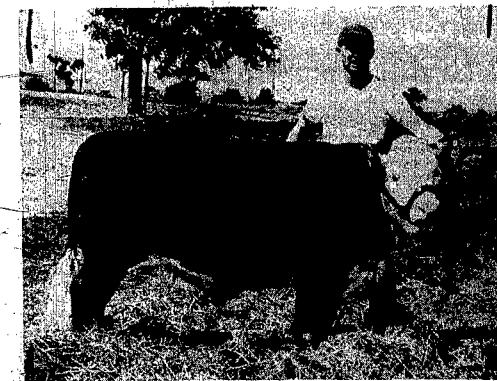
Jack Langemeier is shown above with his Hereford heifer judged grand champion of the 4-H Baby Beef show at the Wayne county fair.

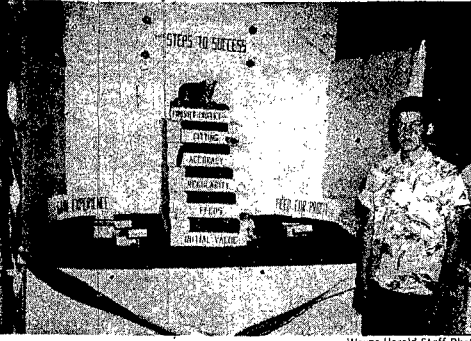

**NEBRASKA FARM OUTLOOK**

(The MONTHLY FARM OUTLOOK is reprinted from Notes on Nebraska Farm Business, a monthly publication of the Department of Agricultural Economics, Agricultural Extension Service, College of Agriculture, University of Nebraska, Lincoln. This authoritative report is reprinted each month by the State National Bank of Wayne as a service to our customers and friends.)

**"Our Roots are In This Land"**

**Economic Situation**

The drouth throughout the South is reaching serious proportions for agriculture. The immediate concern for many farmers in the drouth area is the salvage of their beef herds. Many farmers already have been forced to reduce the herd size because of the lack of feed. Other farmers are already feeding the first cutting of this year's alfalfa, the second cutting will be very short and perhaps no third at all.

The influx of feeder and stocker cattle has further weakened a market that was already burdened with a considerably larger flow than a year earlier.

There seems to be the general feeling that higher quality slaughter cattle prices will not weaken substantially this summer — except for unusually large daily receipts — and may even strengthen a couple of dollars the next couple of months. But low quality animals may experience considerably weaker prices.

**Cattle**  
Prices Steady  
Prices showed seasonal strength the early part of July, but unusually large receipts have caused prices to ease downward. Considerable numbers of feeders and stockers are arriving from Oklahoma, Texas and particularly Kansas. Some low grades are coming from Kentucky and Tennessee.

**Cattle Situation (Especially feeder cattle)**

Producers of grass cattle in Nebraska and elsewhere are watching the market with keen interest and with some concern. The price at which this class of cattle is moving to market is considerably below last year and a further price decline seems likely when the volume of marketings of grass cattle increases at the close of the grazing season. Commercial slaughter of cattle in the first six months of 1952 was only 5% larger than a year earlier but prospects indicate that cattle slaughter will rise more than usual this fall.

**5 Million Head More in 1952**

Despite increased slaughter, cattle numbers on farms continue to increase. The increase for this year may yet approximate 5 million head, in addition to an even larger increase the year previous. The long-run trend in cattle prices is likely to be downward, barring renewed and prolonged general price inflation. However, for the time being, the decline in pork production tends to partly offset the increases in beef, and consumer demand still continues strong. Unless slaughter increases more than now appears likely, prices for the rest of this year may continue not greatly below the same period last year.

**Feeder Prices Down \$7**

Prices of stocker and feeder cattle dropped sharply in June. In the week end-

ing June 21 the average price at Kansas City was \$24.29 (per cwt.) compared with \$31.00 for some time previously. A price decline for this class of cattle usually occurs at this time of year but the current year's decline was sharper than usual because of decreased demand for cattle to go on grass and weaker prices of slaughter cattle. Though the slackening in demand for feeder cattle in June was partly due to unseasonably warm and dry weather prevailing over the feed and pasture areas, stocker and feeder prices are not expected to recover much of their loss this summer. A further seasonal decline is likely this fall. The numbers of cattle on pasture and range was probably materially larger than for several years past and the biggest increase in cattle slaughter during the rest of this year will probably be in grass cattle.

The relative high price of feeder steers in the late summer and early fall of

1951 was unusual. Cattle feeders who filled their feed lots at these high prices faced dwindling profits or even losses when these cattle were ready for market in June and July of 1952.

**Prices Still Relatively High**

The course of cattle prices will be determined chiefly by the increase in slaughter. Thus far in 1952 the increase in cattle slaughter has been less than

had been expected, and less than enough to check the expansion in cattle numbers on farms. Prices of cattle are still higher than in most previous years and very little lower than the record high level of 1951. The fact that current rates of slaughter have not checked the rapid expansion in cattle numbers on farms indicates that heavier slaughter will be required to stabilize cattle numbers. Increased slaughter in turn will bring greater downward pressure on cattle prices. Some adjustment in prices of cattle compared with lambs and hogs seems to be in order. The 1951 steer-hog price ratio had been exceeded only twice in 30 years, and the price of choice beef steers in the last few years has been a little above their average ratio to the prices of lambs.

**Greater Slaughtering Expected**

Slaughter of fed cattle, which has comprised an unusually large percentage of the total this year, was 5% higher during the first five months of 1952 than during the same period last year. Indications are that slaughter of fed cattle will continue large this summer. Relatively large slaughter is expected

in the late fall, though it may or may not equal the very large slaughter in that season last year.

Cattle feeding seems to be holding up well this summer. The number on feed for market in the 11 Corn Belt states on July 1 this year is estimated to be 13% larger than on July 1, 1951. The number on feed in the east Corn Belt is 18% larger than last year; in the western Corn Belt 11%; and in Nebraska 16% larger.
