieties and with commercial fertilizers.

Wednesday, July 2, will be the first field inspection meeting at this farm. The inspection meeting will begin at 7 p.m. with Dr. M. D. Weddon of the Nebraska State Extension service, Department of Soils, in charge.

Two varieties of oats, also legumes, will be observed along with various applications of fertilizers.

The farm is located three miles north and one-half mile east of Emerson, lying in the southeast quarter of the section.

The Emerson Commercial club is co-sponsor of this twilight meeting.

PMA-SCS Flood Meet Held Here

A joint PMA-Soil Conservation service flood meeting was held at the REA building in Wayne Tuesday afternoon. This is the second flood restoration meeting held here recently.

Tuesday PMA and SCS officials from nine counties met to discuss the rehabilitation of farms damaged by the Missouri flood waters earlier this year.

Several state officials including A. L. Johnson, PMA state committee chairman; Ken Robertson, PMA state office; Lee Sellon and Edgar Ashlin, PMA field men; D. R. Balliett, SCS engineer; and A. R. Marquardt, SCS assistant state engineer.

Counties represented at the meeting were Boyd, Knox, Cedar, Dixon, Dakota, Thurston, Butler, Washington, Wayne county PMA and SCS officials also participated in the meeting.

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Livestock, Grain Totals Show Losses

The assessed valuation of real estate and personal property in Wayne county dropped over \$1 million during the past year, according to assessment figures released by County Assessor Henry Arp Tuesday.

The assessment figure for '51 was \$84,396,820. The year's total is \$83,040,815, or \$1,356,305 less. State and county tax levies will be announced after budgets are made and approved.

Assessor Arp explained that the big drop in valuation in Wayne county came under the livestock and grain headings. Cattle and hogs and corn and oats all showed deficits over last year's figures.

Corn Figure Down

The corn figure was down to \$386,445 from \$1,610,640 for last year. Cattle records show the same dropping from \$4,577,190 to \$4,400,640.

Hogs showed another big drop, sliding from \$1,081,640 in 1951 to \$489,825 in '52. The main reason for the hog and corn showing deficits over last year's figures was the grain matured and most of the corn was fed as soon as possible to prevent spoilage.

The business schedule heading showed a drop from \$965,490 to \$876,600 against \$708,730 on the records in 1951. Farm machinery and tools also showed a slight gain, rising from \$1,308,115 to \$1,384,645.

Other increases were listed under household goods and personal items. Household goods went up to \$476,825 from \$442,875 and personal items rose to \$35,400 from \$28,825.

While totals for money on hand, postal savings and savings account dropped from \$2,646,588 to \$2,192,655, totals for stocks, bonds and securities climbed from \$660,354 to \$1,007,055.

Speech Clinic and Camp Here Again This Year

Remedial treatment of children with speech handicaps will be available again this year at the Wayne State speech clinic and camp to be held on the campus from July 28 to Aug. 9.

Alice Liljeberg, speech specialist of the Dr. Lord's School for Handicapped Children in Omaha, will direct the diagnosis and treatment of speech defects at the clinic and will be assisted by James C. McCarthy, professor of speech at the college.

Children who attend the clinic and camp must be at least nine years old, have reached the third grade in school and be able to care for their personal needs. Children not meeting these requirements may be admitted to the clinic for help and instruction; but his family must provide lodging and care.

Housed on Campus

Children attending the camp will be housed on the campus under the care of experienced housemothers and recreational directors. Board will be provided by the college cafeteria.

Inquire at College

Inquiries regarding the clinic and camp may be obtained from Lenore P. Ramsey, professor of speech, or Mr. McCarthy, at the college.

Conventions — Coming Up

So far as the Republicans are concerned, the ending of the primary season finds the situation about as the forecasters expected. In pledged delegates, Eisenhower and Taft are, to all practical purposes, on an equal footing. Taft has a few more than his chief rival but the head is too small to be significant. Neither man has anywhere near enough to assure nomination.

Only one other active candidate can now be taken seriously. That is Governor Warren, who would have a good chance in the unlikely event that Taft and Eisenhower cancel each other out. Stassen is far weaker than he was four years ago.

From the point of view of the political writer, the Democratic situation is extremely interesting. The only candidate who has shown any ability to attract a national following is Kefauver. He has amazed the old-line professionals, who were certain that his balloon would collapse ignominiously. Instead, he has had only one minor setback, in Florida, and even there he made a better showing against the popular Russell than was anticipated. If proven public sentiment meant a thing, he would be a cinch for the nomination. But the top Administration brass wants no part of him and the chances are that they'll be able to stop him at the convention—something they couldn't do in the primaries.

Potent powers within the party are behind Averill Harriman. But, politically speaking, he is a question mark. He has never run for office. He is a quiet, undramatic figure who has, so far as anyone can now see, no public following of any size. There is a very real possibility that the Democratic convention will be deadlocked, and will finally choose someone who is rarely if ever mentioned now—such as Speaker of the House Rayburn.

Many Republicans still seem to feel that it's all over but the shouting—that their man, whoever he is, is practically a cinch to defeat any available Democrat. This, of course, was also felt in 1948, and the more objective political observers think that those who still hold it may be due for a painful awakening.

The Democratic candidate will run on the Truman platform. The President, regardless of how badly his prestige may have slipped, will be the biggest force at the convention. All of the possible candidates have endorsed Mr. Truman's so-called "fair deal."

That is true of Kefauver, who has leaned over backward to avoid criticizing the President and his program; it is true, to slightly varying degrees, of Russell, Kerr, Harriman and Stevenson.

The Administration is making its strongest bid yet for labor backing—as witness the President's action in the steel crisis. And it has been given the unequivocal endorsement of Philip Murray and other labor leaders.

People who want to unseat the Democrats often make the dangerous mistake of considering only the Administration's political liabilities—and disregarding its political assets. The Democratic platform of 1952 will be, so far as basic principles are concerned, much the same platform with which Mr. Truman ran to victory in 1948 when almost no one gave him a chance. From the Republican viewpoint, overconfidence could be politically suicidal.

When in doubt whether something coming out of the ground is a weed or a flower, the magazine advised, cut it down. If it grows back up, it is a weed.

A Bellwood farmer claims he has the most valuable hogs in the community. And why not? Returning to the pen at feeding time one day he noticed pieces of \$10 and \$20 bills on the ground. With a trembling hand he reached for his billfold—it was gone and so was \$100 in currency. Both the money and billfold had been eaten by his hogs.
