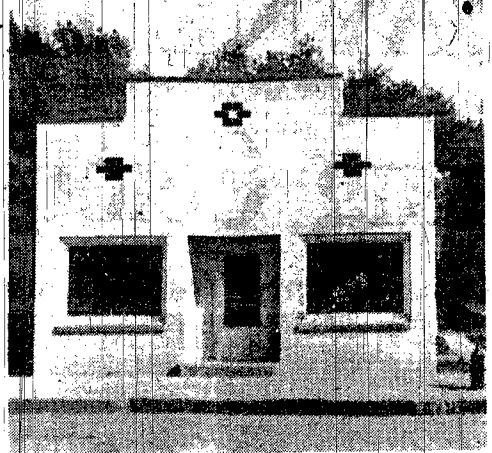

Concord Farm Chosen for Soil Contest

The Wynmore Wallin farm is one of the three Dixon county farms chosen to represent the Dixon county soil conservation district in the Sioux City permanent agriculture contest.

This 160-acre rolling farm is located one mile west and one mile south of Concord.

Mr. and Mrs. Wallin are the parents of two boys and a girl. Wallin began his soil conservation program in 1948. To date he has 24,000 feet of terraces and five acres of waterways on his own farm, and 29,000 feet of terraces and five acres of waterways on the Martin Eckroth farm he rents.

Winton and his father are in partnership on hogs. They feed approximately 150 head of cattle. Arlen, the younger son, is in 4-H club work. His project is purebred Hampshire hogs.

Wallin serves as a supervisor with the Dixon county soil conservation district, a director of the Northeast Public Power district, PMA precinct committeeman, member of the Concord-Dixon unit farm bureau, and member of the Dixon county Livestock Feeders association.

The Concord farmer has been using commercial fertilizer along with barnyard manure to increase production on his farm. This year he used 3,500 pounds of 10-20-0 or 35 acres of oats and sweet clover; 4,500 pounds of 33.5-0-0 on 45 acres of corn, the remaining 30 acres of corn being on stubble and sweet clover ground; 1,600 pounds of 33.5-0-0 plus manure on broom pasture; and 3,000 pounds of 0-45-0 on 20 acres of alfalfa.

In summarizing the conservation program on his farm Wallin feels that the only way he could maintain fertility on his farm was with terraces—contouring alfalfa would not do.

On farms such as ours, with as much slope as we have, we could not haul enough manure, apply enough fertilizer, or grow enough legumes to hold up fertility. We need terraces, contouring, grassed waterways and all the good soil conservation practices. We are raising much better crops now than we did 35 years ago," he stated.

Rubinoff Will Play Three Scores Here

When Dave Rubinoff appears in popular concert in Wayne at the city auditorium Monday, Oct. 27, he will perform as violin solos the full scores of "Chopin's Polonaise," the "Warsaw" Concerto, and "Rhapsody in Blue."

A graduate of the Royal conservatory in Warsaw, Poland, Rubinoff knew as a child the martial feeling inspired by the immortal Polonaise. Even with freedom today confronted with tyranny and treachery as Chopin knew it, the opus is appropriate as a current theme of the times.

The Polonaise was written by Chopin with a burning spirit of national sympathy and has been likened to "Cannons Buried in Flowers."

Rubinoff knew George Gershwin and heard him perform the "Rhapsody in Blue" for the first time in 1924. Gershwin wrote the great jazz classic in a few weeks, but in transcribing it for violin Rubinoff spent months in perfecting the arrangement to his satisfaction.

He was more fortunate in preparing the soul stirring Warsaw Concerto as the composer, Richard Addinsell, worked with him on the transcribed violin version.

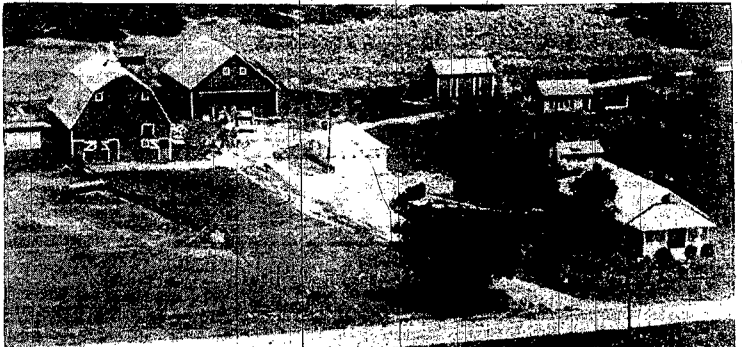

Don't Be a 'One-Half Voter'

Wayne automobile dealers are sponsoring a voter education program which will serve to stimulate the city's "get-out-the-vote" campaign.

Arrangements have been made by the dealers to show the film, "A Brief Case for Nebraskans." This film explains the six state constitutional amendments, which will appear on the ballot in November.

The film is intended to impress on Nebraskans voters that they should not be "one-half voters."

A scrutiny of records of past election returns points up quite convincingly that a goodly number of Nebraskans really are "one-half voters." They vote the political ballots and ignore the non-political issues in alarming proportions.

It has been pointed out more than once that under a non-political state system of selecting legislators, and voting on state issues, there is no regularly organized group which can press on its members the importance of voting. Thus the voter is bombarded with pressure propaganda of all sorts but has no party direction.

This is not a criticism of the non-political system. It is simply a pointing to the need for some group which can emphasize the importance of the non-political ballots, a group now seems to exist at least in regard to the constitutional amendments to be voted on this fall.

Assistance given the backers of the constitutional amendments can dovetail nicely into the get-out-the-vote drive here. It will permit bi-partisan encouragement to all voters, since the amendments will appear on the non-political ballots.

The provisions of the proposed constitutional amendments will be fully explained and debated. The films will illustrate how some voters pass up their chance to express a preference in state legislation.

In the case of the amendments, 35 percent of the total vote cast is required to effect the amendment.

The amendments proposed, briefly, call for:

1. To provide equal compensation for members of the supreme court and its officers.
2. To authorize the legislature to establish a program that will stop tax evasion on motor vehicles.
3. To provide cost of living adjustments for members of the unicameral.
4. To further safeguard local control of our public schools through establishment of a state school board elected by the people.
5. To guarantee the people greater representation in a state constitutional convention.
6. To reduce cost to taxpayers of publishing constitutional amendments.

This looks like a sensible, forthright and promising movement to make residents more conscious of voting on their state's decisions.

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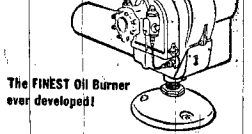

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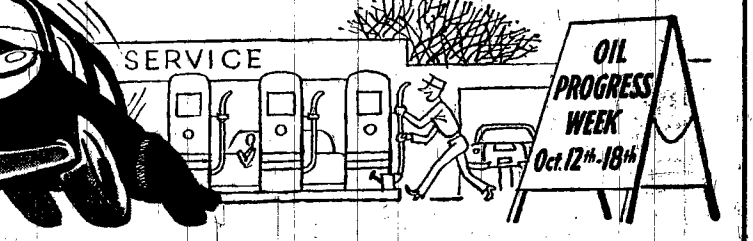
