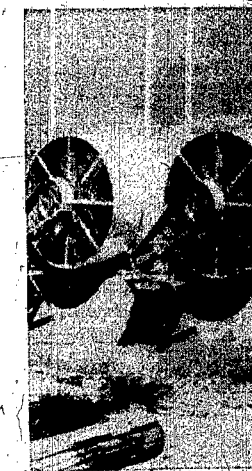
### Resolutions Discussed by Commander

# Legion Speaker Urges Rededication to Freedom

"Americans must speak out for the big truth if we are to wage an effective battle against the murderous, atheistic ideology of government headed by the Kremlin."

This was the statement of Peter Marchetti, Omaha, immediate past commander of Nebraska's American Legion, at a joint banquet meeting of third district Legion and Auxiliary members Tuesday night at the city auditorium.

State Commander Warren Wood, Gering, presided over the dinner, which was attended by over 300 Legion members and their wives.

Marchetti declared we must rededicate ourselves to the basic principles of freedom laid down by our forefathers in the Declaration of Independence. He urged all

citizens to join with the Legion in that organization's battle to keep our country free.

He made a plea to all voters to visit the polls in November and register their individual protest against the inroads of communism in America. The forceful speaker pointed out that only 51 per cent of the nation's eligible voters took part in the 1948 national election. He compared this with the 94 per cent mark chalked up in Australia in 1951.

"Failure to vote is merely forfeiting one's inalienable rights," he emphasized.

Marchetti pointed out that the cold war being fought is one for the minds and souls of the entire universe. The avowed goal, as stated by Lenin in 1919, is the complete domination of the peoples of the world, he added.

"America has fought a consist-

ently losing war against the Reds since 1945," he said. "These losses come through our acceptance of the 'big lie,' which proclaims government as the supreme being. If we are to win this war, we must stop trying to milk the mushrooming cow of government hand-outs."

Entertainment for the evening's program was provided by Wayne High school twirlers, vocal solos by a WSTC student and musical numbers by "The Hungry Five."

Visiting Legion dignitaries and district officers were introduced by Commander Wood before the main address. Mrs. Wilma Harms, department Auxiliary president, gave a short speech.

is, and always will be, agriculture, yet our agriculture department is a conglomeration of disconnected duties.

Emphasizing this point, he said the agriculture department now collects gasoline and cigarette taxes and also issues hotel and restaurant licenses. He added that a legitimate agriculture function, grain warehouse inspection is handled by the railway commission.

The youthful Crosby came out against a state sales tax, but qualified his statement. He said the state needs a new source of revenue but it must come with a guarantee it will not be used to mushroom state government activities.

Along this path, he pointed out that Nebraska now collects less per capita taxes for state government than 46 of the other states, but it also takes more property taxes per capita than any other state. He stressed reduction of property taxes as one program of an administration under his leadership.

Speaking on the assistance program, Crosby declared, "It's about time the families of Nebraska resumed their obligations to their own. The greatness of a society depends on its underlying character." He also advocated increasing maximum assistance, but only on the basis of need.

## How to Cook Muskrat

The Saturday Evening Post has been running a series of brief articles, written by Sidney Shalett, showing how your tax money is wasted. A recent one dealt with "Uncle Sam's Book-of-the-Minute club."

The government, it seems is in the book business on a colossal scale. Some 70,000 different books, pamphlets and periodicals are available from the Government printing office. Some are given away, and some are sold usually at a below-cost figure.

One senator has stated that Agriculture department publications alone would make a stack 52 feet high. Among the all-important subjects covered in this mass of literature are "The Cuban Frog Leg Industry," "The Venezuelan Salt Fish Industry," and the book to end all books, "Recipes for Cooking Muskrat Meat."

This is an example of how the taxpayers' money is spent on projects which are of interest to an infinitesimal number of people.

Government book-publishing, of course, is like everything else in government. Those involved want better jobs and more authority. They want to seem important and, if possible, irreplaceable. So they get out more and more books whether there is any demand or reason for them or not.

There isn't a department of government which isn't honeycombed with waste and duplication of effort. There isn't a department where money couldn't be saved without affecting any essential activity. And the total saving, according to Senator Byrd and other authorities, could be as much as \$10,000,000,000 a year. When will a start be made?

## Wonder Drugs

It is probably correct to say that medical science has made greater strides in the development of new drugs in the past two decades than in the entire history of medicine. New wonder drugs are now used not only to relieve pain and distress, but also to remove the cause of disease.

The history of the wonder drugs began back in 1932 with the discovery of the sulphu drugs. Now the list of wonder drugs includes in addition to the sulphas, penicillin, streptomycin, aureomycin, chloromycetin, terramycin, bacitracin, neomycin, tetracycline, pentaquin, chloroquin, paludrin, and the hormone, cortisone.

One out of every four persons stricken with pneumonia died 20 years ago, but today most victims are healed with penicillin in three or four days. With the development of bismuthic acid hydrazide, some tuberculosis victims have literally been pulled back from the brink of the grave.

But even considering the great advances that medical science has made in the past few years, the challenge of finding drugs and serums that will combat other major diseases, such as cancer, which kills about 200,000 people each year, still faces those who are writing medical history.

Wonder drugs for the treatment of the common cold, high blood pressure, hardening of the arteries, infantile paralysis, and others are still needed.
