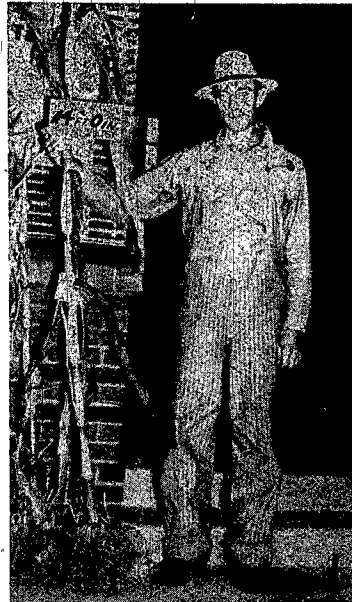

## Eisenhower and Taft

A good many people still seem to believe that General Eisenhower and Senator Taft have extremely divergent views on many issues, especially foreign policy, and that in some cases their differences are so great as to be irreconcilable. But that belief can hardly be sustained by a careful reading of what the two men say and what they stand for.

Both, for example, feel that high taxes are destructive and that an unsound fiscal policy can ruin a country. Both are for the free enterprise system, and both are against government paternalism and unnecessary government control of business and the individual. Both have spoken up for local rights and independence. Both are shocked at the spectacle of corruption in government. Both are strongly against what they regard as the socialistic tendencies and drives of the present administration.

Even on foreign policy — or most aspects of it — the two men differ more in degree than in purpose. Both favor the program of arms aid for countries combating communism, both support the cause of full cooperation for defense by the free nations.

You could sum up the situation by saying "Eisenhower and Taft both recognize the basic tragic dilemma of our times: The need to reconcile national solvency and the maintenance of a free economic system with the equally imperative need for developing strength against an external threat that assumes many forms — military, economic, diplomatic and psychological. Their differences are differences of method and emphasis."

## Ask Permission

Fall is here and this time of year means hunting of various types of game to many people. In the State Conservation Commission's bulletin issued recently was a reminder concerning relationship between hunter and farmer. The article says:

"With squirrel and rabbit seasons open and the pheasant and duck season just around the corner, now is a good time to remind ourselves that hunting on private lands is a privilege, not a right."

"Most farmers welcome hunters who show the common courtesy of asking to hunt. Asking permission is the considerate thing to do, and the wisest. You will have better hunting, both now and in years to come, and perhaps make a lasting friendship if you do this."

"Wildlife is the common property of everyone. But while a farmer does not hold title to the wildlife on his land, he does hold the access to that wildlife. Willful trespass or abuse of hospitality can close that access."

"It is up to the individual sportsman to make himself welcome in a hunting territory."

The best way to do this is to ask permission, and they hunt with care and consideration. Asking the farmer first will give you a more productive and enjoyable hunt. It is also the mark of a gentleman."

## Beef Prospects Bright

According to recent government reports, the stage is being set for the largest production of beef the country has ever known.

Last year, cattle numbers increased by more than 6,000,000 head, and are still rising.

The present calf slaughter is the lowest in proportion to the birth rate since the department of agriculture began to keep records back in 1924 — which means that producers are using more and more calves to build up their breeding herds instead of sending them to market. And this year's calf crop, the forecasters say, will hit a record high of substantially more than 37,000,000 head.

That augurs well for the future of our beef supply — which is a mighty important matter in a nation of heavy meat-eaters.

## Building a Better Community

Mrs. M. B. Street's two favorite colors, yellow and green, have been used almost exclusively in the decoration of the Street home at 907 Nebraska. The living room, 13x20 is painted green, with three walls a fine pastel green and the north wall a deeper sea green. The rug and most accessories are in rose tints, a soft grey-rose.

Mrs. Street's kitchen has been well-planned to fit her duties. Yellow and green are the main colors. The walls are pale yellow, the cupboard work area in dark green with that and a light green also on the floor, and the chrome dinette set is in dark green. The curtains are of white organdy. Mrs. Street has a special work area which has been lowered three inches to accommodate her short height.

What-not shelves decorate the south window and the end of the cupboard bar. Mrs. Street found the lap board very handy for canning this year. She is especially happy with the huge broom closet. There is also an open closet behind the back door for storage of garden tools and odds and ends.

The buff brick home is a modified ranch style. It was begun in June, 1951. The Streets moved into their home January this year. It measures 34x36 and has five rooms and a bath, with the dinette in the 19x9 kitchen. The master bedroom measures 13x13. Their daughter, Quintella, has a room 11x13. The master bedroom is 11'x13. Woodwork throughout the home is pine and all the doors are birch.

The master bedroom has two walls in light fawn and two in dark fawn, a creamy arch-beige color. The double closets accommodates both Dr. and Mrs. Street's garments. The furniture is blond and will go nicely with the rose spread and drapes Mrs. Street plans to get.

The compactness of the yellow and black bathroom makes no hall closet necessary. However there is a linen closet in the hall. The light yellow walls, deeper yellow floors and black ceiling are toned down in intensity by the white tile around the bathroom. It also contains a clothes chute and utility cabinet.

Quintella's room on the north-east has walls in very pale peach, and light green and yellow are used in the room. The southeast room is a fine turquoise blue and has made furniture throughout.

The incomplete basement will have partitions, a recreation room, Dr. Street's workshop, laundry area and fruit room are planned. Ventilation in the fruitroom is through the ventilated tile. Cupboards will line some of the basement walls.

Dr. Street did all the exterior painting with Mrs. Street helping. They consider their special feature of the house to be the great amount of closet space.

The Streets have been here over nine years, with Dr. Street supervising and teaching in H. H. Hahn school and Wayne State Teachers college during that time. They have three children, Quintella, attending Wayne State; Elaine, dietitian in Sioux City; and John Paul, a recent Ph. D. graduate, employed in Terra Haute, Ind.

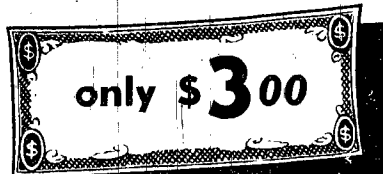
