Because of the lack of hedges and walls, the Devonalds were amazed that Americans left their garden tools out overnight and locked nothing up. They were sincerely impressed with the Black Hills and felt that the sculptured hill was one of the seven wonders of the world. They also stressed the point that our animals were so large, our birds and our insects were overgrown in comparison to theirs. When questioned about communistic influence there, they acknowledged the movement there to infiltrate the government, but seemed sure that there is no live communism. The English people are very anxious and curious about our election and were amused at our party conventions. A former exchange student to Wayne college, Doris Palmer, now Mrs. Gary Ellis, lives in Chippenham, the home of the Devonalds. She was here between 1936 and 1937 and is now the wife of the schoolmaster. She lived with Leona Ramsey while here. The Devonalds will leave from New York Aug. 27 for their English home. They had a "very happy time and met such very nice people," and they "regretfully leave but hope to return at some future date."

Telephone Rate Raise Requested

Higher rates in Nebraska have been asked by Northwestern Bell Telephone company. A request was posted with the State Railway Commission by L. O. Arstad, general manager. Inflation was blamed for the request. Wage increases and higher operating costs accounted for the company's action. Arstad pointed out, "Overall cost of living has increased 85 per cent in the past few years while at the same time the revenues from telephone rate increases in Nebraska are up only 32 per cent on the average, or less than a third." "About 3,800 Nebraskans work for the company," Arstad said, "and to keep them as employees, good working conditions—including satisfactory salaries—are necessary." When asked what increases would be necessary, Arstad said that the exact amounts had not been determined as yet. "We don't want to raise rates, but inflation forces us to do it," he said.

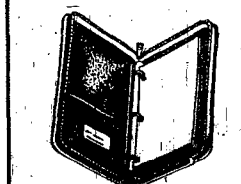

Laurel Man Owns Mystery Farm No. 22



Albert Fuoss, Laurel, owns the seven-acre Mystery Farm, located seven miles north and three west of Wayne. Jeanette Fuoss was the only leader able to identify the Mystery Farm this week.

Mr. Fuoss has lived on the farm for five years. He farms an additional 140 acres which yields the Mystery Farm.

A carefully planned livestock-crop program is carried on by the Laurel farm. Generally over 100 head of hogs are fed annually. There are now 125 hogs being fed

on the farm. Other livestock includes 40 beef cattle and seven head of milk cows.

Corn, oats, alfalfa and pasture are the crops being raised this year. A break-down of the quarter section shows 60 acres in corn, 35 in oats, 15 in alfalfa and 30 in pasture. Fuoss reports the oats yielded 35 to 40 bushels per acre. Grassed waterways and crop rotation are part of the conservation program practiced on the farm.

A new double crib was built last fall. It was painted this spring and were the hog house and garage.

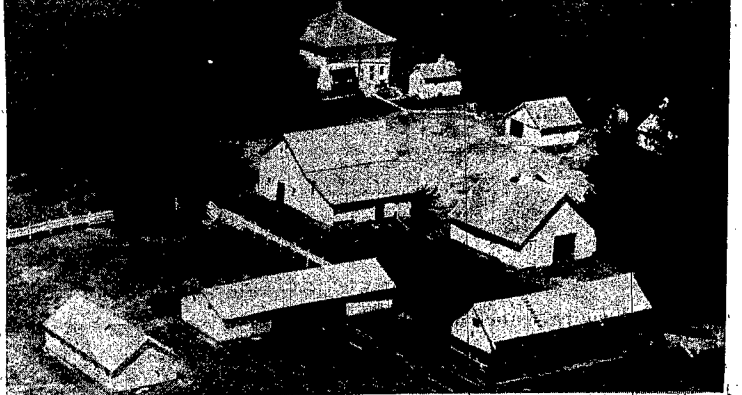

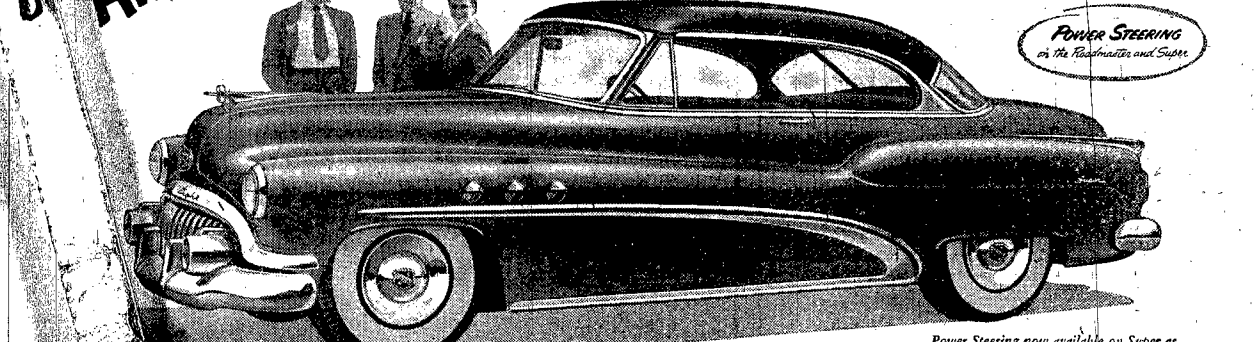
