Guard Unit Leaves for Camp McCoy Sunday

Music Concert Sunday Closes Annual WSTC Summer Camp Public Invited To Finale At Auditorium

Student musicians at Wayne State's summer music camp will climax their week's activities of fun and music with a triple-act public concert in the Wayne city auditorium next Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

The concert will include programs by the music camp band, orchestra and chorus group, directed by Gerhard Schroth, director of music of the Detroit Lutheran church and guest conductor of the camp.

The camp band will also present an open-air concert in the campus Willow bowl at 7:15 tonight. Sections of the concert will be directed by Eugene Beaman, professor of music at Wayne State; Orval Graham, music supervisor at David City, and Duane Schultz, music supervisor at Nebraska City.

The band and chorus groups will be heard on the regular Wayne State on the Air broadcast at 8:15 Eight Annual Camp.

This year's music camp, which is the eighth annual camp sponsored by the college, has a record enrollment of 173 high school students from Nebraska, Iowa and Wyoming, according to Russell Anderson, chairman of the division of Fine Arts at Wayne State and director of the camp. The largest previous enrollment was 169 in 1946.

The program for the public concert Sunday afternoon is as follows:

By the camp chorus group: "Let Us Break Bread Together," "Hosanna," "The Pines of Home," "Lullaby," "Student Song," Schein-Hawerton; "The Turtle Dove," Williams; "My Waukena," Robert Schumann; "The American Song," by Murray.

Directing the training of the chorus group is Russell Anderson, assisted by Willard Johnson, Wakefield music supervisor, and Ivan Caldwell, Albion music supervisor. Band work is being handled by Eugene Beaman, assisted by Duane Schultz and Orval Graham, and orchestra training by Benjamin Bernstein, professor of music at Wayne State.

Permission Given Wayne High to Use Ball Park

Wayne High school received permission from the city council Tuesday to use the local baseball park for football games this fall.

C. N. Olson, spokesman for the school board, explained the college was changing their games from Saturday night to Friday night and high school and college games were conflicting.

During the past seasons the High school rented the college field for their games. This did not conflict as the college played their games on Saturday nights and the High school on Friday night.

Before the college started playing their games on Saturday nights the schedules were arranged so that both teams would not be in Wayne the same weekend.

Seating Discussed

Olson asked the council if it would be possible to assist with seating arrangements. After a discussion was held it was decided it might be possible to use the bleachers at the ball park in their present location. Three sections of portable bleachers would be placed on the other side of the field. If this plan does not work out additional bleachers will be built.

The football field would run northeast and southwest on the outfield sod. If calculations are correct no playing will take place on the infield.

Council members also discussed the advisability of lowering the speed limit in the business district to 15 miles per hour. It is now 25 miles per hour.

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Korean Vets Eligible For Mustering Pay

County Service Officer Budd Bornhorst received notification Saturday that servicemen discharged from active duty under honorable conditions after June 26, 1950, are now eligible for mustering-out pay.

The law provides for payment of \$100 to veterans with less than 60 days active service; \$200 for those with 60 days active service but no foreign service; and \$300 for veterans with 60 days or more of active service who have served outside the United States or in Alaska.

Veterans in this county who are eligible for mustering-out pay should contact Service Officer Bornhorst and file necessary application blanks and forms.

'52 County Oats Harvest Spotty', Reports Official

"The oats crop in Wayne county was spotty," This is the report given The Herald by local PMA chairman Tom Roberts, when asked about the oats harvest in this region.

Roberts announced farmers had reported yields from 10 to 75 bushels per acre. He estimated the county's average yield around 35 bushels per acre.

Dan McGuire and Darrell Fickett, Leslie precinct, are among the farmers reporting low yields.

McGuire's oats crop harvested about 10 bushels per acre. He sowed light and planted alfalfa with the oats.

Darrell Puckett's crop yielded 15-16 bushels per acre. Sweet clover took his crop.

Albert Kerstine, Chapin precinct, had both good and poor oats. Oats planted on rented ground yielded only 12 bushels per acre but oats planted on good bottom ground ran around 60 bushels per acre.

Rudy Vlasak, Sherman precinct, reports the top yield in the county, 75 bushels per acre. He used commercial fertilizers on his oats.

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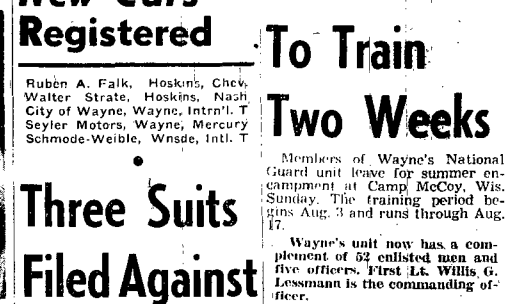

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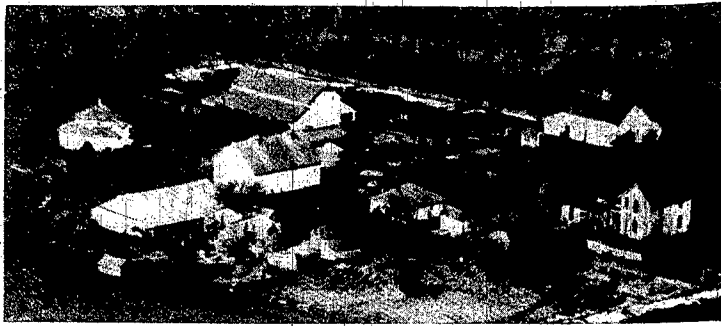
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John E. Carlson, Concord, is the owner of Mystery Farm No. 18 run in The Herald July 17.

Formula for Political Success

What is the formula for political success, how to be elected president. It isn't too hard to figure out; all you have to do is to study the election campaigns of the past 20 years, and there is the answer as big as life.

We know that there are numerous minority groups in the nation with each having a sizeable number of votes; a few million here, a few million there, they all add up to a lot of millions. Now we all know that nobody is satisfied with an even break, 50-50. Everybody is looking for the best of the deal. So naturally, the thing to do is to promise each group something real good.

There aren't very many rich people, they are only a very small part of the voting population. People working for wages or salaries, the small businessmen, the farmers, and old timers, those who are receiving old age assistance, pensions or social security, all these make up more than 95 percent of the voters, so pay no attention to the rich but appeal to the voters who have small or moderate incomes.

Promise the worker more wages (but don't tell him that he will have to pay more for everything), promise the farmer better prices and don't tell him that he too will have to pay more. And now the old timers, the steel workers were after a raise of 26 cents an hour, \$2.08 a day. So tell the old timers, those who receive assistance or social security, that if the union gets a raise of \$2.08 a day that you'll see to it that these old age non-workers get the same raise. If some smart cookie wants to know where the money is coming from, tell him that you'll make the rich people pay it.

That answer has been used successfully for 20 years and it should still be good. It is true that not everybody to whom you make these promises will believe you but with a big majority they will go over big. Keep a straight face, when making these plausible promises, never let them get the idea that you can't make good on them if elected, but after you get in, what do you care?

And if anybody asks about the war and wants to know how we are going to get out of it, tell them that you are working for peace. Come up with a lot of praise for the boys that died over in Korea, and if anybody wants to know why they had to go over there and die, you had better come up with a lot of double talk and start talking peace again.

Promise everybody everything, don't hold back and don't make any crack about seeing to it that they'll get an even break. Who wants an even break?

Using Gold to Fight Cancer

In the Naval hospital at Bethesda, Md., a new weapon is being used against cancer. Tiny crumbs of radioactive gold giving off rays similar to X-rays, are being injected into cancer patients who are suffering from dangerous complications of certain deep-seated cancers of the lung and abdominal organs.

Gold is particularly well suited for this job in that it is a heavy metal and stays put until it does the job. For all practical purposes, the radiating power of gold lasts for only 10 days, while some other material, which would give out radiation for thousands of years, would not be suitable.

Reports from naval doctors indicate that there is growing evidence that this new treatment helps to relieve pain, reduces the need for periodic tapping of the fluid, and in some cases appears to cause reduction of the cancer itself.


