

## Revised Bible Observance Service Tuesday

### Corn Contest Closes Saturday; Three More Entry Days Remain Over \$100 In Prizes For Winners

Farmers in the Wayne trade region have only three more days to enter their corn in the second annual corn contest being sponsored by Wayne merchants and The Herald. The contest closes Saturday at 5:30 p.m.

Up to Wednesday noon 14 entries in the tall stalk contest had been entered and 23 heavy ear groupings had been weighed.

Twenty-four Wayne merchants are offering prizes valued at over \$100 for the five tallest stalks of corn and the five heaviest groups of three ears of corn. The Herald is awarding a free six-month subscription as a bonus to the 10 prize winners.

First place winners of each division get five of the prizes. The second and third place winners will get three and two prizes respectively. The other four winners will get one prize each.

All prizes will be drawn by lot. A list of the winners will be published in the Oct. 2 issue of The Herald. Winners will come to The Herald office to get their prize certificates. Those who made entries may have their corn back if they so wish.

All Farmers Eligible  
All farmers in the Wayne trade area are eligible to enter. Each farmer may enter two stalks and two groups of three ears. Bring the entire stalks—do not cut it off above the ground. Shuck the ears and clip them off clean at the base.

It costs nothing to enter and you have a chance to win some prizes. Bring your entries in Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

County agricultural agents and specialists think around 90 percent of the corn crop in the county is safe from frost.

Some scattered fields that were replanted or planted late need a little more time to mature.

Everyone is agreed that this year's crop is about the "best ever."

### Dates Set For ACP Sign Up

Wayne county farmers will have an opportunity to sign up for the 1953 Agricultural Conservation program from Oct. 1 to Nov. 15.

To make the best use of the different practices, there will be a farm to farm visit made by the local PMA committee to help the farmer determine the conservation needs on the farm.

Farm plans prepared for the farm by the Soil Conservation Service or other agricultural agencies will be considered in setting up the conservation program for the farm for 1953.

To assist in the most effective use of assistance provided under ACP, a field by field check will be made to determine the conservation needs and to select the most urgently needed practices.

Practices selected will be submitted to the county PMA committee for approval.

Before the commitment visit the farms in his district, he will have thoroughly reviewed the conservation problems in his area and the conservation practices which will be most effective in meeting conservation needs.

Every farmer in Wayne county is eligible to participate in the 1953 ACP.

### Road Job to Wayne Man

A contract for gravel surfacing 4.1 miles of Federal-aid secondary road in Wayne county has been awarded, State Engineer Harold L. Aitken announced Thursday.

J. N. Eisinger, Wayne, is to receive \$16,762 for supplying and placing 5,800 cubic yards of gravel on the road.

Three firms bid on the work. Eisinger underbid one firm by \$106 and the other firm by \$1,276. The work is being financed with Wayne county funds matched with federal funds.

Wayne county farmers are doing the grading and structure work on this road, which connects highways 15 and 16. The road intersects No. 15 a mile south of Nebraska No. 53.

The grading and culvert work is also being financed with county and federal funds.

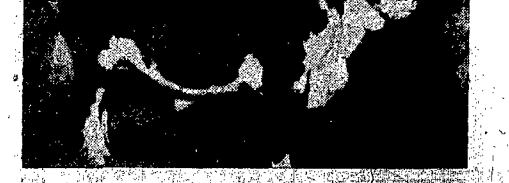

### Ten Study Centers Operated by College

Extension courses in ten study centers in northeastern Nebraska are being offered during the first semester by Wayne State Teachers college. Dr. Howard Tempero, dean of the college and director of the extension program, announced.

Classes in the study centers meet on a weekly basis for several hours each meeting, at which persons unable to attend regular college classes may earn credit toward degrees. Wayne State faculty members travel to the centers to hold classes.

Courses being offered this semester and the centers at which they are taught include: "Human Development and Behavior," Albion; "Improvement in Teaching Science," Albion; "Public School Music," Albion; "Workshop in Current Educational Problems," Hartington; "Science for Elementary Teachers," Neligh; "American History Since 1865," O'Neill; "Health Education," Pierce; "Principles of Teaching Grammar," Plainville; "Improvement of Teaching in Science," Stanton; "Human Development and Behavior," Wayne; and "Survey of English Literature," West Point.

Other centers will be opened later if demand arises, Dr. Tempero said.

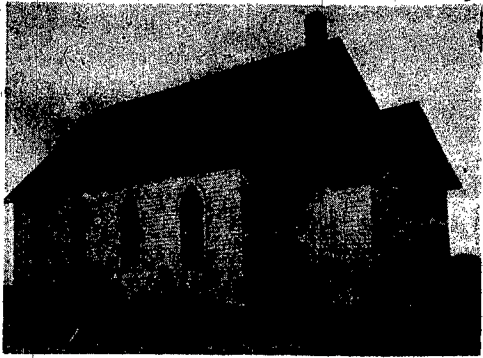

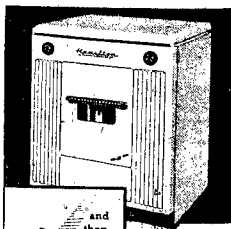

Rev. Ferris will speak on "The Faith These Times Demands" Monday evening and "The Deeper Level of Our Thinking" Tuesday.

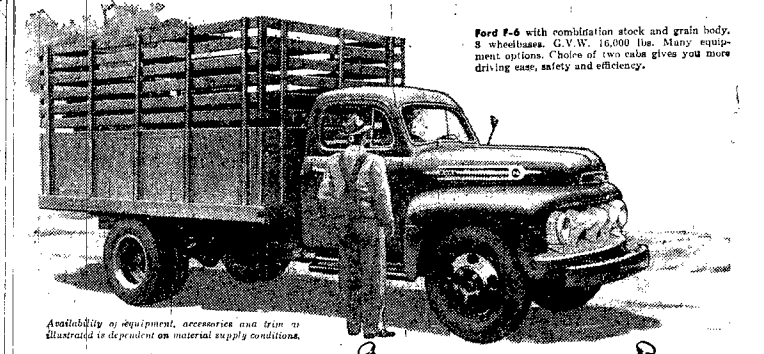

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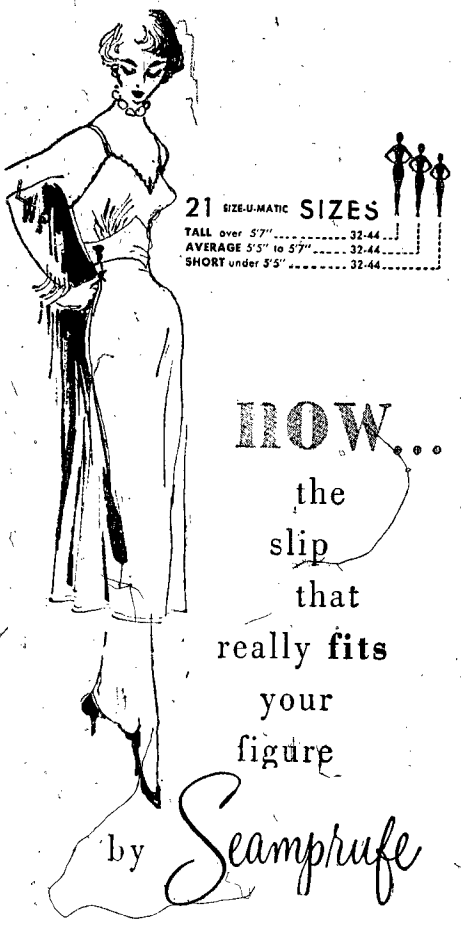

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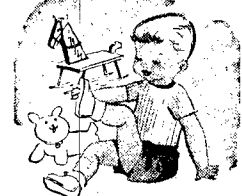

Bob Menhardt, Mapleton high ace last year, bulldozed over from the eight twice. Dick Clements added a third-period tally from the 17.

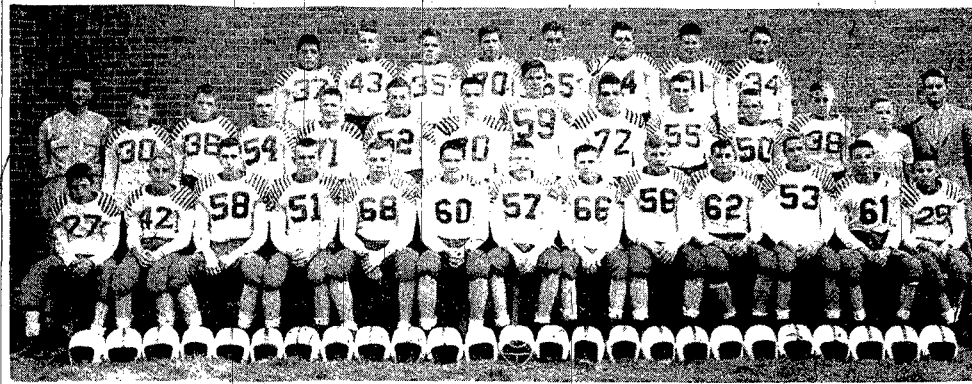
