Farm Barn Destroyed By Blaze

Carroll Fire, believed to have been caused by spontaneous combustion, completely destroyed a farm barn and contents on the farm managed by E. L. Pearson two and a half miles southwest of Carroll Saturday evening around 6.

Dale and Doyle Jenkins, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Elmo Jenkins, who live on the farm, were playing in the haymow when an explosion occurred and the building burst into flames.

Dale, 8, was enveloped in flames. He received burns on the face, right hand and arm, abdomen and his hair was singed. Although his clothes did not burn, the flames seemed to penetrate them.

Doyle, 6, got his hair singed but was not seriously burned. The boys were taken to Winside for treatment.

Mr. Jenkins was milking in the barn below when the fire started. He turned in the alarm and Carroll, Winside and Wayne fire departments answered the call.

Wayne firemen reported they could not get to the cemetery hill on West Seventh street.

A lack of wind aided in keeping the fire from spreading to other buildings. The structure was burned in about 15 minutes but a watch was kept for several hours in case a few fire might break out.

About 300 bales, nine ton, of prairie hay had been put on the barn loft earlier that afternoon. The baled hay, home raised hay, four cows, three pieces of machinery, a corn planter, a new mauler, a sprayer and some harness were destroyed by the fire.

Two cows and calves were saved from the blaze. One cow was so badly burned it had to be destroyed Sunday.

Neighbors helped clear away the debris Sunday. Mr. and Mrs. Harry Hofeldt, Mr. and Mrs. Merle Schlus and Mrs. Ray Spahr and Gary assisted there Sunday.

This is just one of the many mishaps involving Pearson and his farming.

He lost four cows in the 1949 blizzard and several steers were killed in a feed lot last year by lightning. Just last week his tractor burned at a neighbor's farm.

Wayne's annual 4-H club calf sale will be held tonight at the local sale pavilion at 8.

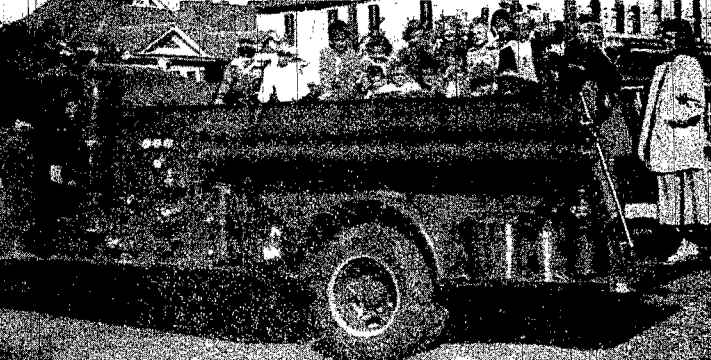
This auction, the fourth, will include calves of all three major breeds, both heifers and steers.

Children's Clinic Here On Oct. 25

Wayne has been selected as the site for the next crippled children's clinic, scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 25. Dr. Walter Bentback has offered the use of the facilities at the Bentback hospital for this purpose.

Specialists conducting the clinic will be Dr. Paul N. Morrow, pediatrician, Omaha; Dr. L. S. Campbell, orthopedist, Omaha; and Dr. Frederick Webster, orthopedist, Lincoln.

More than 60 children have received clinic appointments. Other children may be admitted to the clinic when referred by their local physician.

Four clinics are held in this area a year. In the past, all of these clinics have been in Norfolk. The plan now is to rotate the clinics between Norfolk and Wayne so that each community will have two clinics during the year. Counties included in the Norfolk-Wayne area are: Butler, Boone, Colfax, Cumming, Stanton, Thurston, Dakota, Dixon, Cedar, Pierce, Madison and Wayne.

Myrtle Johnson is in charge of local arrangements. County assistance personnel in the surrounding area will help with registrations and other duties of the clinic.

Local nurses and members of the Wayne Woman's Club will assist the doctors and help with the children.

Through the cooperation of the Wayne Woman's Club, the Elk's lodge is furnishing, without cost, a noon luncheon to all children and their parents who register for clinic examinations. Registrations will be from 7 a.m. until noon.

The clinic will be held under the auspices of the state division of services for crippled children with the cooperation of the Nebraska Elks association.

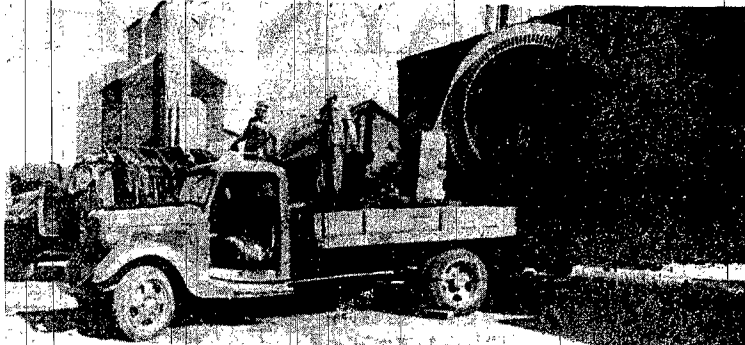

Carroll Man Shoots Self; Dies Sunday

Carroll—George Martin, 77 Carroll, who shot himself in the abdomen with a .32 calibre revolver on a Winside farm about 6 o'clock Thursday morning, died at 8:50 p. m. Sunday in a Norfolk hospital.

Mr. Martin's wife died a few months ago and he was taken to the Ed Ulrich farm home four miles west and three-quarters north of Winside by welfare worker, Myrtle Johnson, so that he would not be alone. He had been despondent since his wife's death.

When the Ulrichs heard a shot Thursday morning, Mr. Ulrich went to his room. Martin was in bed and he asked for a glass of water, saying he had shot himself because he had been lonely since his wife's death.

He was taken to a Norfolk hospital by a Winside physician and underwent surgery. Sheriff Hans Tietgen made the investigation.

Survivors include a son Floyd, California; two sisters, Mrs. Marvin Root, Sholes and another in Winnet, S. D., and two brothers, Dan, Wayne, who is on a trip out east, and Richard, Randolph.

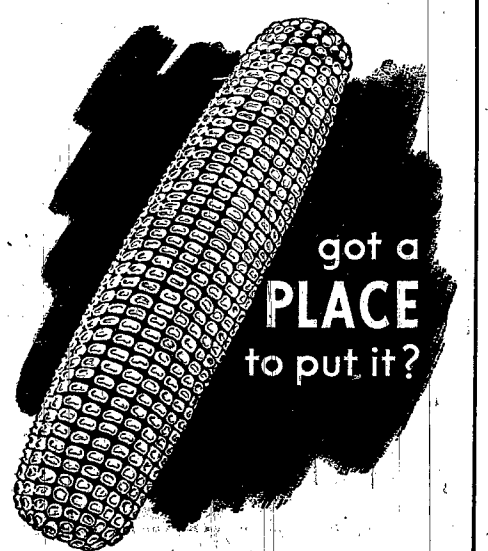

Forty of us, members of the National Editorial association, sailed with a fast carrier task force from Norfolk, Va. on Aug. 26. It was

one of 25 aboard the USS Midway. Fifteen others were on the USS Roosevelt. These big carriers are each about 1,000 feet long. They launch and recover both jet and propeller type aircraft with unbelievable efficiency. And they were doing it, almost around the clock, most of the time during our two weeks crossing to the Firth of Clyde, Glasgow, Scotland.

Three days later, Admiral R. E. Rose on this ship commanded the amphibious landings on the beaches of Denmark. At conclusion of the landing exercises, the ships continued to Oslo, Norway, where I rejoined the group four days later, Sept. 26.
In Oslo the visiting newsmen of all nations and their wives were from Turkey, south to Scotland, north, and from the continent as

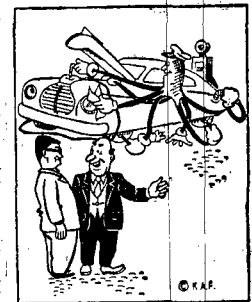

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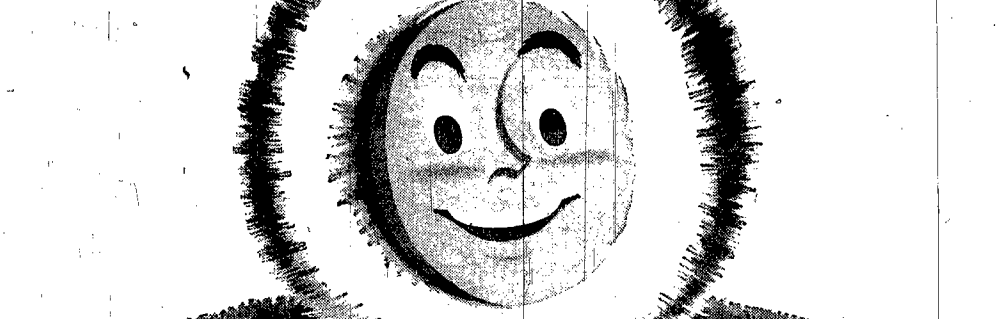
