Marionette Shows Here July 22-23

Wayne State's special program series will conclude its summer schedule with the double appearance of the Coffey-Miller Marionettes next Tuesday and Wednesday.

The actor-marionettists will present the Pedal Marionettes in Mollere's ageless comedy in three acts, "The Imaginary Invalid," Tuesday night at 8 o'clock in the college auditorium.

Wednesday morning at 11, they will present "The Rivals," a comedy by Richard Brinsley Sheridan, with a Pedal Marionette. "The Rivals" are something new and different from the traditional marionette presentation of figures operated from above by strings. Pedal marionettes are operated from below, and no strings are visible, so that the figures appear to move under their own power.

Mr. and Mrs. Coffey employ 60 pedals and 130 strings in portraying 10 characters in "The Imaginary Invalid." In "The Rivals," nine characters are represented, and the Coffeys speak some 600 words of dialogue from memory while manipulating the marionettes.

Following the Wednesday morning production, the audience will be invited to come backstage to see the figures and for an informal question and answer period. Both performances are open to the public at no charge.

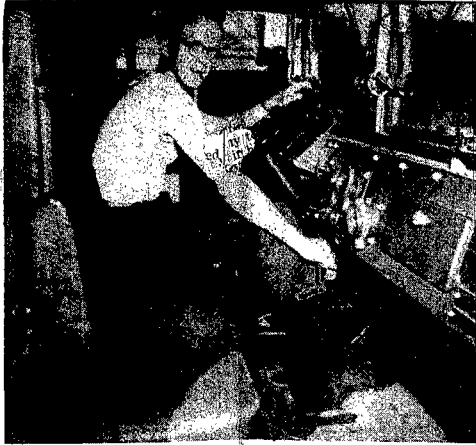

Automatic Transmission

The trucks have hydraulic drive—no clutch is used. To operate the vehicle all you do is move the shift gear into position and push on the footpedal.

Local National Guard Unit Gets Eight New Vehicles

Wayne's National Guard unit now has eight new trucks. They replace older vehicles turned in last spring.

Six 2 1/2 ton trucks equipped with hydraulic drive are the pride of the Guard unit.

Sgt. Harold Stammer, unit caretaker, reports these trucks cost around \$8,900. The automatic transmission has over 700 different parts and gives the truck eight speeds forward and four backward.

Other new units are a weapons carrier and a jeep.

All of the new army trucks are now being equipped with 24-volt electrical systems instead of six-volt systems used in the past. This allows additional electrical equipment to be run off the vehicles.

Run Under Water

Another innovation on new army trucks is the installation of snorkels so the vehicles can be run in depths of water up to 15 feet.

Former Native Accepts Post At Midland

Dr. Roderick B. Peck, a native of Wayne and graduate of Wayne State Teachers college, has been appointed to the faculty of Midland college as associate professor of psychology and sociology. He will begin his duties this fall.

Dr. Peck was superintendent of schools at Wynot for three years until 1949, then went to Iowa State where he began graduate work. He took his masters degree in 1950 and his doctorate this summer.

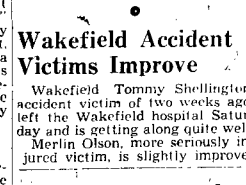
March of Dimes Drive Successful

Wayne City Schools Get \$3,577.33

County Superintendent Marie Wright announced Wayne county districts received a state apportionment amounting to \$23,823.72 this year. This total includes fines and license but does not include the controversial blanket school tax.

This year's apportionment is considerably higher than last year's. Sale of school lands in the western part of the state was the major factor in the increase. Last year's total was \$16,899.93 or \$6,923.79 less.

There are over 80 schools in the county and all of them except one, district 33, share in the apportionment. District 33 had no children of school age for several years.

Distribution of the funds is made according to the number of students in the district.

As might be supposed the town schools receive a greater amount than the rural schools. Wayne city schools, district 17, received \$3,577.33; Winside, district 29, \$1,074.29; Carroll, district 22, \$605.81; and Hoskins, district 9, \$485.27.

Wayne Resident Owns Stamp, Money and Flag Collections

It was a letter from Korea which renewed Dr. T. T. Jones' interest in his money collecting hobby.

Recently, Dr. Jones, a long time resident and doctor in Wayne, received a note and a three-cent piece from a soldier in Korea, Charles Horrell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jess Horrell. The note is worth 18¢ in our money and the coin is only valid in a British canteen there.

But Dr. Jones owns other hobby treasures, among them a bill for 100,000 German marks. There is also the head reproduction of Hans Holbein's 'Merchant Gieseze.' Hans Holbein was an acclaimed artist during the reign of Henry VIII.

The doctor collects trade dollars, those which were made to trade with cheaper Mexican money. When silver was standardized they were found to have little value.

Among the bronze or copper coins are representatives from Italy, Belgium, Greece, France, and Germany. The first is dated 856 and the Grecian coin is 1879. The Belgium coin has a horseshoe decoration while the Grecian coin has an interesting ink blot motif.

The two-cent French coin has graceful swirling decorations on one side, with a lion on the other and the inscription 'L'Union fait la force.' Chinese money of this bronze material has a square cut out of the center while the 50¢ Spanish piece has written on it 'Medio-Balboa'.

The 12 Confederate bills range in denomination from \$1 to \$500, and resemble each other in their pale pink and grey colors. Dr. Jones has all but one in the Liberty head jigsaw collection and of this exception there are only six in circulation.

Dr. Jones owns a buffalo nickel with only three legs and he owes it to a quirk of fate. One of his coin-collecting friends one day asked him if he had seen any of these new coins; the doctor joked back a 'No!' and reached in his pocket. He found a three-legged, grazing buffalo on a nickel and it is the only one he has seen since.

As soon as the misprint was discovered, no more coins were made with the die. The cause, of course, was a faulty die, one which had not been carved out sufficiently.

Dr. Jones has all the Mercury head dimes beginning 1916 and his Lincoln head pennies range from 1909. Two of the latter have the initials of the man who designed that penny. There is also a full set of Indianheads from 1856 to 1909. He does not have the 1836 Indian head dime which is worth \$1,000.

On the coins is designated an S for San Francisco, a D for Denver, and no number represents the Philadelphia mint. These are the sites of the three Federal mints.

Dr. Jones has the flags representing the 14 nations in the League of Nations to follow World War I. This unique collection has complete reproductions in ink of the bright and colorful national flags.

The doctor in his little spare time also pours with tedious care over his stamp books. He has potato stamps, presidential commemorative stamps and all too many to mention, and he is faithful in his hobby.

When asked why he had collected the articles these 20 years, the doctor answered, 'Just not crazy.' It takes a lot of ambition, skill, patience and knowledge to just get 'crazy' in this instance.

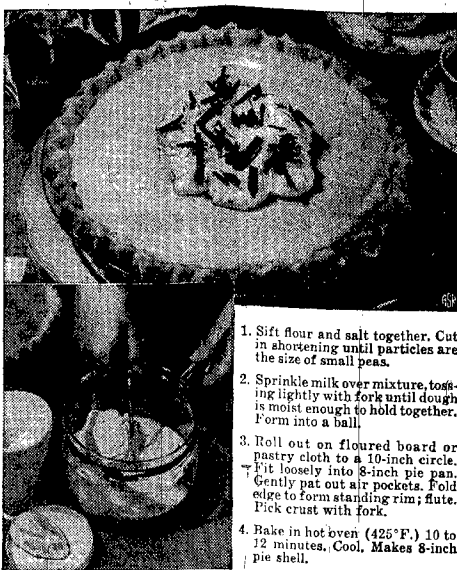

4. Bake in hot oven (425°F.) 10 to 12 minutes. Cool. Make 8-inch pie shell.

- Apple Filling
1 package orange-flavored gelatin
1 1/4 cups hot canned apricot nectar
1 pint vanilla ice cream
1. Dissolve gelatin in hot liquid in 2-quart saucepan.
 2. Add ice cream by spoonfuls, stirring until melted. Then chill until thickened, but not set (15 to 20 minutes).
 3. Turn into cooled baked pie shell. Chill until firm (15 to 20 minutes). Garnish with whipped cream and shaved chocolate.

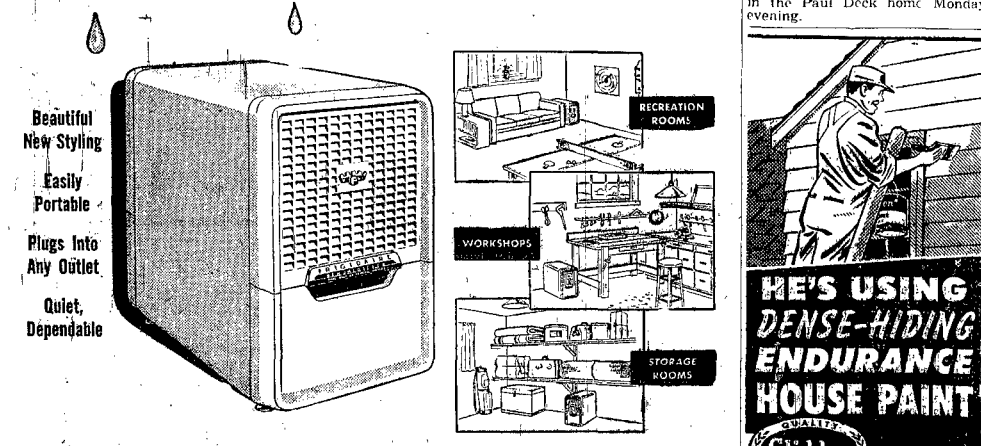

Hulda Johanson

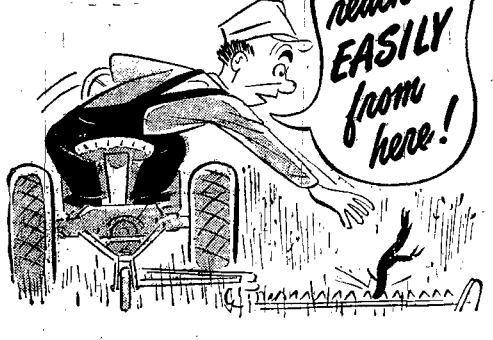

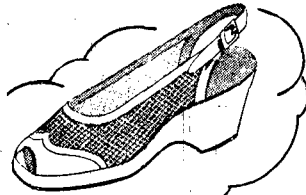

Democrats Next

Soon the Democrats will take over the spotlight with the opening of their nominating convention in Chicago. It promises to be a colorful show. Here is a rundown of the leading candidates and a brief analysis of their chances based on information which is believed to be reliable but is not guaranteed.

Estes Kefauver. The Senator from Tennessee with the coonskin cap has shown far more pulling power among the voters than any other aspirant to the biggest job in the world. He has suffered only one severe setback, when Averill Harriman beat him badly in the District of Columbia primary. His reputation as a crime-buster is a tremendous asset. But the administration wants no part of him, has gone all out to stop him, and that will probably prove fatal to his ambitions.

Richard Russell. Senator Russell is well liked in administration circles—he has voted for most of the Truman proposals. But the professionals doubt that he has enough popular appeal to win in November. He is a distinct possibility for the second spot of the ticket.

W. Averill Harriman. Mr. Harriman is one of the wealthiest men in the country, and he is also about 1000 per cent for the Truman policies. He seems to have the White House blessing. His reputation is that of a hard-working, sincere and rather colorless administrator and diplomat. His major liability is that he hasn't started any fires or even sparks among the electorate. The commentators don't give his D.C. win much importance.

Albin Barkley. The Veep, who was in politics before most living Americans were born, has indicated he'd like the nomination. He could conceivably get it if a deadlock results.

Adlai Stevenson. Governor Stevenson has not sought the nomination, and has said he prefers to continue his work in Illinois. Many political writers and observers think he would be the Democrats' best bet by a long shot. In many respects his views go along with the President's, but there are important exceptions. For one thing, he believes in taking the waste out of government—he is said to have described himself as a close man with a buck, whether it be his own or the taxpayers'. At a vote-getter, he proved extraordinarily able in his run for the governorship.

Last, but certainly not least, is a confident, tough man named Harry Truman. Some still think he would accept a draft. Stranger things have happened in the strange world of American politics.

Perhaps you like history and if so "The Strange Brigade" will take you to a distant time and a different locale. It is an action-packed novel about a doubtful band of Scottish pioneers who braved a perilous ocean voyage to find a new homeland in what is now the province of Manitoba. Then there is another novel about a bull fighter called "Matador", written by Barnaby Conrad. Agony bull fight may not be your cup of tea so you might prefer something funny. In that department we recommend "The Nine Brides and Granny Hite", a story that will take you to the mountains of Kentucky where Granny Hite is having a quilting bee for a new bride. The gossip that goes on there reminds you that people are pretty much the same the world over and in all ages. For those who just can't leave politics alone there is a story that puts about the right slant on the subject. Farm Safety Week

National Farm Safety week begins Sunday, July 20.

Farming is dangerous work. Thousands of farmers were injured last year. Insurance figures list farming as one of the three most dangerous occupations in America.

Farm accidents hurt everyone in the community. They cost farmers life and limb, or lost time and production.

An accident can lay up a farmer at exactly the wrong time—when his field is ready for harvesting, for example.

Accidents cost as much as \$35 per farm resident in a typical year. That is money that might otherwise have been spent for goods and services.

Right now is the time of the year when a big share of fatal accidents happen to farm people. Why? Because you are too busy to be careful.

You take chances with moving machinery, running engines, and farm animals because you are in a hurry. "Green" hands are allowed to do jobs they do not know enough about.

So this year—for safety's sake—take a little longer, and live a lot longer. Think safety—**think safety.**

Polio Precautions

Several polio epidemics have broken out in Nebraska during the past few weeks. So far there have been no cases reported in this vicinity. . . and we certainly hope this remains true.

Following are essential precautions to which all of us should conform to lessen the possibilities of contracting polio.

1. Avoid fatigue from work or play.
2. Don't get chilled. Don't swim too long in cold water nor sit around in wet clothes.
3. Don't mix unnecessarily with new groups. Don't take children out of camp where there is good health supervision.
4. Watch closely for signs of illness—headache, fever, sore muscles, stiff neck or back, trouble in breathing or swallowing.
5. Put a sick person to bed at once, away from others, and call your doctor. Follow his advice.
